- *Clean and fresh as if new; spotless.*
- *Completely free from dirt or contamination.*

clean	Ritually clean or pure. <i>A clean test flight.</i>
<u>flawless</u>	Without a flaw. <i>A British accent that was almost flawless.</i>
fresh	(of the weather) rather cold and windy. <i>The memory was still fresh in their minds.</i>
<u>immaculate</u>	Uniformly coloured without spots or other marks. <i>An immaculate white suit.</i>
in mint condition	Currently fashionable.
in perfect condition	Currently fashionable.
new	Gratuitously new. <i>A new law.</i>

perfect

Of a tense denoting a completed action or a state or habitual action which began in the past The perfect tense is formed in English with have or has and the past participle as in they have eaten and they have been eating present perfect they had eaten past perfect and they will have eaten future perfect.

A **perfect** summer's day.

pure

Being chromatically pure not diluted with white or grey or black.
*I felt **pure** and sweet as a new baby.*

spotless

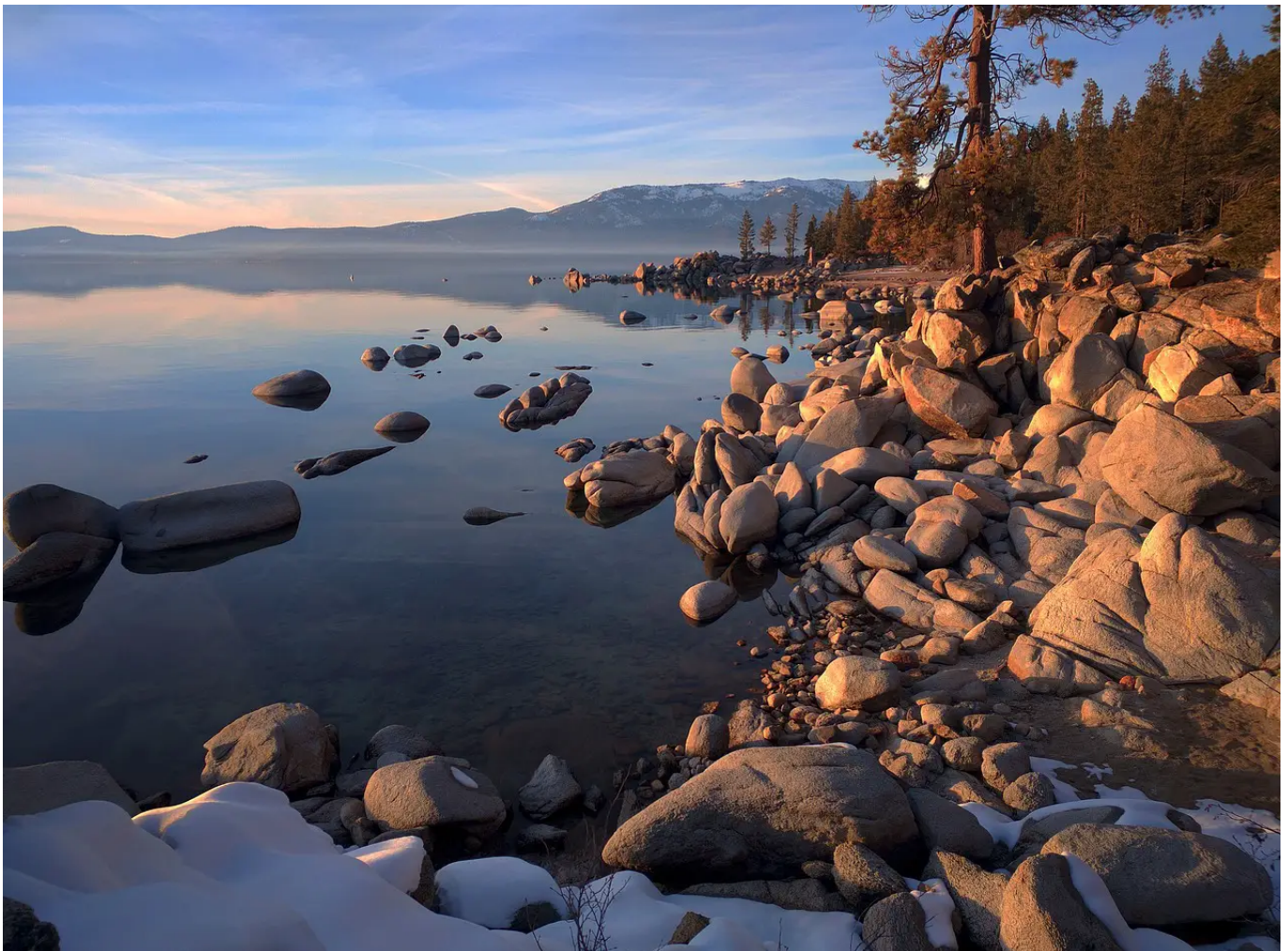
Without faults or moral blemishes; pure.
*A **spotless** white apron.*

unspoiled

Not spoiled, in particular (of a place) not marred by development.
*One of the best stretches of **unspoiled** coastline in the UK.*

unused

Not familiar with or accustomed to.
***Unused** to spicy food she took a long mouthful of water.*



Usage Examples of "Pristine" as an adjective

- *Pristine mountain snow.*
- *Pristine copies of an early magazine.*
- *A pristine white shirt.*
- *Handed her his pristine white handkerchief.*

acquit

Behave in a certain manner.
*The goalkeeper **acquitted** himself well.*

angel	A former English coin minted between the reigns of Edward IV and Charles I and bearing the figure of the archangel Michael killing a dragon. <i>You sang like an angel.</i>
blameless	Free of guilt; not subject to blame. <i>He led a blameless life.</i>
chastity	Abstaining from sexual relations (as because of religious vows). <i>Vows of chastity.</i>
cherub	A representation of a cherub in Western art depicted as a chubby healthy looking child with wings. <i>A wistful cherub of eighteen months photographed at her playgroup.</i>
clean	Make clean remove dirt marks or stains from. <i>He was knocked clean off his feet.</i>
downright	So direct in manner as to be blunt. <i>He was downright rude.</i>
exoneration	The act of vindicating or defending against criticism or censure etc. <i>The defendants eventual exoneration.</i>
<u>flawless</u>	Without any imperfections or defects; perfect. <i>A British accent that was almost flawless.</i>
guiltless	Free from evil or guilt. <i>People are forever criticizing the service and I am not myself guiltless in this.</i>
<u>harmless</u>	Not causing or capable of causing harm. <i>Harmless bacteria.</i>
impeccable	Without fault or error. <i>He had impeccable manners.</i>
innocence	The quality of innocent naivete. <i>They must prove their innocence.</i>
innocent	A person who lacks knowledge of evil. <i>American tourists wholly innocent of French.</i>
innocuous	Not causing disapproval. <i>Confined himself to innocuous generalities.</i>
inoffensive	Not objectionable or harmful. <i>A quiet inoffensive man.</i>
<u>irreproachable</u>	Free of guilt; not subject to blame. <i>His private life was irreproachable.</i>

naivete	Lack of sophistication or worldliness. <i>His greatest fault was his political naïvet.</i>
naturalness	The quality of being natural or based on natural principles. <i>The spontaneous naturalness of his manner.</i>
neat	Without water. <i>A neat sports car.</i>
profess	Teach a subject as a professor. <i>I don't profess to be an expert.</i>
<u>pure</u>	Of color being chromatically pure not diluted with white or grey or black. <i>80 pure bred stallions were on parade.</i>
purist	Someone who insists on great precision and correctness (especially in the use of words). <i>Purist fans of the original comic strip.</i>
<u>purity</u>	Freedom from immorality, especially of a sexual nature. <i>The purity of our drinking water.</i>
<u>sheer</u>	Cause to sheer. <i>She sheered her car around the obstacle.</i>
sinless	Free from sin. <i>The sinless life of Christ.</i>
unexceptionable	Completely acceptable; not open to exception or reproach. <i>A judge's ethics should be unexceptionable.</i>
unimpeachable	Not able to be doubted, questioned, or criticized; entirely trustworthy. <i>An unimpeachable reputation.</i>
unspoiled	Not decayed or decomposed. <i>One of the best stretches of unspoiled coastline in the UK.</i>
<u>virtuous</u>	Chaste (typically used of a woman). <i>She considered herself very virtuous because she neither drank nor smoked.</i>
