## Associations of "Proclaimed" (30 Words)

<b><u>affirm</u></b>	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>They <b>affirmed</b> that policies were to be judged by their contribution to social justice.</i>
<b>announce</b>	Make known make an announcement. <i>He <b>announced</b> the winners of the spelling bee.</i>
<b>announcement</b>	The action of making an announcement. <i>The government made an <b>announcement</b> about changes in the drug war.</i>
<b>annunciation</b>	(Christianity) the announcement to the Virgin Mary by the angel Gabriel of the incarnation of Christ. <i>The <b>annunciation</b> of a set of rules applying to the relationships between states.</i>
<b>asserting</b>	Relating to the use of or having the nature of a declaration.
<b>assertion</b>	A confident and forceful statement of fact or belief. <i>The <b>assertion</b> of his legal rights.</i>
<b><u>clamor</u></b>	Compel someone to do something by insistent clamoring. <i>They <b>clamored</b> the mayor into building a new park.</i>
<b>communicue</b>	An official report (usually sent in haste).

<b>declamation</b>	The action or art of declaiming. <i>Lines written for a school <b>declamation</b>.</i>
<b><u>declaration</u></b>	A statement that is emphatic and explicit (spoken or written). <i>All students must sign the following <b>declaration</b>.</i>
<b>declarative</b>	Relating to the mood of verbs that is used simple in declarative statements. <b>Declarative</b> statements.
<b>declaratory</b>	Having the function of declaring or explaining something. <i>The decision was <b>declaratory</b> of the law.</i>
<b><u>declare</u></b>	Declare to be. <i>She waited in vain for him to <b>declare</b> himself.</i>
<b>emancipation</b>	Freeing someone from the control of another; especially a parent's relinquishing authority and control over a minor child. <i>The early struggle for <b>emancipation</b> from slavery.</i>
<b><u>exclaim</u></b>	State or announce. <i>She looked in the mirror <b>exclaiming</b> in dismay at her appearance.</i>
<b><u>herald</u></b>	A person or thing viewed as a sign that something is about to happen. <i>The chieftain had a <b>herald</b> who announced his arrival with a trumpet.</i>
<b><u>manifesto</u></b>	A public declaration of intentions (as issued by a political party or government). <i>He may fudge key issues in the Labour <b>manifesto</b>.</i>
<b>news</b>	The quality of being sufficiently interesting to be reported in news bulletins. <i>He was back in the <b>news</b> again.</i>
<b>notification</b>	The action of notifying someone or something. <i>We have yet to receive formal <b>notification</b> of the announcement.</i>
<b>outcry</b>	A strong expression of public disapproval or anger. <i>The public <b>outcry</b> over the bombing.</i>
<b><u>predicate</u></b>	What is predicated of the subject of a proposition the second term in a proposition is predicated of the first term by means of the copula. <i>The theory of structure on which later chemistry was <b>predicated</b>.</i>
<b><u>proclamation</u></b>	A public or official announcement dealing with a matter of great importance. <i>The government restricted the use of water by <b>proclamation</b>.</i>
<b>profess</b>	Practice as a profession teach or claim to be knowledgeable about. <i>He <b>professed</b> himself amazed at the boy's ability.</i>
<b>promulgate</b>	Put a law into effect by formal declaration. <i>These objectives have to be <b>promulgated</b> within the organization.</i>

- promulgation** A public statement containing information about an event that has happened or is going to happen.  
*His **promulgation** of the policy proved to be premature.*
- pronouncement** An authoritative declaration.  
*Distrust of the **pronouncements** of politicians was endemic.*
- statement** A line of code written as part of a computer program.  
*According to his **statement** he was in London on that day.*
- verb** Use a word that is not conventionally used as a verb typically a noun as a verb.  
*Any English noun can be **verbed** but some are more resistant than others.*
