maybe Perhaps; possibly.

He was standing **maybe** 20 or 30 feet away.

most likely Used to form the superlative.

no doubt Referring to the degree to which a certain quality is present.

Used to express uncertainty or possibility.

plausibly

In a way that seems reasonable or probable.

Both candidates can **plausibly** claim victory is within their reach.

In accordance with what is likely or achievable.

What can you **possibly** mean.

By reasonable assumption.

pub.

very likely Precisely so.
