<b>bold</b>	(of a person, action, or idea) showing a willingness to take risks; confident and courageous. <i>A <b>bold</b> design.</i>
<b><u>brazen</u></b>	Made of or resembling brass (as in color or hardness). <i><b>Brazen</b> fire irons.</i>
<b>cocksure</b>	Marked by excessive confidence. <i>An arrogant and <b>cocksure</b> materialist.</i>
<b><u>egotistical</u></b>	Characteristic of those having an inflated idea of their own importance. <i>An <b>egotistical</b> disregard of others.</i>
<b><u>familiar</u></b>	In close friendship; intimate. <i><b>Familiar</b> ordinary objects found in every home.</i>
<b><u>forward</u></b>	Moving forward. <i>Troops moved to the <b>forward</b> areas.</i>
<b>free</b>	Not or no longer confined or imprisoned. <i>A <b>free</b> choice.</i>
<b>fresh</b>	Presumptuous towards someone, especially in a sexual way. <i><b>Fresh</b> lettuce.</i>
<b><u>impertinent</u></b>	Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. <i>Mentioned several <b>impertinent</b> facts before finally coming to the point.</i>
<b>impudent</b>	Not showing due respect for another person; impertinent. <i>The student was kept in for <b>impudent</b> behavior.</i>
<b><u>insolent</u></b>	Unrestrained by convention or propriety. <i>The modern world with its quick material successes and <b>insolent</b> belief in the boundless possibilities of progress.</i>
<b>overbold</b>	Excessively bold. <i>Outlaws from the forests had grown <b>overbold</b>.</i>
<b><u>overconfident</u></b>	Excessively confident. <i>Sarah's downfall came through being <b>overconfident</b>.</i>
<b>pert</b>	Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. <i>No need to be <b>pert</b> miss.</i>

<b>chutzpah</b>	Unbelievable gall; insolence; audacity. <i>Love him or hate him you have to admire Cohen s <b>chutzpah</b>.</i>
<b>confident</b>	Feeling or showing confidence in oneself or one's abilities or qualities. <i>People who are <b>confident</b> in their identity.</i>
<b>daring</b>	Adventurous courage. <i>The most <b>daring</b> of contemporary fiction writers.</i>
<b>effrontery</b>	Audacious (even arrogant) behavior that you have no right to. <i>One juror had the <b>effrontery</b> to challenge the coroner s decision.</i>
<b>gall</b>	A digestive juice secreted by the liver and stored in the gallbladder aids in the digestion of fats. <i>It <b>galls</b> me that we lost the suit.</i>
<b>impenitent</b>	Not feeling shame or regret about one's actions or attitudes. <i><b>Impenitent</b> elitists.</i>
<b>impertinence</b>	Inappropriate playfulness. <i>They gasped at the <b>impertinence</b> of the suggestion.</i>

<b>impertinent</b>	Not pertinent to a particular matter; irrelevant. <i>An <b>impertinent</b> question.</i>
<b>impudence</b>	The trait of being rude and impertinent; inclined to take liberties. <i>His arrogance and <b>impudence</b> had offended many.</i>
<b>impudent</b>	Marked by casual disrespect. <i>An <b>impudent</b> boy given to insulting strangers.</i>
<b>insolence</b>	The trait of being rude and impertinent; inclined to take liberties. <i>She was sacked for <b>insolence</b>.</i>
<b>insolent</b>	Unrestrained by convention or propriety. <i>She hated the <b>insolent</b> tone of his voice.</i>
<b>irreverent</b>	Not revering god. <i>A certain <b>irreverent</b> gaiety and ease of manner.</i>
<b>pert</b>	Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. <i>A <b>pert</b> slightly plump girl called Rose.</i>
<b>pretentious</b>	Tawdry or vulgar. <i>A <b>pretentious</b> scholarly edition.</i>
<b>proudly</b>	With a feeling of deep pleasure or satisfaction in one's own achievements, qualities, or possessions or those of someone with whom one is closely associated. <i>Pristine new office buildings stood <b>proudly</b> beside a large car park.</i>
<b>shameless</b>	(of a person or their conduct) characterized by or showing a lack of shame; barefaced or brazen. <i>A <b>shameless</b> imposter.</i>
<b>temerity</b>	Excessive confidence or boldness; audacity. <i>No one had the <b>temerity</b> to question his conclusions.</i>
<b>unashamed</b>	Expressed or acting openly and without guilt or embarrassment. <i>An <b>unashamed</b> emotionalism.</i>
<b>unrepentant</b>	Showing no regret for one's wrongdoings. <i>He was <b>unrepentant</b> and said that his comments were completely accurate.</i>
<b>upstart</b>	A person who has risen suddenly in rank or importance, especially one who behaves arrogantly. <i>The <b>upstarts</b> who dare to challenge the legitimacy of his rule.</i>
