- *The state of being free from public attention.*
- *The quality of being secluded from the presence or view of others.*
- *The condition of being concealed or hidden.*



Synonyms of "Privacy" as a noun (14 Words)

concealment	The action of hiding something or preventing it from being known. <i>The concealment of the weapons.</i>
freedom from interference	Immunity from an obligation or duty.
isolation	A defense mechanism in which memory of an unacceptable act or impulse is separated from the emotion originally associated with it. <i>He opposed a policy of American isolation.</i>
lack of disturbance	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
lack of interruption	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
peace	A treaty agreeing peace between warring states. <i>Support for a negotiated peace.</i>
peace and quiet	The absence of mental stress or anxiety.

peacefulness

The absence of mental stress or anxiety.

privateness

The quality of being secluded from the presence or view of others.

quietness

A state of peace and quiet.

*A voice disturbed the **quietness** of the night.*

retirement

The period of time during which a jury decides their verdict.

*A three hour **retirement**.*

seclusion

The state of being private and away from other people.

*They enjoyed ten days of peace and **seclusion**.*

secrecy

The action of keeping something secret or the state of being kept secret.

*The bidding is conducted in **secrecy**.*

solitude

A lonely or uninhabited place.

*She savoured her few hours of freedom and **solitude**.*



Usage Examples of "Privacy" as a noun

- *She returned to the privacy of her own home.*

- A law to restrict newspapers' freedom to invade people's privacy.



Associations of "Privacy" (30 Words)

alone	Exclusive of anyone or anything else. <i>Cannot live by bread alone.</i>
clandestine	Kept secret or done secretly, especially because illicit. <i>Clandestine intelligence operations.</i>
cloistered	Enclosed by or having a cloister. <i>A cloistered upbringing.</i>
<u>forlorn</u>	Pitifully sad and abandoned or lonely. <i>The last forlorn attempt.</i>
<u>hermit</u>	A person living in solitude as a religious discipline.
hide	Prevent from being seen or discovered. <i>Juliet's first instinct was to hide under the blankets.</i>

individual	Characteristic of or meant for a single person or thing. <i>She creates her own highly individual landscapes.</i>
isolate	A person or thing that has been or become isolated. <i>The chemist managed to isolate the compound.</i>
isolated	Being or feeling set or kept apart from others- Sherwood Anderson. <i>He lived a very isolated existence.</i>
<u>isolation</u>	The act of isolating something; setting something apart from others. <i>He opposed a policy of American isolation.</i>
<u>lone</u>	(of a place) unfrequented and remote. <i>A lonely existence.</i>
loneliness	The fact of being without companions; solitariness. <i>The loneliness of the farm.</i>
lonely	Without companions; solitary. <i>Felt sad and lonely.</i>
lonesome	Being the only one; single and isolated from others. <i>She felt lonesome and out of things.</i>
personal	Existing as a self aware entity not as an abstraction or an impersonal force. <i>A personal God.</i>
<u>recluse</u>	Favouring a solitary life. <i>He s a bit of a recluse.</i>
<u>remote</u>	A remote control device. <i>A remote possibility.</i>
seclude	Keep away from others. <i>I secluded myself up here for a life of study and meditation.</i>
<u>secluded</u>	(of a place) not seen or visited by many people; sheltered and private. <i>A secluded romantic spot.</i>
seclusion	A sheltered or private place. <i>They enjoyed ten days of peace and seclusion.</i>
<u>secrecy</u>	The condition of being concealed or hidden. <i>The bidding is conducted in secrecy.</i>
<u>sequester</u>	Isolate or hide away. <i>The cations were sequestered.</i>
<u>sole</u>	Put a new sole on to a shoe. <i>The sole example.</i>
<u>solitary</u>	Being the only one; single and isolated from others. <i>I live a pretty solitary life.</i>

- solitude** The state or situation of being alone.
*She savoured her few hours of freedom and **solitude**.*
- troglodyte** One who lives in solitude.
Not likely to be rewarded.
- unappreciated** *She had been brought up in a family where she felt **unappreciated** and undervalued.*
- unrewarding** Not rewarding or satisfying.
*It was dull **unrewarding** work.*
- unsung** Having value that is not acknowledged.
***Unsung** heroes of the war.*
- withdrawn** Withdrawn from society seeking solitude.
*When her husband died she became very **withdrawn**.*
