## **Prisoner** as a Noun

#### Definitions of "Prisoner" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "prisoner" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- A person captured and kept confined by an enemy or criminal.
- A person who is or feels confined or trapped by a situation.
- A person legally committed to prison as a punishment for a crime or while awaiting trial.
- A person who is confined; especially a prisoner of war.






### Synonyms of "Prisoner" as a noun (5 Words)

<u>captive</u>	An animal that is confined. The policeman put a pair of handcuffs on the <b>captive</b> .
<u>convict</u>	A person who has been convicted of a criminal offense. Two escaped <b>convict</b> s kidnapped them at gunpoint.
inmate	A person serving a sentence in a jail or prison. <b>Inmate</b> s of the Louisiana State Penitentiary.
pow	A person who surrenders to (or is taken by) the enemy in time of war.
prisoner of war	A person who is confined especially a prisoner of war.







#### Usage Examples of "Prisoner" as a noun

- She may have been held prisoner before being killed.
- *He's become a prisoner of the publicity he's generated.*
- 200 rebels were taken prisoner.
- A prisoner serving a life sentence.



# Associations of "Prisoner" (30 Words)

<u>amnesty</u>	A period during which offenders are exempt from punishment. An <b>amnesty</b> for political prisoners.
apprehend	Anticipate (something) with uneasiness or fear. <i>He is a man that <b>apprehend</b>s death no more dreadfully but as a drunken sleep.</i>
arrest	Seize (someone) by legal authority and take them into custody. <i>The church s stillness <b>arrest</b>ed her.</i>



<u>captive</u>	Having no freedom to choose alternatives or to avoid something. A <b>captive</b> power plant.
captivity	The condition of being imprisoned or confined. The third month of their <b>captivity</b> passed.
capture	Bring about the capture of an elementary particle or celestial body and causing it enter a new orbit. A bounty hunter who always brings his <b>capture</b> s in alive.
catch	The act of catching an object with the hands. <i>He took a brilliant <b>catch</b> at deep square leg.</i>
committal	The act of committing a crime. The funeral service was held on May 12 followed by <b>committal</b> at Forest Lawn Cemetery.
<u>convict</u>	A person who has been convicted of a criminal offense. The thieves were <b>convict</b> ed of the robbery.
<u>conviction</u>	(criminal law) a final judgment of guilty in a criminal case and the punishment that is imposed. She takes pride in stating her political <b>convictions</b> .
criminal	Someone who has committed a crime or has been legally convicted of a crime. He may never fulfil his potential and that would be a <b>criminal</b> waste.
<u>culprit</u>	Someone who perpetrates wrongdoing. The car s front nearside door had been smashed in but the <b>culprit</b> s had fled.
<u>delinquent</u>	A delinquent person. A <b>delinquent</b> account.
execute	Sign in the presence of witnesses. He would be <b>execute</b> d if he fell into rebel hands.
guilty	Culpable of or responsible for a specified wrongdoing. <i>He felt <b>guilty</b> about the way he had treated her.</i>
<u>imprison</u>	Confine as if in a prison. His daughters are virtually <b>imprison</b> ed in their own house he does not let them go out without a chaperone.
<u>imprisonment</u>	Putting someone in prison or in jail as lawful punishment. <i>He was sentenced to two months imprisonment</i> .
indictment	A formal charge or accusation of a serious crime. The book is an <b>indictment</b> of modern philosophy.
inmate	A person confined to an institution such as a prison or hospital. <i>Inmates of the Louisiana State Penitentiary.</i>



intern	Work as an intern. During WW II Japanese were <b>intern</b> ed in camps in the West.
jail	Put someone in jail. A <b>jail</b> sentence.
<u>murderer</u>	A person who commits murder. <i>Convicted <b>murderer</b>s.</i>
parole	Release a prisoner on parole. <i>He committed a burglary while on <b>parole</b>.</i>
penitential	Relating to or expressing penitence or penance. Wrote a <b>penitential</b> letter apologizing for her hasty words.
penitentiary	(in the Roman Catholic Church) a priest appointed to administer penance. <i>Penitentiary</i> institutions.
<u>perpetrator</u>	Someone who perpetrates wrongdoing. The <b>perpetrator</b> s of this horrific crime must be brought to justice.
<u>prison</u>	A prisonlike situation a place of seeming confinement. The young man was <b>prison</b> ed behind the doors.
reformatory	Tending to reform. <b>Reformatory</b> punishment.
<u>sinner</u>	A person who transgresses against divine law by committing an immoral act or acts. <i>God forgives repentant sinners.</i>
warrant	Officially affirm or guarantee. <i>We ll issue you with a travel <b>warrant</b>.</i>
