### Definitions of "Profession" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “profession” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The body of people in a learned occupation.*
- *A declaration of belief in a religion.*
- *A body of people engaged in a particular profession.*
- *The ceremony or fact of being professed in a religious order.*
- *A paid occupation, especially one that involves prolonged training and a formal qualification.*
- *An occupation requiring special education (especially in the liberal arts or sciences).*
- *An open avowal (true or false) of some belief or opinion.*
- *Affirmation of acceptance of some religion or faith.*
- *An act of declaring that one has a particular feeling or quality, especially when this is not the case.*
- *The declaration or vows made on entering a religious order.*



## Synonyms of "Profession" as a noun (22 Words)

### **affidavit**

Written declaration made under oath; a written statement sworn to be true before someone legally authorized to administer an oath.  
*A former employee swore an **affidavit** relating to his claim for unfair dismissal.*

### **affirmation**

A statement asserting the existence or the truth of something.  
*He nodded in **affirmation**.*

### **allegation**

Statements affirming or denying certain matters of fact that you are prepared to prove.  
*He made **allegations** of corruption against the administration.*

### **announcement**

The action of making an announcement.  
*An **announcement** is appearing in the Morning Post tomorrow.*

<b>assertion</b>	A declaration that is made emphatically (as if no supporting evidence were necessary). <i>His <b>assertion</b> that his father had deserted the family.</i>
<b>attestation</b>	The action of bearing witness. <i>Your signature on this application will serve as your <b>attestation</b> that the information contained above is true and accurate.</i>
<b>avowal</b>	A statement asserting the existence or the truth of something.
<b>calling</b>	The action or sound of calling. <i>He considered engineering one of the highest possible <b>callings</b>.</i>
<b>career</b>	The time spent by a person in a career. <i>He had a long <b>career</b> in the law.</i>
<b>claim</b>	A piece of land allotted to or taken by someone in order to be mined. <i>The court had denied their <b>claims</b> to asylum.</i>
<b>declaration</b>	An affirmation made in place of an oath. <i>All students must sign the following <b>declaration</b>.</i>
<b>line</b>	Denoting an image consisting of lines and solid areas with no gradation of tone. <i>The company intends to hire more people and expand its product <b>line</b>.</i>
<b>line of employment</b>	A spatial location defined by a real or imaginary unidimensional extent.
<b>line of work</b>	A slight depression in the smoothness of a surface.
<b>métier</b>	An asset of special worth or utility.
<b>occupation</b>	The principal activity in your life that you do to earn money. <i>The workers remained in <b>occupation</b> until 16 October.</i>
<b>proclamation</b>	A formal public statement. <i>The issuing by the monarch of a <b>proclamation</b> dissolving Parliament.</i>
<b>professing</b>	An open avowal (true or false) of some belief or opinion.
<b>protestation</b>	An objection or protest. <i>Her <b>protestations</b> of innocence were in vain.</i>
<b>statement</b>	Denoting something, such as a visually striking piece of jewellery, clothing, or interior decoration, that is intended to convey a particular attitude or image. <i>The ministers issued a joint <b>statement</b> calling for negotiations.</i>
<b>vocation</b>	The particular occupation for which you are trained. <i>Her <b>vocation</b> as a poet.</i>

A solemn promise.  
The **vows** of celibacy.

<b>accountant</b>	A person whose job is to keep, inspect, and analyse financial accounts.
<b>auditor</b>	A person who attends a class informally without working for credit. <i>So low was Deems s voice that his <b>auditors</b> had to give it close attention.</i>
<b>barrister</b>	A British or Canadian lawyer who speaks in the higher courts of law on behalf of either the defense or prosecution.
<b>bookkeeper</b>	A person whose job is to keep records of the financial affairs of a business. <i>The business had grown enough to justify hiring a <b>bookkeeper</b>.</i>
<b>career</b>	The time spent by a person in a career. <i>The end of a distinguished <b>career</b> in the Royal Navy.</i>
<b>clerk</b>	Work as a clerk. <i>A chapter <b>clerk</b>.</i>
<b>contracted</b>	Reduced in size or pulled together. <i>The <b>contracted</b> pupils of her eyes.</i>
<b>contractor</b>	The bridge player in contract bridge who wins the bidding and can declare which suit is to be trumps. <i>Building <b>contractors</b>.</i>
<b>controller</b>	A mechanism that controls the operation of a machine. <i>The regional <b>controller</b> for the Department of Education.</i>

<b>employ</b>	Employment. <i>Temporary staff can be <b>employed</b> to undertake the work.</i>
<b>employed</b>	Put to use. <i>Most of our graduates are <b>employed</b>.</i>
<b>employee</b>	A person employed for wages or salary, especially at non-executive level.
<b>employment</b>	The act of giving someone a job. <i>He travelled in a variety of <b>employments</b>.</i>
<b>headhunter</b>	A savage who cuts off and preserves the heads of enemies as trophies. <i>A <b>headhunter</b> offering you a wonderful new position at a higher salary.</i>
<b>mercenary</b>	Profit oriented- John Buchan. <i>Cricket s most infamous <b>mercenary</b>.</i>
<b>occupation</b>	The action of entering and taking control of a building. <i>He missed the bell in his <b>occupation</b> with the computer game.</i>
<b>office</b>	Professional or clerical workers in an office. <i>He was ejected from <b>office</b> in 1988.</i>
<b>paralegal</b>	A person trained in subsidiary legal matters but not fully qualified as a lawyer.
<b>plumber</b>	A person who fits and repairs the pipes, fittings, and other apparatus of water supply, sanitation, or heating systems.
<b>recruiter</b>	Someone who supplies members or employees. <i>A <b>recruiter</b> will schedule you for an interview.</i>
<b>salesclerk</b>	A salesperson in a store.
<b>salesman</b>	A man whose job involves selling or promoting commercial products, either in a shop or visiting locations to get orders. <i>An insurance <b>salesman</b>.</i>
<b>secretary</b>	An official of a society or other organization who conducts its correspondence and keeps its records. <i>She was <b>secretary</b> of the Women s Labour League.</i>
<b>solicitor</b>	A member of the legal profession qualified to deal with conveyancing the drawing up of wills and other legal matters A solicitor may also instruct barristers and represent clients in some courts. <i>She had been a telephone <b>solicitor</b> for a Chicago newspaper.</i>
<b>storekeeper</b>	A merchant who owns or manages a shop.
<b>subcontract</b>	Work under a subcontract engage in a subcontract. <i>We would <b>subcontract</b> the translation work out.</i>
<b>subcontractor</b>	Someone who enters into a subcontract with the primary contractor.
<b>treasurer</b>	An officer charged with receiving and disbursing funds.

- vocation** A trade or profession.  
*Not all of us have a **vocation** to be nurses or doctors.*
- worker** An employee, especially one who does manual or non-executive work.  
*He was a bogus **worker** of miracles.*
