## Probable as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Probable" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “probable” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Apparently destined.*
- *Likely but not certain to be or become true or real.*
- *Likely to happen or be the case.*



## Synonyms of "Probable" as an adjective (12 Words)

**anticipated** Expected hopefully.

**credible** Credulous.  
*Completely **credible** testimony.*

**expected** Considered likely or probable to happen or arrive.  
*The **expected** high temperatures are well above normal for this time of year.*

**feasible** Likely; probable.  
*The most **feasible** explanation.*

**foreseeable** Capable of being anticipated.  
*The situation is unlikely to change in the **foreseeable** future.*

**likely** Likely but not certain to be or become true or real.  
*A **likely** topic for investigation.*

**most likely** Quantifier meaning the greatest in number.

**odds-on** Having a better than even chance of success.

**possible** Having as much or as little of a specified quality as can be achieved.  
*It is **possible** that he will have to return to hospital.*

**potential** Existing in possibility.  
*A **potential** problem.*

**predictable** Able to be predicted.  
*The market is volatile and never **predictable**.*

**ten to one** Being one more than nine.



## Usage Examples of "Probable" as an adjective

- *The probable consequences of going ahead with the scheme.*
- *It is probable that the economic situation will deteriorate further.*
- *The probable consequences of his action.*
- *He foresaw a probable loss.*





## Associations of "Probable" (30 Words)

- able** Having considerable skill proficiency or intelligence.  
*Human beings are **able** to walk on two feet.*
- arguable** Able to be argued or asserted.  
*A highly **arguable** assumption.*
- believable** Capable of being believed.  
*A drama that lacks **believable** characters.*
- bound** Headed or intending to head in a certain direction often used as a combining form as in college bound students.  
*What he did was beyond the **bounds** of acceptable behavior.*
- chance** Occurring or appearing or singled out by chance.  
*I gave her a **chance** to answer.*

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| <b>connection</b>   | (usually plural) a person who is influential and to whom you are connected in some way (as by family or friendship).<br><i>The plane was late and he missed his <b>connection</b> in Atlanta.</i>    |
| <b>credible</b>     | Appearing to merit belief or acceptance.<br><i>Few people found his story <b>credible</b>.</i>   |
| <b>likelihood</b>   | The state or fact of something's being likely; probability.<br><i>Young people who can see no <b>likelihood</b> of finding employment.</i>   |
| <b>likely</b>       | Likely but not certain to be or become true or real.<br><i><b>Likely</b> candidates for the job.</i>   |
| <b>odds</b>         | The balance of advantage; superiority in strength, power, or resources.<br><i>He offered <b>odds</b> of two to one.</i>  |
| <b>opportunity</b>  | A time or set of circumstances that makes it possible to do something.<br><i>The night drive gave us the <b>opportunity</b> of spotting rhinos.</i>  |
| <b>percent</b>      | A proportion in relation to a whole (which is usually the amount per hundred).   |
| <b>percentage</b>   | Personal benefit or advantage.<br><i>I hope to be on a <b>percentage</b>.</i>  |
| <b>plausible</b>    | Apparently reasonable and credible, and therefore convincing.<br><i>It seems <b>plausible</b> that one of two things may happen.</i>   |
| <b>possibility</b>  | A thing that may be chosen or done out of several possible alternatives.<br><i>There is no <b>possibility</b> of any government achieving this level of expenditure.</i>                             |
| <b>possible</b>     | The highest possible score especially in a shooting competition.<br><i><b>Possible</b> uses of nuclear power.</i>  |
| <b>potential</b>    | Having or showing the capacity to develop into something in the future.<br><i>A campaign to woo <b>potential</b> customers.</i>  |
| <b>potentiality</b> | Latent qualities or abilities that may be developed and lead to future success or usefulness.<br><i>The technology is still relatively not well known in spite of its great <b>potentiality</b>.</i> |
| <b>presumable</b>   | Capable of being inferred on slight grounds.   |
| <b>presumptive</b>  | Giving grounds for the inference of a fact or of the appropriate interpretation of the law.<br><i>A strong <b>presumptive</b> case is made out.</i>  |
| <b>probability</b>  | The quality of being probable; a probable event or the most probable event.<br><i>For a time revolution was a strong <b>probability</b>.</i>   |

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| <b><u>probably</u></b> | Almost certainly; as far as one knows or can tell.<br><i>He is <b>probably</b> out of the country.</i>  |
| <b>prospect</b>        | The possibility or likelihood of some future event occurring.<br><i>Norwich's unbeaten heavyweight <b>prospect</b>.</i>   |
| <b>prospective</b>     | Likely to happen at a future date.<br><i><b>Prospective</b> earnings.</i>   |
| <b>scientifically</b>  | In a way that relates to or is used in science.<br><i><b>Scientifically</b> minded people.</i>  |
| <b><u>seem</u></b>     | Seem to be true probable or apparent.<br><i>I <b>seem</b> to remember giving you very precise instructions.</i>   |
| <b><u>tend</u></b>     | Have a tendency or disposition to do or be something be inclined.<br><i>The orbit <b>tends</b> to infinity.</i>   |
| <b><u>tied</u></b>     | (of aid or an international loan) given subject to the condition that it should be spent on goods or services from the donor or lender.<br><i>A neatly <b>tied</b> package.</i> |
| <b>trammel</b>         | An adjustable pothook set in a fireplace.<br><i>We have no wish to be <b>trammelled</b> by convention.</i>  |
| <b><u>volition</u></b> | The act of making a choice.<br><i>The exercise of their <b>volition</b> we construe as revolt.</i>  |
