haughtiness	The appearance or quality of being arrogantly superior and disdainful. <i>Her air of haughtiness</i> .
honour	The right of driving off first, having won the previous hole. <i>You are an <b>honour</b> to our profession.</i>
<u>hubris</u>	Overbearing pride or presumption. The self assured <b>hubris</b> among economists was shaken in the late 1980s.



bravado	A bold manner or a show of boldness intended to impress or intimidate. <i>He possesses none of the classic wheeler dealer s casual <b>bravado</b>.</i>
cocksure	Confident in an excessive or arrogant way. An arrogant and <b>cocksure</b> materialist.
conceit	The trait of being unduly vain and conceited false pride. <i>He was puffed up with conceit</i> .
conceited	Excessively proud of oneself; vain. A <b>conceited</b> fool.
<u>condescending</u>	Characteristic of those who treat others with condescension. A <b>condescending</b> smile.
egotism	An exaggerated opinion of your own importance. In his arrogance and <b>egotism</b> he underestimated Gill.
gasconade	An instance of boastful talk. Whenever he won we were exposed to his <b>gasconade</b> .
<u>haughty</u>	Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy. <i>Haughty</i> aristocrats.
narcissism	Self-centredness arising from failure to distinguish the self from external objects, either in very young babies or as a feature of mental disorder.
pomposity	Lack of elegance as a consequence of being pompous and puffed up with vanity. His reputation for arrogance and <b>pomposity</b> .
pompous	Characterized by pomp or splendour. Processions and other <b>pompous</b> shows.



pontificate	Express one's opinions in a pompous and dogmatic way. The new professor always <b>pontificate</b> s.
pretentious	Attempting to impress by affecting greater importance or merit than is actually possessed. The <b>pretentious</b> jargon of wine experts.
proud	Of an event achievement etc causing someone to feel proud. <b>Proud</b> princes.
proudly	With a feeling of deep pleasure or satisfaction in one's own achievements, qualities, or possessions or those of someone with whom one is closely associated. Pristine new office buildings stood <b>proudly</b> beside a large car park.
vainglorious	Excessively proud of oneself or one's achievements; overly vain. This <b>vainglorious</b> boast of personal infallibility.
vainglory	Outspoken conceit. His <b>vainglory</b> put the Republic at risk.
<u>vanity</u>	The trait of being unduly vain and conceited; false pride. <i>The <b>vanity</b> of human wishes.</i>
vaunt	Boast about or praise (something), especially excessively. An autobiographer is simultaneously <b>vaunt</b> ed and castigated for revealing more than is deemed proper.
