Probably as an Adverb

Definitions of "Probably" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “probably” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *With considerable certainty; without much doubt.*
- *Easy to believe on the basis of available evidence.*
- *Almost certainly; as far as one knows or can tell.*

all things being equal	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’.
all things considered	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’.
<u>apparently</u>	From appearances alone. <i>I thought he owned the property but apparently not.</i>
as like as not	To the same degree (often followed by ‘as’.
as likely as not	To the same degree (often followed by ‘as’.
believably	Easy to believe on the basis of available evidence.
belike	In all likelihood; probably. <i>Some earnest business is afoot belike.</i>

credibly

In a believable and convincing way.
*He can also talk **credibly** about the details.*

doubtless

Without doubt; certainly.
*The company would **doubtless** find the reduced competition to their liking.*

in all likelihood

To or toward the inside of.

in all probability

To or toward the inside of.

likely

Probably.
*We will most **likely** go to a bar.*

maybe

Perhaps; possibly.
*He was standing **maybe** 20 or 30 feet away.*

most likely

Used to form the superlative.

no doubt

Referring to the degree to which a certain quality is present.

perhaps

Used to express uncertainty or possibility.
***Perhaps** not surprisingly he was cautious about committing himself.*

plausibly

In a way that seems reasonable or probable.
*Both candidates can **plausibly** claim victory is within their reach.*

possibly

In accordance with what is likely or achievable.
*What can you **possibly** mean.*

presumably

By reasonable assumption.
*It was not yet ten o'clock so **presumably** the boys were still at the pub.*

very likely

Precisely so.



Usage Examples of "Probably" as an adverb

- *'A bomb, do you think?' 'Probably.'*
- *He will probably win the election.*
- *She would probably never see him again.*
- *He is probably out of the country.*



Associations of "Probably" (30 Words)

able

Having considerable skill proficiency or intelligence.

*The dancers were technically very **able**.*

anyhow

Used to indicate that a statement explains or supports a previous statement.

*Two suitcases flung **anyhow**.*

anyway

Used to end a conversation, to change the subject, or to resume a subject after interruption.

*Nobody invited Miss Honey to sit down but she sat down **anyway**.*

bound

Headed or intending to head in a certain direction often used as a combining form as in college bound students.

*I went up the steps in two effortless **bounds**.*

chance

Occurring or appearing or singled out by chance.

*If that phone call is for me **chances** are it s my wife.*

<u>expected</u>	Regarded as likely; anticipated. <i>The expected high temperatures are well above normal for this time of year.</i>
<u>furthermore</u>	In addition; besides (used to introduce a fresh consideration in an argument). <i>Computer chess games are getting cheaper all the time furthermore their quality is improving.</i>
<u>likelihood</u>	The probability of a specified outcome. <i>Situations where there is a likelihood of violence.</i>
likely	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>Speculation on the likely effect of opting out.</i>
<u>maybe</u>	Perhaps; possibly. <i>Maybe I won t go back.</i>
<u>moreover</u>	In addition. <i>Moreover statistics show that competition for places is growing.</i>
opportunity	A possibility due to a favorable combination of circumstances. <i>The night drive gave us the opportunity of spotting rhinos.</i>
percent	A proportion in relation to a whole (which is usually the amount per hundred).
percentage	A rate, number, or amount in each hundred. <i>I hope to be on a percentage.</i>
perhaps	By chance. <i>Perhaps she will call tomorrow.</i>
plausible	(of a person) skilled at producing persuasive arguments, especially ones intended to deceive. <i>It seems plausible that one of two things may happen.</i>
possibility	Capability of existing or happening or being true. <i>There was the possibility that he might be turned down.</i>
<u>possible</u>	The highest possible score especially in a shooting competition. <i>Surely it s not possible for a man to live so long.</i>
<u>possibly</u>	Used to emphasize that someone has or will put all their effort into something. <i>What can you possibly mean.</i>
potential	The inherent capacity for coming into being. <i>Potential clients.</i>
potentiality	An aptitude that may be developed. <i>The technology is still relatively not well known in spite of its great potentiality.</i>

preferably	More readily or willingly. <i>Clean it well preferably with warm water.</i>
presumable	Capable of being inferred on slight grounds.
presumptive	Affording reasonable grounds for belief or acceptance. <i>The presumptive heir or heir apparent.</i>
<u>probability</u>	The quality or state of being probable; the extent to which something is likely to happen or be the case. <i>The probability that an unbiased coin will fall with the head up is 0.5.</i>
<u>probable</u>	An applicant likely to be chosen. <i>It is probable that the economic situation will deteriorate further.</i>
prospect	Search for; seek. <i>Clients deemed likely prospects for active party membership.</i>
really	Used as intensifiers <i>real</i> is sometimes used informally for <i>really</i> rattling is informal. <i>I think she is really great.</i>
<u>seem</u>	Seem to be true probable or apparent. <i>I seem to remember giving you very precise instructions.</i>
<u>whatever</u>	One or some or every or all without specification. <i>We told him we'd back him whatever.</i>
