- *Lay claim to (a quality or title).*
- *Put forward, of a guess, in spite of possible refutation.*
- *Engage in an imaginative game or fantasy.*
- *Make believe with the intent to deceive.*
- *Represent fictitiously, as in a play, or pretend to be or act like.*

play at	Cause to happen or to occur as a consequence.
profess	Practice as a profession teach or claim to be knowledgeable about. <i>She entered St Margaret s Convent and was professed in 1943.</i>
professed	State insincerely.

imaginary	Not based on fact; existing only in the imagination. <i>Chris had imaginary conversations with her.</i>
imagined	(of something unreal or untrue) believed to exist or be so. <i>They perceive imagined slights where none exist.</i>

imitative	(of words) formed in imitation of a natural sound. <i>The derring do of our film heroes inspired us to imitative feats.</i>
made-up	Having been paved.
make-believe	Imagined as in a play.
<u>mock</u>	Constituting a copy or imitation of something. <i>Boys in mock battle.</i>
<u>mythical</u>	Idealized, especially with reference to the past. <i>A mythical customer whose name appears in brochures promoting the bank s services.</i>
pretended	Adopted in order to deceive. <i>A pretended interest.</i>
