- *Belonging to an early stage of technical development; characterized by simplicity and (often) crudeness.*
- *Relating to or denoting a preliterate, non-industrial society or culture characterized by simple social and economic organization.*
- *Not developed or derived from anything else.*
- *Of or denoting a simple, naive style of art that deliberately rejects sophisticated artistic techniques.*
- *Relating to, denoting, or preserving the character of an early stage in the evolutionary or historical development of something.*
- *(of an algebraic or geometric expression) from which another is derived, or which is not itself derived from another.*
- *Denoting a word, base, or root from which another is historically derived.*

- *(of a part or structure) in the first or early stage of formation or growth; rudimentary.*
- *(of behaviour or emotion) apparently originating in unconscious needs or desires and unaffected by objective reasoning.*
- *Of or created by one without formal training; simple or naive in style.*
- *Used of preliterate or tribal or nonindustrial societies.*
- *Little evolved from or characteristic of an earlier ancestral type.*
- *Very basic or unsophisticated in terms of comfort, convenience, or efficiency.*

<u>crude</u>	Belonging to an early stage of technical development characterized by simplicity and often crudeness. <i>The measure was condemned by economists as crude and ill conceived.</i>
earliest	Expected in the near future. <i>Verdi s earliest and most raucous opera.</i>
<u>elementary</u>	Of or pertaining to or characteristic of elementary school or elementary education. <i>An elementary problem in statistics.</i>
embryonic	Relating to an embryo. <i>In the embryonic stage.</i>
first	Preceding all others in time or space or degree. <i>First soprano.</i>
<u>immature</u>	(of birds) not yet having developed feathers. <i>Immature behavior.</i>
<u>incomplete</u>	Not complete or total; not completed. <i>The analysis remains incomplete.</i>
innocent	Lacking sense or awareness. <i>A man innocent of war s cruelties.</i>
<u>lower</u>	Situated to the south. <i>Land of a lower quality.</i>
<u>makeshift</u>	Done or made using whatever is available. <i>Arranging a row of chairs to form a makeshift bed.</i>
<u>naive</u>	Of or created by one without formal training simple or naive in style. <i>I was politically naive.</i>
natural	Relating to earthly human or physical nature as distinct from the spiritual or supernatural realm. <i>Natural gas.</i>
<u>original</u>	Not derived or copied or translated from something else. <i>The original owner of the house.</i>

prehistoric	Belonging to or existing in times before recorded history. Prehistoric man.
preliterate	Used of a society that has not developed writing. Preliterate myths and rituals.
<u>primal</u>	Most important; primary or fundamental. Primal eras before the appearance of life on earth.
<u>primary</u>	Of primary importance. Primary sources.
primeval	Having existed from the beginning; in an earliest or original stage or state. The forest primeval .
<u>primordial</u>	(of a cell, part, or tissue) in the earliest stage of development. Primordial forms of life.
rough	(of weather or the sea) wild and stormy. Rough blankets.
rough and ready	Causing or characterized by jolts and irregular movements.
rude	Belonging to an early stage of technical development characterized by simplicity and often crudeness. She had been rude to her boss.
<u>rudimentary</u>	Being or involving basic facts or principles. He received a rudimentary education.
simple	Having few parts; not complex or complicated or involved. A quiet unassuming man with simple tastes.
<u>unaffected</u>	Without artificiality or insincerity. Fibers remained apparently unaffected by the treatment.
undeveloped	Undeveloped or unused. Taxes on undeveloped lots are low.
unpretentious	Not ostentatious. Her quiet unpretentious demeanor.
<u>unrefined</u>	Not refined or processed. Unrefined sugar.
<u>unsophisticated</u>	Awkwardly simple and provincial. The nightlife of Montmartre awed the unsophisticated tourists.

fiendish	Extremely cruel or unpleasant. <i>Fiendish methods of torture.</i>
historic	Important in history. <i>Historical or historic times.</i>
incan	A member of the Quechuan people living in the Cuzco valley in Peru.
inhuman	Lacking human qualities of compassion and mercy; cruel and barbaric. <i>The inhuman scale of the dinosaurs.</i>
inhumane	Lacking and reflecting lack of pity or compassion. <i>Confining wild horses is inhumane.</i>

neolithic	Latest part of the Stone Age beginning about 10,000 BC in the Middle East (but later elsewhere).
paleolithic	Second part of the Stone Age beginning about 750,000 to 500,000 years BC and lasting until the end of the last ice age about 8,500 years BC. <i>Paleolithic artifacts.</i>
pitiless	(especially of weather) unrelentingly harsh or severe. <i>A pitiless executioner.</i>
premature	Occurring or done before the usual or proper time; too early. <i>Illness led to his premature death.</i>
primeval	(of emotion or behaviour) strongly instinctive and unreasoning. <i>The forest primeval.</i>
primordial	(of a cell, part, or tissue) in the earliest stage of development. <i>Primordial matter.</i>
sadistic	Deriving pleasure from inflicting pain, suffering, or humiliation on others. <i>A sadistic killer.</i>
savage	A cruelly rapacious person. <i>He savaged the government for wasting billions in their failed bid to prop up the pound.</i>
truculence	Obstreperous and defiant aggressiveness.
truculent	Eager or quick to argue or fight; aggressively defiant. <i>The truculent attitude of farmers to cheaper imports.</i>
uncivilized	Without civilizing influences. <i>They pitied us for leaving the Smoke for such uncivilized remoteness.</i>
vicious	Deliberately cruel or violent. <i>Vicious gossip.</i>
