- *In a profound way; greatly.*

Synonyms of "Profoundly" as an adverb (18 Words)

acutely	In a way that shows a perceptive understanding or insight. <i>The visor was acutely peaked.</i>
awfully	Very. <i>We played awfully.</i>
deeply	To a great depth; far down or in. <i>Dived deeply.</i>
<u>enormously</u>	Extremely. <i>Quality of life varies enormously from one place to another.</i>

exceedingly	Extremely. <i>The team played exceedingly well.</i>
extremely	To a high degree or extent; favorably or with much respect. <i>This is an extremely difficult thing to do.</i>
greatly	To an extraordinary extent or degree. <i>They now have greatly increased powers.</i>
heartily	With gusto and without reservation. <i>They were heartily sick of the whole subject.</i>
immensely	To an exceedingly great extent or degree. <i>The president was immensely popular.</i>
intensely	With extreme force or strength. <i>She loved him intensely.</i>
keenly	In a keen or penetrating way. <i>People are keenly watching the developments.</i>
painfully	(with reference to something undesirable) exceedingly. <i>She coughed painfully.</i>
sincerely	With sincerity; without pretense. <i>She praised him sincerely for his victory.</i>
so	Referring back to something previously mentioned. <i>Never been so happy.</i>
terribly	Used as intensifiers. <i>It was all terribly frustrating.</i>
thoroughly	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>We searched the files thoroughly.</i>
tremendously	Extremely. <i>Daniel played tremendously throughout.</i>
very	Used as intensifiers; 'real' is sometimes used informally for 'really'; 'rattling' is informal. <i>The river rose very quickly.</i>

- *He profoundly altered the whole course of my life.*
- *A profoundly disturbing experience.*

abyss	A wide or profound difference between people; a gulf. <i>Satan s dark abyss.</i>
amazing	Surprising greatly. <i>An amazing number of people registered.</i>
better	Comparative of well in a better or more excellent manner or more advantageously or attractively or to a greater degree etc. <i>She had almost bettered him at archery.</i>
considerable	Large or relatively large in number or amount or extent or degree. <i>A position of considerable influence.</i>
deep	Relatively deep or strong affecting one deeply. <i>Dug deep.</i>
deeply	To a great depth;far down. <i>Richard felt her loss very deeply.</i>
depth	The distance from the front to the back of something. <i>The depth of the water.</i>
engross	Devote (oneself) fully to. <i>The country had made the best of its position to engross trade.</i>
enormity	The great or extreme scale, seriousness, or extent of something perceived as bad or morally wrong. <i>A thorough search disclosed the full enormity of the crime.</i>
essential	A thing that is absolutely necessary. <i>Fibre is an essential ingredient of our diet.</i>
hefty	Done with vigour or force. <i>They could face hefty fines.</i>
height	Elevation especially above sea level or above the earth's surface. <i>It would be the height of bad manners not to attend the wedding.</i>
important	Important in effect or meaning. <i>It is important to avoid monosyllabic answers.</i>
importantly	In a manner designed to draw attention to one's importance. <i>Kruger strutted forward importantly.</i>
incredible	Very good; wonderful. <i>At incredible speed.</i>
ingrained	Deeply rooted; firmly fixed or held. <i>His deeply ingrained Catholic convictions.</i>

large	A garment size for a large person. <i>A large city.</i>
noteworthy	Worth paying attention to; interesting or significant. <i>Noteworthy features.</i>
outstanding	Of major significance or importance. <i>An outstanding war record.</i>
profundity	Intellectual depth; penetrating knowledge; keen insight; etc. <i>The profundity of her misery.</i>
prominence	A stream of incandescent gas projecting above the sun's chromosphere. <i>She came to prominence as an artist in the 1960s.</i>
prominent	A stout drab-coloured moth with tufts on the forewings which stick up while at rest, the caterpillars of which typically have fleshy growths on the back. <i>A new theory is the most prominent feature of the book.</i>
seminal	Relating to or derived from the seed of a plant. <i>The spermatozoa are washed to separate them from the seminal plasma.</i>
serious	Demanding or characterized by careful consideration or application. <i>Are you serious or joking.</i>
significant	Fairly large. <i>Significant details.</i>
significantly	In an important way or to an important degree. <i>Significantly he has refused to give a straight answer to this question.</i>
<u>sizable</u>	Large in amount or extent or degree. <i>A sizable fortune.</i>
<u>substantial</u>	Having a firm basis in reality and being therefore important, meaningful, or considerable. <i>A mere dream neither substantial nor practical.</i>
<u>unlock</u>	Become unlocked. <i>The campaign has helped us unlock rich reserves of talent among our employees.</i>
versed	An injectable form of benzodiazepine (trade name Versed) useful for sedation and for reducing pain during uncomfortable medical procedures. <i>A solicitor well versed in employment law.</i>
