<b>flawless</b>	Without a flaw. <i>A British accent that was almost <b>flawless</b>.</i>
<b>fresh</b>	(of the weather) rather cold and windy. <i>The memory was still <b>fresh</b> in their minds.</i>
<b>immaculate</b>	Uniformly coloured without spots or other marks. <i>An <b>immaculate</b> white suit.</i>
<b>in mint condition</b>	Currently fashionable.
<b>in perfect condition</b>	Currently fashionable.
<b>new</b>	Gratuitously new. <i>A <b>new</b> law.</i>

Of a tense denoting a completed action or a state or habitual action which began in the past The perfect tense is formed in English with have or has and the past participle as in they have eaten and they have been eating present perfect they had eaten past perfect and they will have eaten future perfect.

A **perfect** summer s day.

**pure**

Being chromatically pure not diluted with white or grey or black. I felt **pure** and sweet as a new baby.

**spotless**

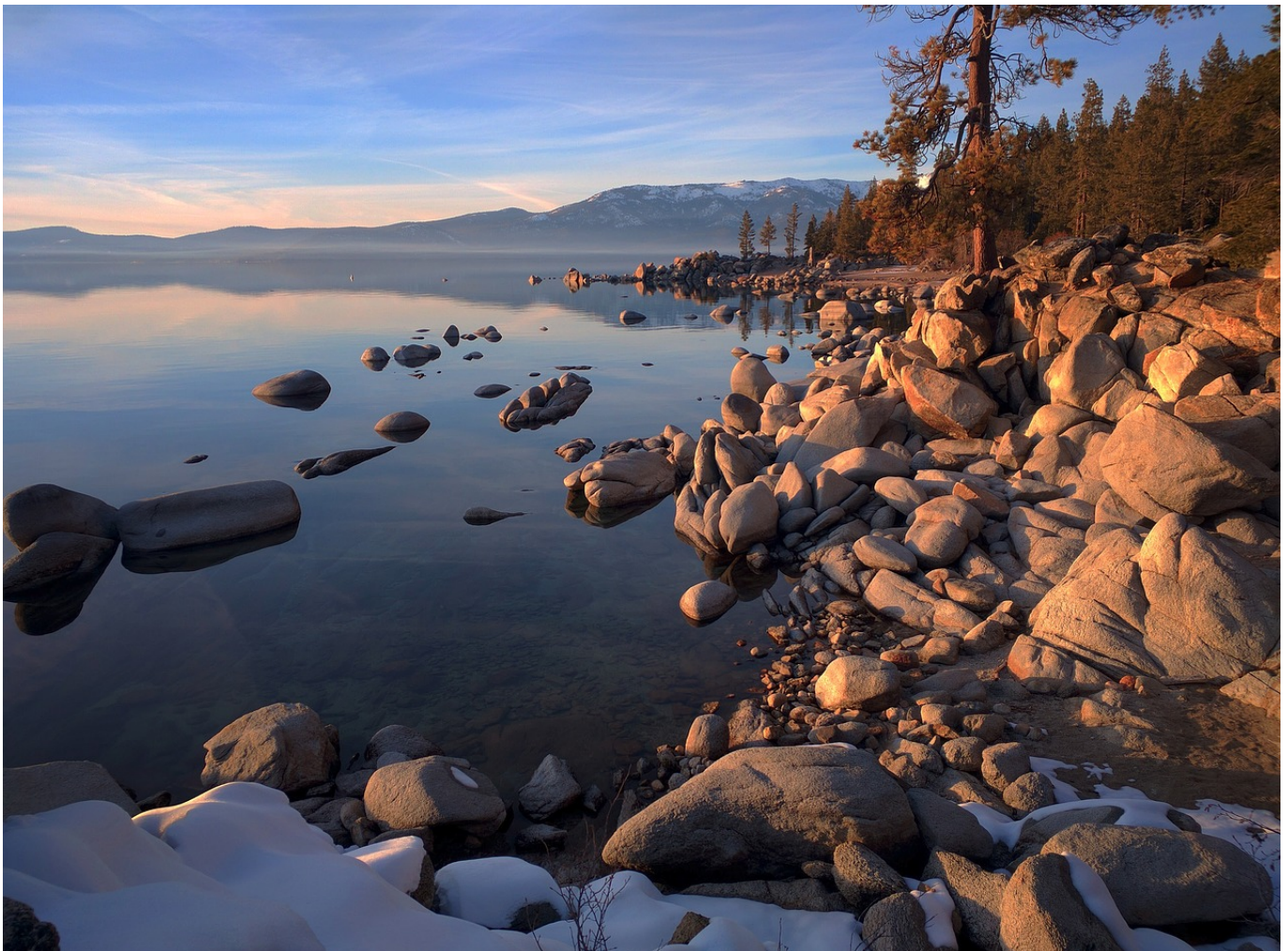
Without faults or moral blemishes; pure. A **spotless** white apron.

**unspoiled**

Not spoiled, in particular (of a place) not marred by development. One of the best stretches of **unspoiled** coastline in the UK.

**unused**

Not familiar with or accustomed to. **Unused** to spicy food she took a long mouthful of water.

Behave in a certain manner.  
*The goalkeeper **acquitted** himself well.*

<b>angel</b>	A former English coin minted between the reigns of Edward IV and Charles I and bearing the figure of the archangel Michael killing a dragon. <i>You sang like an <b>angel</b>.</i>
<b>blameless</b>	Free of guilt; not subject to blame. <i>He led a <b>blameless</b> life.</i>
<b>chastity</b>	Abstaining from sexual relations (as because of religious vows). <i>Vows of <b>chastity</b>.</i>
<b>cherub</b>	A representation of a cherub in Western art depicted as a chubby healthy looking child with wings. <i>A wistful <b>cherub</b> of eighteen months photographed at her playgroup.</i>
<b>clean</b>	Make clean remove dirt marks or stains from. <i>He was knocked <b>clean</b> off his feet.</i>
<b>downright</b>	So direct in manner as to be blunt. <i>He was <b>downright</b> rude.</i>
<b>exoneration</b>	The act of vindicating or defending against criticism or censure etc. <i>The defendants eventual <b>exoneration</b>.</i>
<b><u>flawless</u></b>	Without any imperfections or defects; perfect. <i>A British accent that was almost <b>flawless</b>.</i>
<b>guiltless</b>	Free from evil or guilt. <i>People are forever criticizing the service and I am not myself <b>guiltless</b> in this.</i>
<b><u>harmless</u></b>	Not causing or capable of causing harm. <i><b>Harmless</b> bacteria.</i>
<b>impeccable</b>	Without fault or error. <i>He had <b>impeccable</b> manners.</i>
<b>innocence</b>	The quality of innocent naivete. <i>They must prove their <b>innocence</b>.</i>
<b>innocent</b>	A person who lacks knowledge of evil. <i>American tourists wholly <b>innocent</b> of French.</i>
<b>innocuous</b>	Not causing disapproval. <i>Confined himself to <b>innocuous</b> generalities.</i>
<b>inoffensive</b>	Not objectionable or harmful. <i>A quiet <b>inoffensive</b> man.</i>
<b><u>irreproachable</u></b>	Free of guilt; not subject to blame. <i>His private life was <b>irreproachable</b>.</i>

<b>naivete</b>	Lack of sophistication or worldliness. <i>His greatest fault was his political naïvet.</i>
<b>naturalness</b>	The quality of being natural or based on natural principles. <i>The spontaneous <b>naturalness</b> of his manner.</i>
<b>neat</b>	Without water. <i>A <b>neat</b> sports car.</i>
<b>profess</b>	Teach a subject as a professor. <i>I don't <b>profess</b> to be an expert.</i>
<b><u>pure</u></b>	Of color being chromatically pure not diluted with white or grey or black. <i>80 <b>pure</b> bred stallions were on parade.</i>
<b>purist</b>	Someone who insists on great precision and correctness (especially in the use of words). <i><b>Purist</b> fans of the original comic strip.</i>
<b><u>purity</u></b>	Freedom from immorality, especially of a sexual nature. <i>The <b>purity</b> of our drinking water.</i>
<b><u>sheer</u></b>	Cause to sheer. <i>She <b>sheered</b> her car around the obstacle.</i>
<b>sinless</b>	Free from sin. <i>The <b>sinless</b> life of Christ.</i>
<b>unexceptionable</b>	Completely acceptable; not open to exception or reproach. <i>A judge's ethics should be <b>unexceptionable</b>.</i>
<b>unimpeachable</b>	Not able to be doubted, questioned, or criticized; entirely trustworthy. <i>An <b>unimpeachable</b> reputation.</i>
<b>unspoiled</b>	Not decayed or decomposed. <i>One of the best stretches of <b>unspoiled</b> coastline in the UK.</i>
<b><u>virtuous</u></b>	Chaste (typically used of a woman). <i>She considered herself very <b>virtuous</b> because she neither drank nor smoked.</i>
