### **Definitions of "Profusely" as an adverb**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “profusely” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *In an abundant manner.*
- *To a great degree; in large amounts.*



### Synonyms of "Profusely" as an adverb (3 Words)

- abundantly** In large quantities; plentifully.  
*The plant grows **abundantly** in the wild.*
- copiously** In an abundant manner.  
*His book is **copiously** annotated with references to the current debates.*
- extravagantly** In a rich and lavish manner.  
*As a child Mozart was **extravagantly** praised.*

- *The book is profusely illustrated with period photos.*
- *The waiter was profusely apologetic.*
- *He thanked her profusely.*

<b>abundantly</b>	Extremely. <i>The plant grows <b>abundantly</b> in the wild.</i>
<b><u>affluent</u></b>	An affluent person a person who is financially well off. <i>An <b>affluent</b> banker.</i>
<b>ample</b>	Affording an abundant supply. <i>There is <b>ample</b> time for discussion.</i>
<b>armful</b>	The quantity that can be contained in the arms. <i>Most of us will end up with <b>armfuls</b> of stuff we do not need.</i>
<b>bountiful</b>	Large in quantity; abundant. <i>The <b>bountiful</b> earth.</i>
<b>bountifulness</b>	The property of copious abundance.

<b>bounty</b>	Something given or occurring in generous amounts. <i>For millennia the people along the Nile have depended entirely on its <b>bounty</b>.</i>
<b>copious</b>	Large in number or quantity (especially of discourse). <i><b>Copious</b> provisions.</i>
<b>fecundation</b>	Creation by the physical union of male and female gametes; of sperm and ova in an animal or pollen and ovule in a plant.
<b>fertility</b>	The property of producing abundantly and sustaining vigorous and luxuriant growth. <i>Anxiety and stress affect <b>fertility</b> in both men and women.</i>
<b>galore</b>	Existing in abundance. <i>There were prizes <b>galore</b> for everything.</i>
<b>lavishly</b>	In a sumptuously rich, elaborate, or luxurious manner. <i>A <b>lavishly</b> decorated room.</i>
<b>lot</b>	A plot of land assigned for sale or for a particular use. <i>They drew <b>lots</b> for it.</i>
<b>luxuriant</b>	Displaying luxury and furnishing gratification to the senses. <i>Forests of dark <b>luxuriant</b> foliage.</i>
<b>luxurious</b>	Displaying luxury and furnishing gratification to the senses. <i>The island s most <b>luxurious</b> hotel.</i>
<b>many</b>	A quantifier that can be used with count nouns and is often preceded by 'as' or 'too' or 'so' or 'that'; amounting to a large but indefinite number. <i>The job of government is to help order society in the interests of the <b>many</b> not the few.</i>
<b>mellowness</b>	A soft shade of a color. <i>A <b>mellowness</b> of light and shade not attainable in marble.</i>
<b>opulent</b>	Rich and superior in quality. <i>The <b>opulent</b> comfort of a limousine.</i>
<b>outnumber</b>	Be more numerous than. <i>Women <b>outnumbered</b> men by three to one.</i>
<b>plenitude</b>	The condition of being full or complete. <i>The <b>plenitude</b> of the Pope s powers.</i>
<b>plenteous</b>	Plentiful. <i>The meal was astonishingly <b>plenteous</b>.</i>
<b>plentiful</b>	Producing in abundance. <i>Food is <b>plentiful</b>.</i>
<b>plentitude</b>	A full supply.



<b>plenty</b>	(often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent. <i>I've had <b>plenty</b> thanks.</i>
<b>profusion</b>	An abundance or large quantity of something. <i>A rich <b>profusion</b> of flowers.</i>
<b>prosperity</b>	The condition of prospering; having good fortune. <i>A long period of peace and <b>prosperity</b>.</i>
<b>replete</b>	(followed by `with') deeply filled or permeated. <i>It is <b>replete</b> with misery.</i>
<b>richness</b>	The property of a sensation that is rich and pleasing. <i>He was well aware of the <b>richness</b> of his own appearance.</i>
<b>voluminous</b>	Marked by repeated turns and bends. <i>A <b>voluminous</b> purple cloak.</i>
