Publicize information about (a vacancy).

*Some prisoners **advertised** the French of this terrible danger.*

### announce

Announce publicly or officially.

*I have a confession to make she **announced**.*

### betray

Deliver to an enemy by treachery.

*Many of those employed by diplomats **betrayed** secrets.*

### bill

Send a bill to someone.

*We were **billed** for 4 nights in the hotel although we stayed only 3 nights.*

### blaze

Indicate by marking trees with blazes.

*He **blazed** a drive into the rough.*

### blazon

Display prominently or vividly.

*They saw their company name **blazoned** all over the media.*

### broadcast

Broadcast over the airwaves as in radio or television.

*They regularly **broadcast** on Radio 2.*

### call attention to

Greet, as with a prescribed form, title, or name.

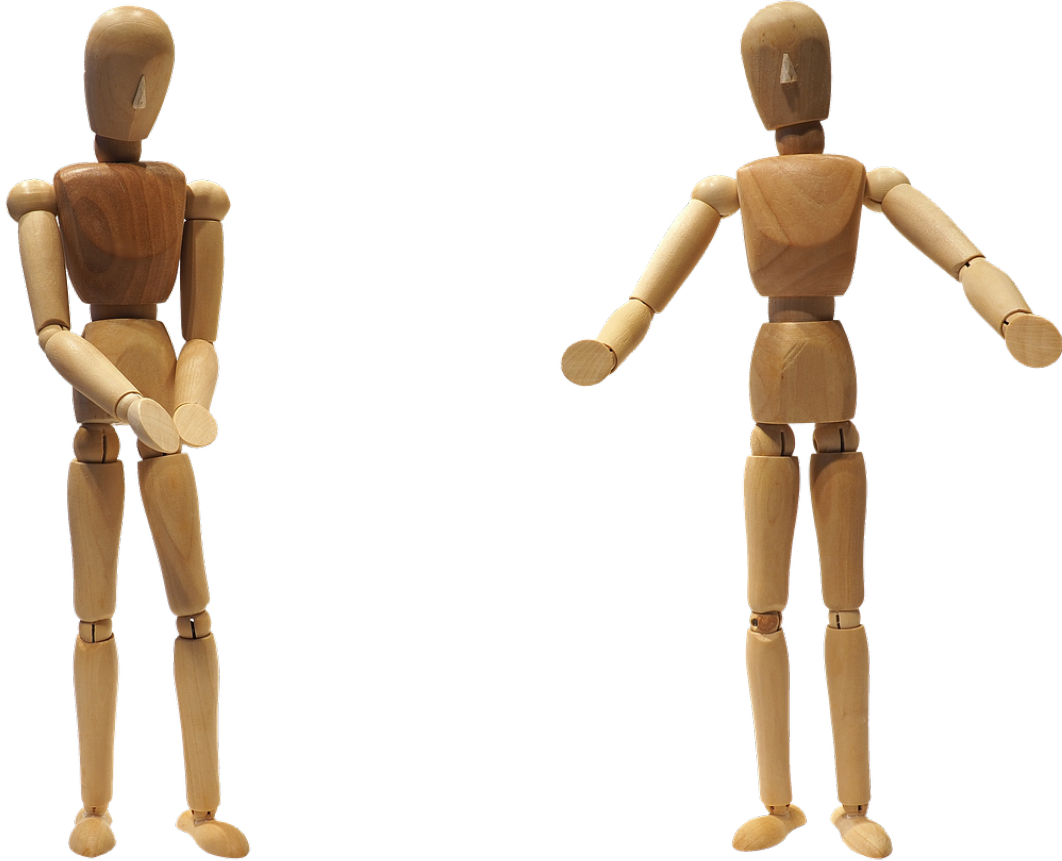
Declare to be.

### declare

*A number of interested parties who can't **declare** themselves openly.*

<b>demonstrate</b>	Give an exhibition of to an interested audience. <i>Computerized design methods will be <b>demonstrated</b>.</i>
<b>exalt</b>	Heighten or intensify. <i>This naturally <b>exalts</b> the peasant above his brethren in the same rank of society.</i>
<b>exclaim</b>	Cry out suddenly in surprise, strong emotion, or pain. <i>I am not a Communist he <b>exclaimed</b>.</i>
<b>extol</b>	Praise, glorify, or honor. <i><b>Extol</b> the virtues of one s children.</i>
<b>give notice of</b>	Execute and deliver.
<b>give out</b>	Inflict as a punishment.
<b>give publicity to</b>	Dedicate.
<b>glorify</b>	Praise glorify or honor. <i><b>Glorify</b> one s spouse s cooking.</i>
<b>indicate</b>	Indicate a place direction person or thing either spatially or figuratively. <i>Tetracycline is <b>indicated</b> in such cases.</i>
<b>laud</b>	Praise, glorify, or honor. <i>The obituary <b>lauded</b> him as a great statesman and soldier.</i>
<b>make known</b>	Act in a certain way so as to acquire.
<b>make public</b>	Prepare for eating by applying heat.
<b>manifest</b>	Record in a ship s manifest. <i>The ghost <b>manifests</b> each year on the same day.</i>
<b>post</b>	Assign to a post put into a post. <i>The company <b>posted</b> the news on its blog yesterday.</i>
<b>predicate</b>	Make the grammatical predicate in a proposition. <i>Aggression is <b>predicated</b> of those who act aggressively.</i>
<b>promulgate</b>	Put a law into effect by formal declaration. <i>In January 1852 the new Constitution was <b>promulgated</b>.</i>
<b>pronounce</b>	Speak pronounce or utter in a certain way. <i>The Secretary of State will shortly <b>pronounce</b> on alternative measures.</i>
<b>publicize</b>	Call attention to. <i>Use the magazine to <b>publicize</b> human rights abuses.</i>
<b>publish</b>	Prepare and issue the work of (a particular writer). <i>We <b>publish</b> practical reference books.</i>

<b>reveal</b>	Make (something) known to humans by divine or supernatural means. <i>The truth <b>revealed</b> at the Incarnation.</i>
<b>say</b>	Utter the whole of (a speech or other set of words, typically one learned in advance). <i>The padre finished <b>saying</b> the Nunc Dimittis.</i>
<b>shout from the rooftops</b>	Utter aloud; often with surprise, horror, or joy.
<b>shout something from the rooftops</b>	Utter in a loud voice; talk in a loud voice (usually denoting characteristic manner of speaking).
<b>show</b>	Show in or as in a picture. <i><b>Showing</b> a large dog is not always easy.</i>
<b>signify</b>	Be a symbol of; have as meaning. <i>What does his strange behavior <b>signify</b>.</i>
<b>speak</b>	(of a musical instrument or other object) make a sound when functioning. <i>They <b>speak</b> a strange dialect.</i>
<b>state</b>	Express in words. <i>Money hasn't changed me she <b>stated</b> firmly.</i>
<b>testify to</b>	Give testimony in a court of law.
<b>trumpet</b>	Make a loud penetrating sound resembling that of a trumpet. <i>A jazz band <b>trumpeted</b> on the stage behind and the kids danced until dark.</i>
<b>utter</b>	Express audibly utter sounds not necessarily words. <i>He <b>uttered</b> a curse.</i>
<b>voice</b>	Give voice to. <i>Get teachers to <b>voice</b> their opinions on important subjects.</i>

- *He was proclaimed King.*
- *The King will proclaim an amnesty.*
- *The government's chief scientific adviser proclaimed that the epidemic was under control.*

- *His high, intelligent forehead proclaimed a strength of mind that was almost tangible.*
- *He had a rolling gait that proclaimed him a man of the sea.*
- *She proclaimed that what I had said was untrue.*

*He refused to take the oath but chose simply to **affirm** on being admitted to the Privy Council.*
- announce** Make known make an announcement.  
*The President's office **announced** that the siege would be lifted.*
- announcement** The action of making an announcement.  
*The **announcement** appeared in the local newspaper.*

<b>annunciation</b>	A festival commemorating the announcement of the Incarnation by the angel Gabriel to the Virgin Mary; a quarter day in England, Wales, and Ireland. <i>The <b>annunciation</b> of a set of rules applying to the relationships between states.</i>
<b>asserting</b>	Relating to the use of or having the nature of a declaration.
<b>assertion</b>	A declaration that is made emphatically (as if no supporting evidence were necessary). <i>The <b>assertion</b> of his legal rights.</i>
<b><u>clamor</u></b>	Compel someone to do something by insistent clamoring. <i>He ignored the <b>clamor</b> of the crowd.</i>
<b>communicue</b>	An official report (usually sent in haste).
<b>declamation</b>	Vehement oratory. <i>Lines written for a school <b>declamation</b>.</i>
<b><u>declaration</u></b>	An affirmation made in place of an oath. <i>His <b>declaration</b> of innocence.</i>
<b>declarative</b>	Relating to the mood of verbs that is used simple in declarative statements. <i><b>Declarative</b> statements.</i>
<b>declaratory</b>	Having the function of declaring or explaining something. <i>A <b>declaratory</b> ruling in favour of the applicants.</i>
<b><u>declare</u></b>	Declare to be. <i>He <b>declared</b> that he was innocent.</i>
<b>emancipation</b>	The fact or process of being set free from legal, social, or political restrictions; liberation. <i>The early struggle for <b>emancipation</b> from slavery.</i>
<b><u>exclaim</u></b>	Utter aloud; often with surprise, horror, or joy. <i>I am not a Communist he <b>exclaimed</b>.</i>
<b><u>herald</u></b>	Acclaim. <i>The band have been <b>heralded</b> as the great hope for the nineties.</i>
<b><u>manifesto</u></b>	A public declaration of policy and aims, especially one issued before an election by a political party or candidate. <i>He may fudge key issues in the Labour <b>manifesto</b>.</i>
<b>news</b>	Information reported in a newspaper or news magazine. <i>He was back in the <b>news</b> again.</i>
<b>notification</b>	A request for payment. <i>We have yet to receive formal <b>notification</b> of the announcement.</i>

<b>outcry</b>	Utter aloud; often with surprise, horror, or joy. <i>An <b>outcry</b> of spontaneous passion.</i>
<b>predicate</b>	What is predicated of the subject of a proposition the second term in a proposition is predicated of the first term by means of the copula. <i>The Pleistocene colonization of Tasmania has long been <b>predicated</b>.</i>
<b>proclamation</b>	The public or official announcement of an important matter. <i>The government restricted the use of water by <b>proclamation</b>.</i>
<b>profess</b>	Practice as a profession teach or claim to be knowledgeable about. <i>I don t <b>profess</b> to be an expert.</i>
<b>promulgate</b>	Put a law into effect by formal declaration. <i>In January 1852 the new Constitution was <b>promulgated</b>.</i>
<b>promulgation</b>	A public statement containing information about an event that has happened or is going to happen. <i>His <b>promulgation</b> of the policy proved to be premature.</i>
<b>pronouncement</b>	An authoritative declaration. <i>Distrust of the <b>pronouncements</b> of politicians was endemic.</i>
<b>statement</b>	An official account of facts, views, or plans, especially one for release to the media. <i>She made a <b>statement</b> to the police.</i>
<b>verb</b>	Use a word that is not conventionally used as a verb typically a noun as a verb. <i>Any English noun can be <b>verbed</b> but some are more resistant than others.</i>
<b>wow</b>	A sensational success. <i>They <b>wowed</b> audiences on their recent British tour.</i>
