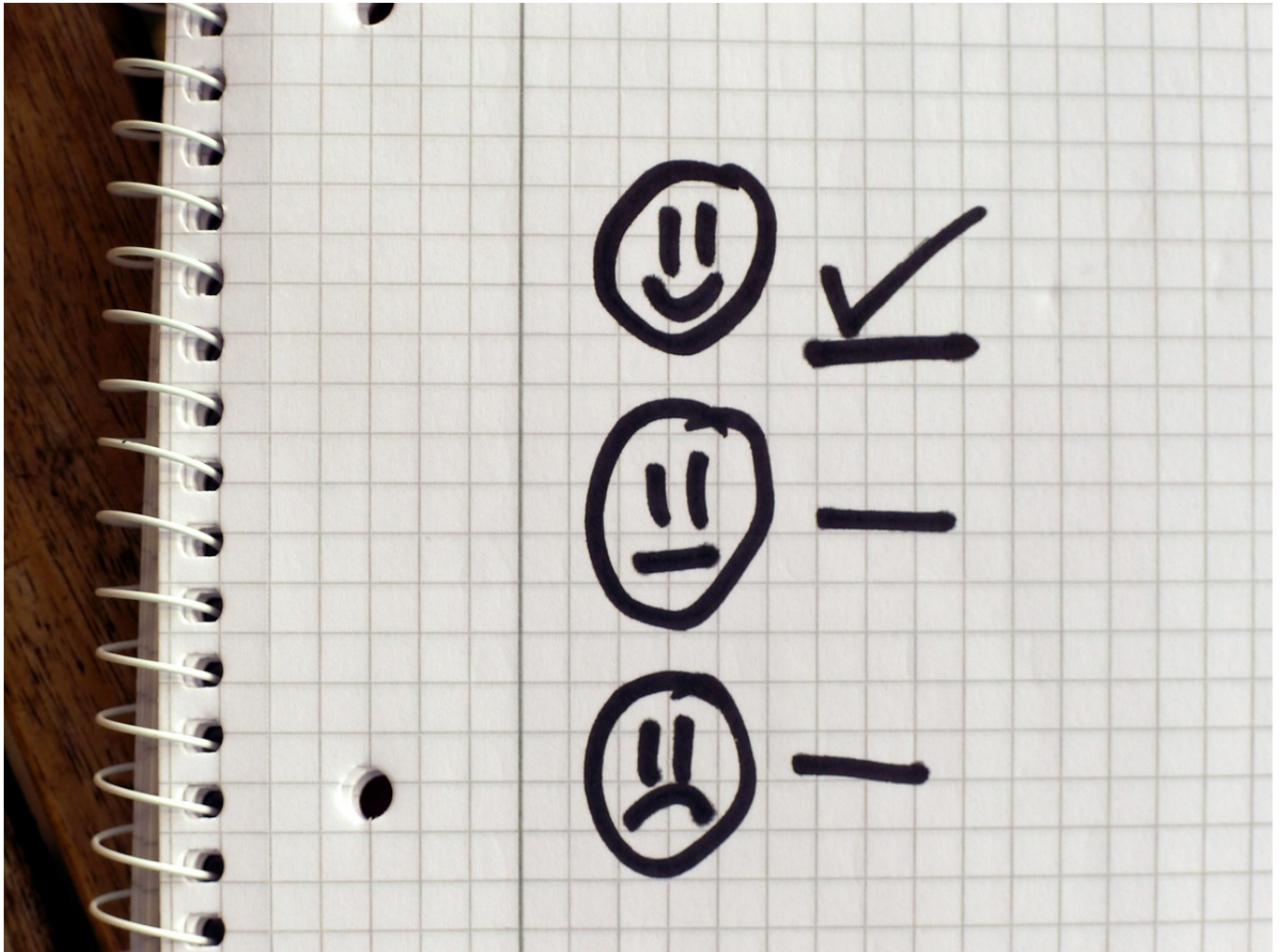

<b>preference</b>	A greater liking for one alternative over another or others. <i>My own <b>preference</b> is for good literature.</i>
<b>primacy</b>	The state of being first in importance. <i>London s <b>primacy</b> as a financial centre.</i>
<b>primary issue</b>	Coil forming the part of an electrical circuit such that changing current in it induces a current in a neighboring circuit.
<b>prime concern</b>	The period of greatest prosperity or productivity.
<b>right of way</b>	Anything in accord with principles of justice.
<b>the lead</b>	A position of leadership especially in the phrase take the lead.
<b><u>weight</u></b>	A system of units used to express the weight of something. <i>A recommendation by the committee will carry great <b>weight</b>.</i>
<b>weighting</b>	The relative importance granted to something. <i>They will give due <b>weighting</b> to quality as well as price.</i>

<b>precursory</b>	Warning of future misfortune. <i><b>Precursory</b> seismic activity.</i>
<b>predate</b>	Exist or occur at a date earlier than (something). <i>These mammals <b>predate</b> certain eggs.</i>
<b><u>predecessor</u></b>	A thing that has been followed or replaced by another. <i>The chapel was built in 1864 on the site of its <b>predecessor</b>.</i>
<b>preface</b>	Furnish with a preface or introduction. <i>It was an abrupt question made without even the <b>preface</b> of a greeting.</i>

- premature** Too soon or too hasty.

- prematurely** Before the due time; ahead of time.

*The **previous** occupant of the White House.*
- previously** At a previous or earlier time; before.  
*Better than anything **previously** proposed.*
- prior** The head of a religious order in an abbey the prior is next below the abbot.

- untimely** At a time that is unsuitable or premature.
