<b>abundant</b>	Having plenty of. <i>There was <b>abundant</b> evidence to support the theory.</i>
<b>ample</b>	Large and accommodating. <i>She stood with her hands on her <b>ample</b> hips.</i>
<b><u>copious</u></b>	Abundant in supply or quantity. <i>I had been a little too <b>copious</b> in talking of my country.</i>
<b>effusive</b>	Extravagantly demonstrative. <i>An <b>effusive</b> welcome.</i>
<b>enthusiastic</b>	Having or showing great excitement and interest. <i><b>Enthusiastic</b> crowds filled the streets.</i>
<b>excessive</b>	More than is necessary, normal, or desirable; immoderate. <i>He was drinking <b>excessive</b> amounts of brandy.</i>

<b>extravagant</b>	Exceeding what is reasonable or appropriate; excessive or elaborate. <i>It was rather <b>extravagant</b> to buy both.</i>
<b>exuberant</b>	Unrestrained, especially with regard to feelings. <i><b>Exuberant</b> over the top sculptures.</i>
<b><u>fulsome</u></b>	Complimentary or flattering to an excessive degree. <i>The press are embarrassingly <b>fulsome</b> in their appreciation.</i>
<b>generous</b>	Showing kindness towards others. <i>Unusually <b>generous</b> in his judgment of people.</i>
<b><u>glowing</u></b>	Highly enthusiastic. <i>He received a <b>glowing</b> report from his teachers.</i>
<b>gushing</b>	Flowing profusely. <i>A large <b>gushing</b> female.</i>
<b>gushy</b>	Excessively effusive. <i>Write unrestrained and <b>gushy</b> poetry.</i>
<b>immoderate</b>	Beyond reasonable limits. <i><b>Immoderate</b> drinking.</i>
<b><u>inordinate</u></b>	(of a person) unrestrained in feelings or behaviour. <i>The case had taken up an <b>inordinate</b> amount of time.</i>
<b><u>lavish</u></b>	Characterized by extravagance and profusion. <i>The critics were <b>lavish</b> in their praise.</i>
<b><u>liberal</u></b>	(of a person) giving generously. <i><b>Liberal</b> amounts of wine had been consumed.</i>
<b><u>lush</u></b>	Tender and full of juice. <i><b>Lush</b> orchestrations.</i>
<b>luxuriant</b>	(of vegetation) rich and profuse in growth; lush. <i>She tossed her <b>luxuriant</b> dark hair.</i>
<b><u>prolific</u></b>	Intellectually productive. <i>He was a <b>prolific</b> composer of operas.</i>
<b>riotous</b>	Unrestrained by convention or morality. <i>Their <b>riotous</b> blooming.</i>
<b><u>unrestrained</u></b>	Not subject to restraint. <i>A display of <b>unrestrained</b> delight.</i>
<b>unstinting</b>	Given or giving without restraint; unsparing. <i>He was <b>unstinting</b> in his praise.</i>

<b>abundant</b>	Existing or available in large quantities; plentiful. <i>The riverbanks were <b>abundant</b> in beautiful wild plants.</i>
<b>abundantly</b>	In large quantities; plentifully. <i>They were <b>abundantly</b> supplied with food.</i>
<b>affluent</b>	An affluent person a person who is financially well off. <i>The so called emerging <b>affluents</b>.</i>
<b>ample</b>	(of a person's figure) full or broad. <i>She stood with her hands on her <b>ample</b> hips.</i>
<b>armful</b>	As much as a person can hold in both arms. <i>Most of us will end up with <b>armfuls</b> of stuff we do not need.</i>
<b>bountiful</b>	Giving generously. <i>The <b>bountiful</b> earth.</i>

<b>bounty</b>	Payment or reward (especially from a government) for acts such as catching criminals or killing predatory animals or enlisting in the military. <i>There was an increased <b>bounty</b> on his head.</i>
<b>copious</b>	Affording an abundant supply. <i><b>Copious</b> provisions.</i>
<b>fecundation</b>	Creation by the physical union of male and female gametes; of sperm and ova in an animal or pollen and ovule in a plant.
<b>fertility</b>	The ratio of live births in an area to the population of that area; expressed per 1000 population per year. <i>Improve the soil <b>fertility</b> by adding compost.</i>
<b>galore</b>	In great numbers. <i>Daffodils <b>galore</b>.</i>
<b>lavishly</b>	In a wasteful manner. <i>The kids were praised <b>lavishly</b> by their parents.</i>
<b>lot</b>	The choice resulting from deciding something by lot. <i>A vacant <b>lot</b>.</i>
<b>luxuriant</b>	Produced or growing in extreme abundance. <i>Forests of dark <b>luxuriant</b> foliage.</i>
<b>luxurious</b>	Rich and superior in quality. <i>Enjoyed a <b>luxurious</b> suite with a crystal chandelier and thick oriental rugs.</i>
<b>many</b>	A quantifier that can be used with count nouns and is often preceded by 'as' or 'too' or 'so' or 'that'; amounting to a large but indefinite number. <i>Never saw so <b>many</b> people.</i>
<b>mellowness</b>	A taste (especially of fruit) that is ripe and of full flavor. <i>The cheap wine had no body no <b>mellowness</b>.</i>
<b>opulent</b>	Ostentatiously costly and luxurious. <i>The <b>opulent</b> comfort of a limousine.</i>
<b>outnumber</b>	Be more numerous than. <i>Women <b>outnumbered</b> men by three to one.</i>
<b>plenitude</b>	The condition of being full or complete. <i>The <b>plenitude</b> of the Pope's powers.</i>
<b>plenteous</b>	Affording an abundant supply. <i>A <b>plenteous</b> grape harvest.</i>
<b>plentiful</b>	Producing in abundance. <i>A <b>plentiful</b> year.</i>
<b>plentitude</b>	A full supply.

<b>profusion</b>	The property of being extremely abundant. <i>A rich <b>profusion</b> of flowers.</i>
<b>prosperity</b>	The condition of prospering; having good fortune. <i>A long period of peace and <b>prosperity</b>.</i>
<b>replete</b>	Very full of or sated by food. <i>Sensational popular fiction <b>replete</b> with adultery and sudden death.</i>
<b>richness</b>	The property of being extremely abundant. <i>The idiomatic <b>richness</b> of English.</i>
<b>voluminous</b>	(of a writer) producing many books. <i>A <b>voluminous</b> skirt.</i>
