- Having existed from the beginning; in an earliest or original stage or state.
- Serving as an essential component.
- Relating to or denoting the needs, fears, or behaviour that are postulated (especially in *Freudian theory*) to form the origins of emotional life.
- Most important; primary or fundamental.
- Relating to an early stage in evolutionary development; primeval.






# Synonyms of "Primal" as an adjective (22 Words)

<u>aboriginal</u>	Inhabiting or existing in a land from the earliest times or from before the arrival of colonists; indigenous. The <b>aboriginal</b> peoples of Australia.
<u>basic</u>	Serving as a base or starting point. A <b>basic</b> course in Russian.
<u>cardinal</u>	Serving as an essential component. Two <b>cardinal</b> points must be borne in mind.
<u>central</u>	Accessible from a variety of places. <i>Coaches met at a <b>central</b> location.</i>
earliest	Expected in the near future. Verdi s <b>earliest</b> and most raucous opera.
<u>early</u>	Of an early stage in the development of a language or literature. We agreed to meet at 6 am to get an <b>early</b> start.



<u>elemental</u>	Denoting uncombined chemical elements. <i>Elemental</i> sulphur.
essential	Basic and fundamental. It is <b>essential</b> to keep up to date records.
first	Preceding all others in time or space or degree. The <b>first</b> meetings of the new party.
fundamental	Far-reaching and thoroughgoing in effect especially on the nature of something. <i>The book underwent <b>fundamental</b> changes.</i>
<u>indispensable</u>	Absolutely necessary; vitally necessary. The routine but <b>indispensable</b> ceremonies of state.
<u>inherent</u>	(of an adjective) having the same meaning in both attributive and predicative uses. The president s <b>inherent</b> foreign affairs power.
initial	Occurring at the beginning. The witness was identified simply by an <b>initial</b> letter.
<u>intrinsic</u>	Belonging to a thing by its very nature. Access to the arts is <b>intrinsic</b> to a high quality of life.
key	Serving as an essential component. She became a <b>key</b> figure in the suffragette movement.
<u>original</u>	Present or existing from the beginning; first or earliest. A subtle and <b>original</b> thinker.
primaeval	Having existed from the beginning; in an earliest or original stage or state.
<u>primary</u>	Of primary importance. A <b>primary</b> alcohol.
primeval	Of the earliest time in history. Mile after mile of <b>primeval</b> forest.
<u>primitive</u>	Relating to, denoting, or preserving the character of an early stage in the evolutionary or historical development of something. <i>Primitive mammals.</i>
<u>primordial</u>	Existing at or from the beginning of time; primeval. <i>Primordial</i> forms of life.
<u>vital</u>	Manifesting or characteristic of life. A <b>vital</b> and charismatic leader.

<u>foremost</u>	Before anything else. The <b>foremost</b> compartment of the ship.
<u>front</u>	Provide something with a front or facing of a particular type or material. The west <b>front</b> of the Cathedral.
historic	(of a tense) used in the narration of past events, especially Latin and Greek imperfect and pluperfect. <i>Historical or historic times.</i>
inchoate	Just begun and so not fully formed or developed; rudimentary. <i>A vague <b>inchoate</b> idea.</i>
initial	Mark with one s initials. <i>Initial</i> consonants.
initially	At the beginning. <i>Initially</i> he thought the new concept was nonsense.
leading	The activity of leading. The country s <b>leading</b> poet.
main	Most important element. The camcorder can be run directly off the <b>main</b> s.
major	Of a premise containing the major term in a categorical syllogism. <i>Major</i> scales.
paleolithic	Second part of the Stone Age beginning about 750,000 to 500,000 years BC and lasting until the end of the last ice age about 8,500 years BC. <i>Paleolithic artifacts.</i>
predate	Prey on or hunt for. Here parish boundaries seem clearly to <b>predate</b> Roman roads.
premier	The person who is head of government (in several countries. We <b>premier</b> ed the opera of the young composer and it was a critical success.
premiere	Perform a work for the first time. His first stage play was <b>premiere</b> d at the Birmingham Repertory Theatre.
prime	A prime number. <b>Prime</b> cuts of meat.



<u>primordial</u>	(of a cell, part, or tissue) in the earliest stage of development. <i>Primordial forms of life.</i>
principal	An actor who plays a principal role. He had been an outstanding <b>principal</b> in the orchestra.
<u>priority</u>	The fact or condition of being regarded or treated as more important than others. National independence takes <b>priority</b> over class struggle.
seventh	One part in seven equal parts.
<u>staple</u>	Attach or secure with a staple or staples. <b>Staple</b> fibers vary widely in length.
supreme	A dish served in a supreme sauce. <i>Our comrades who made the <b>supreme</b> sacrifice.</i>
untimely	At a time that is unsuitable or premature.
