Definitions of "Probable" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “probable” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Apparently destined.*
- *Likely but not certain to be or become true or real.*
- *Likely to happen or be the case.*



Synonyms of "Probable" as an adjective (12 Words)

anticipated	Expected hopefully.
credible	Credulous. <i>Completely credible testimony.</i>
expected	Considered likely or probable to happen or arrive. <i>The expected high temperatures are well above normal for this time of year.</i>
feasible	Likely; probable. <i>The most feasible explanation.</i>
foreseeable	Capable of being anticipated. <i>The situation is unlikely to change in the foreseeable future.</i>
likely	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>A likely topic for investigation.</i>
most likely	Quantifier meaning the greatest in number.
odds-on	Having a better than even chance of success.
possible	Having as much or as little of a specified quality as can be achieved. <i>It is possible that he will have to return to hospital.</i>
potential	Existing in possibility. <i>A potential problem.</i>

predictable Able to be predicted.
*The market is volatile and never **predictable**.*

ten to one Being one more than nine.



Usage Examples of "Probable" as an adjective

- *The probable consequences of going ahead with the scheme.*
- *It is probable that the economic situation will deteriorate further.*
- *The probable consequences of his action.*
- *He foresaw a probable loss.*



Associations of "Probable" (30 Words)

able

Having considerable skill proficiency or intelligence.
*Human beings are **able** to walk on two feet.*

arguable

Able to be argued or asserted.
*A highly **arguable** assumption.*

believable

Capable of being believed.
*A drama that lacks **believable** characters.*

bound

Headed or intending to head in a certain direction often used as a combining form as in college bound students.
*What he did was beyond the **bounds** of acceptable behavior.*

chance

Occurring or appearing or singled out by chance.
*I gave her a **chance** to answer.*

connection	(usually plural) a person who is influential and to whom you are connected in some way (as by family or friendship). <i>The plane was late and he missed his connection in Atlanta.</i>
credible	Appearing to merit belief or acceptance. <i>Few people found his story credible.</i>
likelihood	The state or fact of something's being likely; probability. <i>Young people who can see no likelihood of finding employment.</i>
likely	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>Likely candidates for the job.</i>
odds	The balance of advantage; superiority in strength, power, or resources. <i>He offered odds of two to one.</i>
opportunity	A time or set of circumstances that makes it possible to do something. <i>The night drive gave us the opportunity of spotting rhinos.</i>
percent	A proportion in relation to a whole (which is usually the amount per hundred).
percentage	Personal benefit or advantage. <i>I hope to be on a percentage.</i>
plausible	Apparently reasonable and credible, and therefore convincing. <i>It seems plausible that one of two things may happen.</i>
possibility	A thing that may be chosen or done out of several possible alternatives. <i>There is no possibility of any government achieving this level of expenditure.</i>
possible	The highest possible score especially in a shooting competition. <i>Possible uses of nuclear power.</i>
potential	Having or showing the capacity to develop into something in the future. <i>A campaign to woo potential customers.</i>
potentiality	Latent qualities or abilities that may be developed and lead to future success or usefulness. <i>The technology is still relatively not well known in spite of its great potentiality.</i>
presumable	Capable of being inferred on slight grounds.
presumptive	Giving grounds for the inference of a fact or of the appropriate interpretation of the law. <i>A strong presumptive case is made out.</i>
probability	The quality of being probable; a probable event or the most probable event. <i>For a time revolution was a strong probability.</i>

<u>probably</u>	Almost certainly; as far as one knows or can tell. <i>He is probably out of the country.</i>
prospect	The possibility or likelihood of some future event occurring. <i>Norwich s unbeaten heavyweight prospect.</i>
prospective	Likely to happen at a future date. <i>Prospective earnings.</i>
scientifically	In a way that relates to or is used in science. <i>Scientifically minded people.</i>
<u>seem</u>	Seem to be true probable or apparent. <i>I seem to remember giving you very precise instructions.</i>
<u>tend</u>	Have a tendency or disposition to do or be something be inclined. <i>The orbit tends to infinity.</i>
<u>tied</u>	(of aid or an international loan) given subject to the condition that it should be spent on goods or services from the donor or lender. <i>A neatly tied package.</i>
trammel	An adjustable pothook set in a fireplace. <i>We have no wish to be trammelled by convention.</i>
<u>volition</u>	The act of making a choice. <i>The exercise of their volition we construe as revolt.</i>
