## Probability as a Noun

### Definitions of "Probability" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “probability” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The quality or state of being probable; the extent to which something is likely to happen or be the case.*
- *The quality of being probable; a probable event or the most probable event.*
- *A probable or the most probable event.*
- *A measure of how likely it is that some event will occur; a number expressing the ratio of favorable cases to the whole number of cases possible.*
- *The extent to which an event is likely to occur, measured by the ratio of the favourable cases to the whole number of cases possible.*



## Synonyms of "Probability" as a noun (11 Words)

<b>chance</b>	The possibility of future success. <i>Now is your <b>chance</b>.</i>
<b>chances</b>	A measure of how likely it is that some event will occur; a number expressing the ratio of favorable cases to the whole number of cases possible. <i>If that phone call is for me <b>chances</b> are it s my wife.</i>
<b>expectation</b>	The sum of the values of a random variable divided by the number of values. <i>Students had high <b>expectations</b> for their future.</i>
<b>fair bet</b>	Gathering of producers to promote business.
<b>good bet</b>	Benefit.

<b>likelihood</b>	The probability of a specified outcome. <i>Situations where there is a <b>likelihood</b> of violence.</i>
<b>likeliness</b>	The probability of a specified outcome.
<b>odds</b>	The ratio between the amounts staked by the parties to a bet, based on the expected probability either way. <i>He offered <b>odds</b> of two to one.</i>
<b>possibility</b>	A possible alternative. <i>There is a <b>possibility</b> that his sense of smell has been impaired.</i>
<b>probable event</b>	An applicant likely to be chosen.
<b>prospect</b>	An extensive view of landscape. <i>Norwich's unbeaten heavyweight <b>prospect</b>.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Probability" as a noun

- *For a time revolution was a strong probability.*
- *The probability that an unbiased coin will fall with the head up is 0.5.*
- *Going by past experience there was a high probability that the visitors were lost.*

- *For a while mutiny seemed a probability.*
- *A probability of 0.5.*
- *The rain will make the probability of a postponement even greater.*
- *The area under the curve represents probability.*



## Associations of "Probability" (30 Words)

<b>allocation</b>	The action or process of allocating or sharing out something. <i>Unclaimed <b>allocations</b> would be held for three years.</i>
<b>bound</b>	Move forward by leaps and bounds. <i>He is <b>bound</b> in the belly.</i>
<b>chance</b>	Be the case by chance. <i>A <b>chance</b> meeting.</i>
<b>connection</b>	A person who is influential and to whom you are connected in some way (as by family or friendship). <i>He soldered the <b>connection</b>.</i>

<b>demographic</b>	A particular sector of a population. <i>The drink is popular with a young <b>demographic</b>.</i>
<b>econometrics</b>	The branch of economics concerned with the use of mathematical methods (especially statistics) in describing economic systems.
<b>fluke</b>	Parasitic flatworms having external suckers for attaching to a host. <i>Their victory was a bit of a <b>fluke</b>.</i>
<b>hundred</b>	Ten 10s. <i>Wantage <b>Hundred</b>.</i>
<b>likelihood</b>	The state or fact of something's being likely; probability. <i>Young people who can see no <b>likelihood</b> of finding employment.</i>
<b>likely</b>	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>She is <b>likely</b> to forget.</i>
<b>measurement</b>	A unit or system of measuring. <i>Accurate <b>measurement</b> is essential.</i>
<b>number</b>	Place a limit on the number of. <i>Think of a <b>number</b> from one to ten and multiply it by three.</i>
<b>odds</b>	The ratio by which one better's wager is greater than that of another. <i>The <b>odds</b> against this ever happening are high.</i>
<b>opportune</b>	Suitable or at a time that is suitable or advantageous especially for a particular purpose. <i>The <b>opportune</b> use of humour to lower tension.</i>
<b>opportunity</b>	A chance for employment or promotion. <i>The holiday gave us the <b>opportunity</b> to visit Washington.</i>
<b>percent</b>	A proportion in relation to a whole (which is usually the amount per hundred).
<b>percentage</b>	An amount, such as an allowance or commission, that is a proportion of a larger sum of money. <i>I don't see the <b>percentage</b> in selling perfectly good furniture.</i>
<b>plausible</b>	Apparently reasonable and valid, and truthful. <i>A <b>plausible</b> explanation.</i>
<b>possibility</b>	A future prospect or potential. <i>There was the <b>possibility</b> that he might be turned down.</i>
<b>possible</b>	The highest possible score especially in a shooting competition. <i>I'd like the report this afternoon if <b>possible</b>.</i>
<b>potential</b>	The difference in electrical charge between two points in a circuit expressed in volts. <i>A change in gravitational <b>potential</b>.</i>

<b>potentiality</b>	Latent qualities or abilities that may be developed and lead to future success or usefulness. <i>The technology is still relatively not well known in spite of its great <b>potentiality</b>.</i>
<b>presumable</b>	Capable of being inferred on slight grounds.
<b>presumptive</b>	Having a reasonable basis for belief or acceptance. <i>A strong <b>presumptive</b> case is made out.</i>
<b><u>probable</u></b>	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>The <b>probable</b> consequences of going ahead with the scheme.</i>
<b><u>probably</u></b>	With considerable certainty; without much doubt. <i>He is <b>probably</b> out of the country.</i>
<b>prospect</b>	Belief about (or mental picture of) the future. <i>A viewpoint commanding a magnificent <b>prospect</b> of the estuary.</i>
<b>relation</b>	Mutual dealings or connections among persons or groups. <i>The improvement in <b>relations</b> between the two countries.</i>
<b>statistic</b>	A fact or piece of data obtained from a study of a large quantity of numerical data. <i>The <b>statistics</b> show that the crime rate has increased.</i>
<b><u>survey</u></b>	Make a survey of for statistical purposes. <i>The investigator <b>surveyed</b> the attitudes and beliefs held by residents.</i>
