<b><u>cycle</u></b>	The period of time taken to complete a cycle of events. <i>A year constitutes a <b>cycle</b> of the seasons.</i>
<b>development</b>	(biology) the process of an individual organism growing organically; a purely biological unfolding of events involved in an organism changing gradually from a simple to a more complex level. <i>I sought to take advantage of Black's defective <b>development</b>.</i>
<b>flow</b>	The amount of fluid that flows in a given time. <i>A constant <b>flow</b> of people.</i>
<b>forward motion</b>	The person who plays the position of forward in certain games, such as basketball, soccer, or hockey.
<b>forward movement</b>	The person who plays the position of forward in certain games, such as basketball, soccer, or hockey.
<b><u>march</u></b>	Genre of music written for marching. <i>The <b>march</b> went up Fifth Avenue.</i>
<b>movement</b>	A campaign undertaken by a political social or artistic movement. <i>He was a charter member of the <b>movement</b>.</i>
<b>order</b>	An institution founded by a monarch along the lines of a medieval crusading monastic order for the purpose of honouring meritorious conduct. <i>We shall consider these questions in the inverse <b>order</b> of their presentation.</i>
<b>parade</b>	A parade ground. <i>The <b>parade</b> of Hollywood celebrities who troop on to his show.</i>
<b><u>passage</u></b>	A narrow way allowing access between buildings or to different rooms within a building a passageway. <i>An allegory on the theme of the <b>passage</b> from ignorance to knowledge.</i>
<b>process</b>	An instance of a program being executed in a multitasking operating system typically running in an environment that protects it from other processes. <i><b>Process</b> inks.</i>



<b>procession</b>	A relentless succession of people or things. <i>A funeral <b>procession</b>.</i>
<b>progress</b>	A movement forward. <i>He listened for the <b>progress</b> of the troops.</i>
<b>row</b>	The act of rowing as a sport. <i>They sat in the front <b>row</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">sequence</a></u>	A following of one thing after another in time. <i>He played the trumps in <b>sequence</b>.</i>
<b>series</b>	(electronics) connection of components in such a manner that current flows first through one and then through the other. <i>Early models of the 600D <b>series</b> incorporated a centrifugal oil filter.</i>
<u><a href="#">stream</a></u>	Something that resembles a flowing stream in moving continuously. <i>The hose ejected a <b>stream</b> of water.</i>
<u><a href="#">string</a></u>	The stringed instruments in an orchestra. <i>The blend of the wind group is less perfect than that of the <b>strings</b>.</i>
<b>succession</b>	A number of people or things of a similar kind following one after the other. <i>A <b>succession</b> of stalls offering soft drinks.</i>
<u><a href="#">train</a></u>	A long piece of material attached to the back of a formal dress or robe that trails along the ground. <i>A <b>train</b> of gears.</i>

<b>improvement</b>	A change for the better; progress in development. <i>Home <b>improvements</b>.</i>
<b>level</b>	Become level or even. <i>A billiard table must be <b>level</b>.</i>
<b><u>ongoing</u></b>	Continuing; still in progress. <i>An <b>ongoing</b> economic crisis.</i>
<b>procedural</b>	Relating to court practice and procedure as opposed to the principles of law. <i>There had been several <b>procedural</b> errors in dealing with the call.</i>
<b>procedure</b>	A process or series of acts especially of a practical or mechanical nature involved in a particular form of work. <i>The <b>procedure</b> is carried out under general anaesthetic.</i>
<b><u>proceed</u></b>	Continue a certain state, condition, or activity. <i>His claim that all power <b>proceeded</b> from God.</i>
<b>proceeding</b>	(law) the institution of a sequence of steps by which legal judgments are invoked.
<b>process</b>	An instance of a program being executed in a multitasking operating system typically running in an environment that protects it from other processes. <i>The salmon is quickly <b>processed</b> after harvest to preserve the flavour.</i>
<b>processing</b>	Preparing or putting through a prescribed procedure. <i>The <b>processing</b> of ore to obtain minerals.</i>



<b>progress</b>	Cause a task or undertaking to make progress. <i>I cannot predict how quickly we can <b>progress</b> the matter.</i>
<b>progressively</b>	In a forward-looking, innovative manner. <i>A circle of <b>progressively</b> minded reformers.</i>
<b>promotion</b>	Activity that supports or encourages a cause, venture, or aim. <i>She s the <b>promotions</b> manager for the museum.</i>
<b>protocol</b>	The original draft of a diplomatic document, especially of the terms of a treaty agreed to in conference and signed by the parties. <i>Hungary and the Soviet Union signed a trade <b>protocol</b>.</i>
<b>sere</b>	Having lost all moisture. <i>The desert was edged with <b>sere</b> vegetation.</i>
