<b>invaluable</b>	Extremely useful; indispensable. <i>An <b>invaluable</b> source of information.</i>

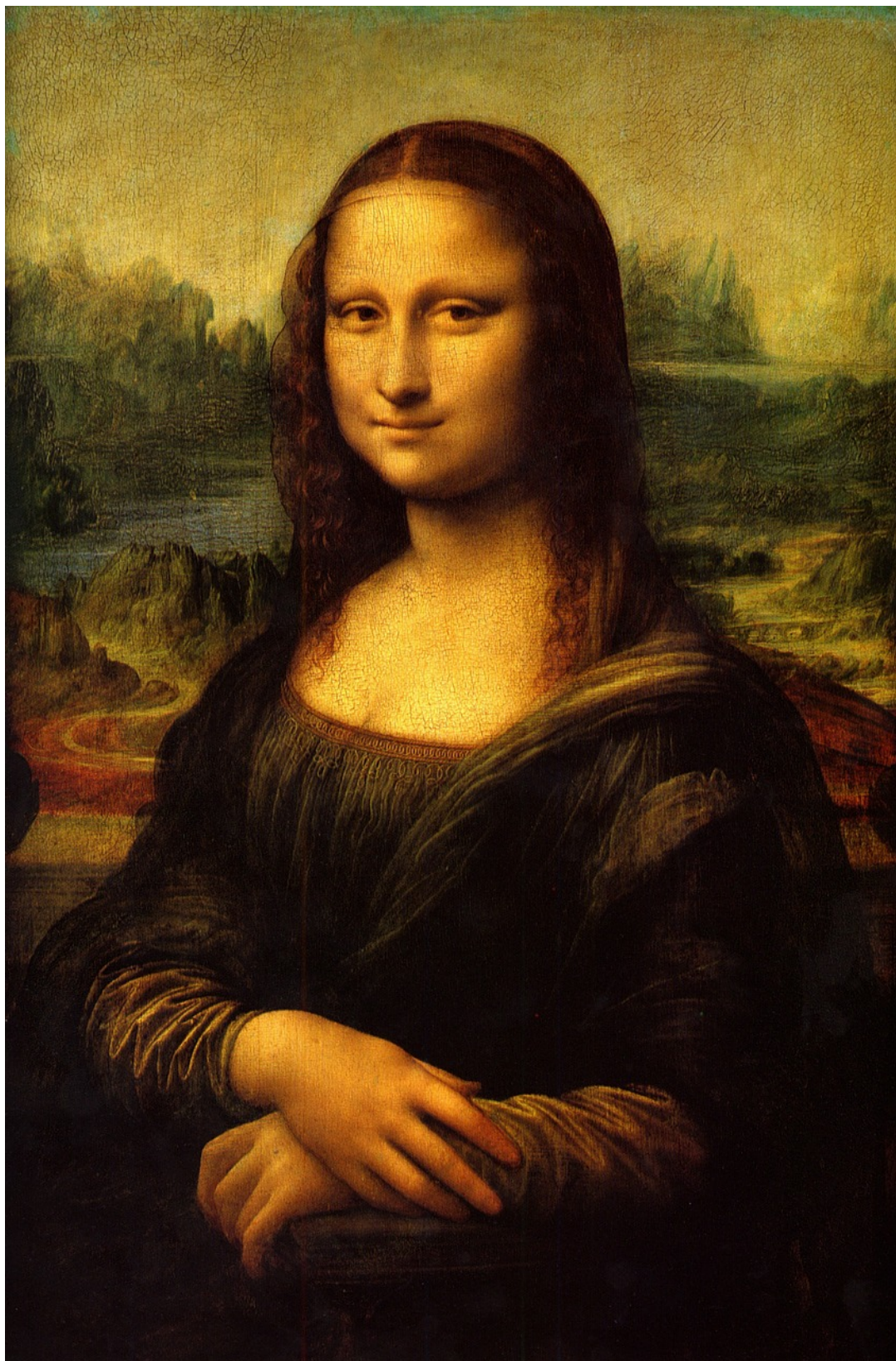

<b>beautification</b>	The action or process of improving the appearance of a person or place. <i>The city commissioned the <b>beautification</b> of the tunnel with work by five artists.</i>
<b>carat</b>	A measure of the purity of gold pure gold being 24 carats. <i>A half <b>carat</b> diamond ring.</i>
<b>commendable</b>	Worthy of high praise. <i>He showed <b>commendable</b> restraint.</i>
<b>contribution</b>	The part played by a person in bringing about a result. <i>Local historians are requesting <b>contributions</b> for a forthcoming book on the history of the community.</i>
<b>deserve</b>	Do something or have or show qualities worthy of (a reaction which rewards or punishes as appropriate). <i>The referee <b>deserves</b> a pat on the back.</i>
<b>deservedly</b>	As deserved. <i>A <b>deservedly</b> popular sitcom.</i>
<b>deserving</b>	Worthy of being treated in a particular way (often used ironically). <i>The <b>deserving</b> poor.</i>
<b>donate</b>	Allow the removal of (blood or an organ) from one's body for transplantation, transfusion, or research. <i>She <b>donates</b> to her favorite charity every month.</i>
<b>gem</b>	Used in names of some brilliantly coloured hummingbirds e g mountain gem. <i>This architectural <b>gem</b> of a palace.</i>
<b>gemstone</b>	A precious or semi-precious stone, especially one cut, polished, and used in a piece of jewellery.
<b>heirloom</b>	Denoting a traditional variety of plant or breed of animal which is not associated with large-scale commercial agriculture. <i>The violin was a family <b>heirloom</b>.</i>
<b>invaluable</b>	Having incalculable monetary, intellectual, or spiritual worth. <i>An <b>invaluable</b> source of information.</i>

<b><u>jewel</u></b>	A person who is as brilliant and precious as a piece of jewelry. <i>She loved dressing up in her <b>jewels</b>.</i>
<b>jewellery</b>	An adornment (as a bracelet or ring or necklace) made of precious metals and set with gems (or imitation gems). <i>A <b>jewellery</b> box.</i>
<b>laudable</b>	(of an action, idea, or aim) deserving praise and commendation. <i><b>Laudable</b> though the aim might be the results have been criticized.</i>
<b>merit</b>	The intrinsic rights and wrongs of a case, outside of any other considerations. <i>A plaintiff who has a good arguable case on the <b>merits</b>.</i>
<b>merited</b>	Properly deserved. <i>A <b>merited</b> success.</i>
<b>praiseworthy</b>	Deserving approval and admiration. <i>The government's <b>praiseworthy</b> efforts.</i>
<b>precious</b>	Characterized by feeling or showing fond affection for. <i>Don't be frightened my <b>precious</b>.</i>
<b><u>respectable</u></b>	Large in amount or extent or degree. <i>They thought the stage no life for a <b>respectable</b> lady.</i>
<b>rhinestone</b>	An imitation diamond made from rock crystal or glass or paste. <i><b>Rhinestone</b> earrings.</i>
<b>treasure</b>	Hold dear. <i>The children returned from the seashore with their shells and other <b>treasures</b>.</i>
<b>valuable</b>	Having worth or merit or value. <i>Put all your <b>valuables</b> in the hotel safe.</i>
<b>value</b>	Estimate the value of. <i>The mean <b>value</b> of x.</i>
<b>valued</b>	Having value of a specified kind. <i>A <b>valued</b> friend.</i>
<b>worthiness</b>	The quality or state of having merit or value. <i>An argument about the moral <b>worthiness</b> of the nation's founders.</i>
