<b>fulfilment</b>	The act of consummating something (a desire or promise etc). <i>Technology solutions for e commerce order <b>fulfilment</b>.</i>

<b>object of admiration</b>	A constituent that is acted upon.
<b>pleasure</b>	An event or activity from which one derives enjoyment. <i>He was tingling with <b>pleasure</b>.</i>
<b><u>presumption</u></b>	An idea that is taken to be true on the basis of probability. <i>Underlying <b>presumptions</b> about human nature.</i>
<b>pride and joy</b>	Satisfaction with your (or another's) achievements.

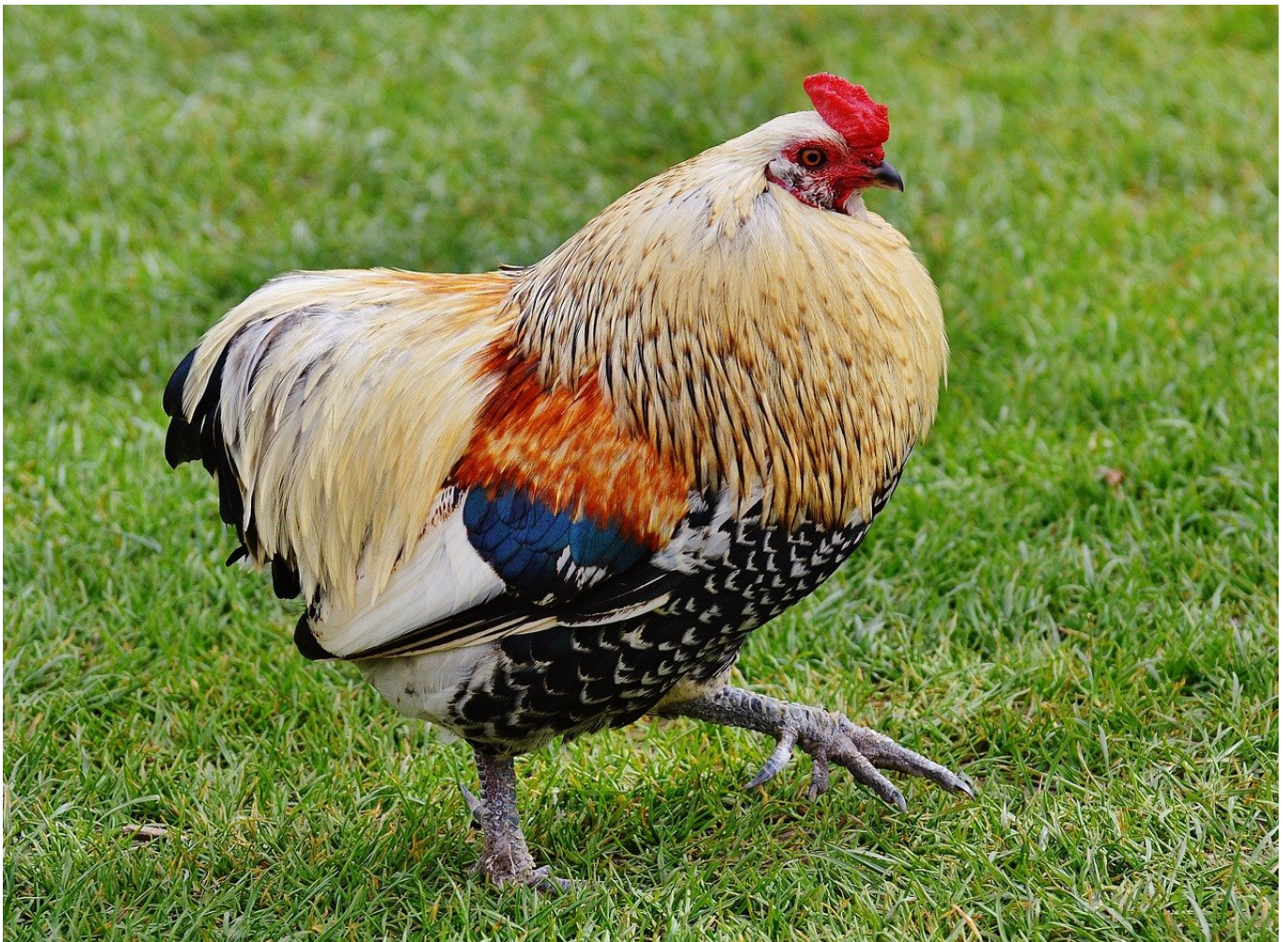

<b>bravado</b>	A bold manner or a show of boldness intended to impress or intimidate. <i>He possesses none of the classic wheeler dealer s casual <b>bravado</b>.</i>
<b>cocksure</b>	Confident in an excessive or arrogant way. <i>An arrogant and <b>cocksure</b> materialist.</i>
<b>conceit</b>	The trait of being unduly vain and conceited false pride. <i>He was puffed up with <b>conceit</b>.</i>
<b>conceited</b>	Excessively proud of oneself; vain. <i>A <b>conceited</b> fool.</i>
<b>condescending</b>	Characteristic of those who treat others with condescension. <i>A <b>condescending</b> smile.</i>
<b>egotism</b>	An exaggerated opinion of your own importance. <i>In his arrogance and <b>egotism</b> he underestimated Gill.</i>
<b>gasconade</b>	An instance of boastful talk. <i>Whenever he won we were exposed to his <b>gasconade</b>.</i>
<b>haughty</b>	Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy. <i><b>Haughty</b> aristocrats.</i>
<b>narcissism</b>	Self-centredness arising from failure to distinguish the self from external objects, either in very young babies or as a feature of mental disorder.
<b>pomposity</b>	Lack of elegance as a consequence of being pompous and puffed up with vanity. <i>His reputation for arrogance and <b>pomposity</b>.</i>
<b>pompous</b>	Characterized by pomp or splendour. <i>Processions and other <b>pompous</b> shows.</i>

<b>pontificate</b>	Express one's opinions in a pompous and dogmatic way. <i>The new professor always <b>pontificates</b>.</i>
<b>pretentious</b>	Attempting to impress by affecting greater importance or merit than is actually possessed. <i>The <b>pretentious</b> jargon of wine experts.</i>
<b>proud</b>	Of an event achievement etc causing someone to feel proud. <b>Proud</b> princes.
<b>proudly</b>	With a feeling of deep pleasure or satisfaction in one's own achievements, qualities, or possessions or those of someone with whom one is closely associated. <i>Pristine new office buildings stood <b>proudly</b> beside a large car park.</i>
<b>vainglorious</b>	Excessively proud of oneself or one's achievements; overly vain. <i>This <b>vainglorious</b> boast of personal infallibility.</i>
<b>vainglory</b>	Outspoken conceit. <i>His <b>vainglory</b> put the Republic at risk.</i>
<b>vanity</b>	The trait of being unduly vain and conceited; false pride. <i>The <b>vanity</b> of human wishes.</i>
<b>vaunt</b>	Boast about or praise (something), especially excessively. <i>An autobiographer is simultaneously <b>vaunted</b> and castigated for revealing more than is deemed proper.</i>
