<b>events</b>	A special set of circumstances. <i>He acted very wise after the event.</i>
<b>happenings</b>	An event that happens.
<b>lawsuit</b>	A claim or dispute brought to a law court for adjudication. <i>His lawyer filed a <b>lawsuit</b> against Los Angeles city.</i>
<b>litigation</b>	A legal proceeding in a court; a judicial contest to determine and enforce legal rights. <i>The company wishes to avoid <b>litigation</b>.</i>
<b>minutes</b>	A written account of what transpired at a meeting.
<b>proceeding</b>	The institution of a sequence of steps by which legal judgments are invoked.
<b>record</b>	Anything such as a document or a phonograph record or a photograph providing permanent evidence of or information about past events. <i>My favourite <b>record</b>.</i>
<b>records</b>	A document that can serve as legal evidence of a transaction. <i>Coffee production last year broke all previous <b>records</b>.</i>
<b>report</b>	An employee who reports to another employee. <i>He was a person of bad <b>report</b>.</i>
<b>reports</b>	A written document describing the findings of some individual or group. <i>He heard <b>reports</b> that they were causing trouble.</i>
<b>suit</b>	Slang a businessman dressed in a business suit. <i>A <b>suit</b> of armour.</i>
<b>transactions</b>	A written account of what transpired at a meeting.

<b>committal</b>	The burial of a dead body. <i><b>Committal</b> proceedings.</i>

<b>court</b>	A room in which a lawcourt sits. <i>Television cameras were admitted in the <b>courtroom</b>.</i>

<b>judicature</b>	The system of law courts that administer justice and constitute the judicial branch of government. <i>The constitutional principle that the legislature is separate from the <b>judicature</b>.</i>
<b>judicial</b>	Of, by, or appropriate to a law court or judge; relating to the administration of justice. <i>A <b>judicial</b> system.</i>
<b>judiciary</b>	Persons who administer justice. <i>The independence of the <b>judiciary</b>.</i>
<b>jurisdiction</b>	The territory or sphere of activity over which the legal authority of a court or other institution extends. <i>Several different tax <b>jurisdictions</b>.</i>
<b>juror</b>	A member of a jury.
<b>law</b>	An individual rule as part of a system of law. <i>He <b>d</b> never been in trouble with the <b>law</b> in his life.</i>
<b>lawyer</b>	Practise law work as a lawyer. <i>There is always a danger that the deal will be <b>lawyered</b> to death.</i>
<b>legal</b>	Relating to theological legalism. <i>A yellow <b>legal</b> pad.</i>
<b>legality</b>	Obligations imposed by law. <i>Documentation testifying to the <b>legality</b> of the arms sale.</i>
<b>litigation</b>	A legal proceeding in a court; a judicial contest to determine and enforce legal rights. <i>The company wishes to avoid <b>litigation</b>.</i>
<b>magistracy</b>	The office or authority of a magistrate. <i>He twice ran for a <b>magistracy</b> in his home town.</i>

<b>probate</b>	The official proving of a will. <i>The house has been valued for <b>probate</b>.</i>
<b>procedure</b>	A series of actions conducted in a certain order or manner. <i>Parliamentary <b>procedure</b>.</i>
<b><u>progression</u></b>	A number of things in a series. <i>Good opportunities for career <b>progression</b>.</i>
<b>protocol</b>	The original draft of a diplomatic document, especially of the terms of a treaty agreed to in conference and signed by the parties. <i>A study <b>protocol</b> approved by the ethics committee of the hospital.</i>
<b>reexamination</b>	(law) questioning of a witness by the party that called the witness after that witness has been subject to cross-examination.
<b>regularize</b>	Establish (a hitherto temporary or provisional arrangement) on an official basis. <i>An electrical implant to <b>regularize</b> the heartbeat.</i>
<b>step</b>	Move or proceed as if by steps into a new situation. <i><b>Step</b> lively.</i>
<b>systematize</b>	Arrange according to a system or reduce to a system. <i><b>Systematize</b> our scientific knowledge.</i>
<b><u>trial</u></b>	Of a horse dog or other animal compete in trials. <i>He cracked his ankle the week before the final <b>trial</b>.</i>
<b>tribunal</b>	A court of justice. <i>An international war crimes <b>tribunal</b>.</i>
<b>wanted</b>	Characterized by feeling or showing fond affection for. <i>A <b>wanted</b> poster.</i>
