abundant	Having plenty of. <i>There was abundant evidence to support the theory.</i>
ample	Large and accommodating. <i>She stood with her hands on her ample hips.</i>
<u>copious</u>	Abundant in supply or quantity. <i>I had been a little too copious in talking of my country.</i>
effusive	Extravagantly demonstrative. <i>An effusive welcome.</i>
enthusiastic	Having or showing great excitement and interest. <i>Enthusiastic crowds filled the streets.</i>
excessive	More than is necessary, normal, or desirable; immoderate. <i>He was drinking excessive amounts of brandy.</i>
extensive	Covering or affecting a large area. <i>An extensive collection of silver.</i>

extravagant	Exceeding what is reasonable or appropriate; excessive or elaborate. <i>It was rather extravagant to buy both.</i>
exuberant	Unrestrained, especially with regard to feelings. <i>Exuberant over the top sculptures.</i>
fulsome	Complimentary or flattering to an excessive degree. <i>The press are embarrassingly fulsome in their appreciation.</i>
generous	Showing kindness towards others. <i>Unusually generous in his judgment of people.</i>
glowing	Highly enthusiastic. <i>He received a glowing report from his teachers.</i>
gushing	Flowing profusely. <i>A large gushing female.</i>
gushy	Excessively effusive. <i>Write unrestrained and gushy poetry.</i>
immoderate	Beyond reasonable limits. <i>Immoderate drinking.</i>
inordinate	(of a person) unrestrained in feelings or behaviour. <i>The case had taken up an inordinate amount of time.</i>
lavish	Characterized by extravagance and profusion. <i>The critics were lavish in their praise.</i>
liberal	(of a person) giving generously. <i>Liberal amounts of wine had been consumed.</i>
lush	Tender and full of juice. <i>Lush orchestrations.</i>
luxuriant	(of vegetation) rich and profuse in growth; lush. <i>She tossed her luxuriant dark hair.</i>
prolific	Intellectually productive. <i>He was a prolific composer of operas.</i>
riotous	Unrestrained by convention or morality. <i>Their riotous blooming.</i>
unrestrained	Not subject to restraint. <i>A display of unrestrained delight.</i>
unstinting	Given or giving without restraint; unsparing. <i>He was unstinting in his praise.</i>

bounty	Payment or reward (especially from a government) for acts such as catching criminals or killing predatory animals or enlisting in the military. <i>There was an increased bounty on his head.</i>
copious	Affording an abundant supply. <i>Copious provisions.</i>
fecundation	Creation by the physical union of male and female gametes; of sperm and ova in an animal or pollen and ovule in a plant.
fertility	The ratio of live births in an area to the population of that area; expressed per 1000 population per year. <i>Improve the soil fertility by adding compost.</i>
galore	In great numbers. <i>Daffodils galore.</i>
lavishly	In a wasteful manner. <i>The kids were praised lavishly by their parents.</i>
lot	The choice resulting from deciding something by lot. <i>A vacant lot.</i>
luxuriant	Produced or growing in extreme abundance. <i>Forests of dark luxuriant foliage.</i>
luxurious	Rich and superior in quality. <i>Enjoyed a luxurious suite with a crystal chandelier and thick oriental rugs.</i>
many	A quantifier that can be used with count nouns and is often preceded by 'as' or 'too' or 'so' or 'that'; amounting to a large but indefinite number. <i>Never saw so many people.</i>
mellowness	A taste (especially of fruit) that is ripe and of full flavor. <i>The cheap wine had no body no mellowness.</i>
opulent	Ostentatiously costly and luxurious. <i>The opulent comfort of a limousine.</i>
outnumber	Be more numerous than. <i>Women outnumbered men by three to one.</i>
plenitude	The condition of being full or complete. <i>The plenitude of the Pope's powers.</i>
plenteous	Affording an abundant supply. <i>A plenteous grape harvest.</i>
plentiful	Producing in abundance. <i>A plentiful year.</i>
plentitude	A full supply.

plenty	Used to emphasize the degree of something. <i>She has plenty more ideas.</i>
profusion	The property of being extremely abundant. <i>A rich profusion of flowers.</i>
prosperity	The condition of prospering; having good fortune. <i>A long period of peace and prosperity.</i>
replete	Very full of or sated by food. <i>Sensational popular fiction replete with adultery and sudden death.</i>
richness	The property of being extremely abundant. <i>The idiomatic richness of English.</i>
voluminous	(of a writer) producing many books. <i>A voluminous skirt.</i>
