*Maintained a **constant** temperature.*

Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used

interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption.

*The **continual** banging of the shutters.*

continuing	Remaining in force or being carried on without letup. <i>A continuing controversy.</i>
continuous	(of a function) of which the graph is a smooth unbroken curve, i.e. one such that as the value of x approaches any given value a , the value of $f(x)$ approaches that of $f(a)$ as a limit. <i>A continuous row of warehouses.</i>
drawn-out	Relatively long in duration; tediously protracted.
<u>elongated</u>	Having notably more length than width; being long and slender. <i>An alien being with an elongated head.</i>
extended	Fully extended or stretched forth. <i>Refused to accept the extended hand.</i>
incessant	(of something regarded as unpleasant) continuing without pause or interruption. <i>The incessant beat of the music.</i>
lengthened	Drawn out or made longer spatially. <i>Lengthened skirts are fashionable this year.</i>
lengthy	Relatively long in duration; tediously protracted. <i>Lengthy delays.</i>
never-ending	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing.
<u>ongoing</u>	Currently happening. <i>Ongoing negotiations.</i>
perpetual	Occurring repeatedly; so frequent as to seem endless and uninterrupted. <i>Their perpetual money worries.</i>
persistent	Continually recurring to the mind. <i>PCBs are persistent environmental contaminants.</i>
protracted	Relatively long in duration tediously protracted. <i>Protracted negotiations.</i>
<u>relentless</u>	Unceasingly intense. <i>The relentless heat of the desert.</i>
round the clock	Full and rich.
running	Of advancing the ball by running. <i>As mountain stream with freely running water.</i>
<u>steady</u>	Marked by firm determination or resolution; not shakable. <i>A good steady ballplayer.</i>
unabating	Not weakening or losing intensity. <i>The battle raged with unabating fury.</i>

<u>unbroken</u>	Not subdued or trained for service or use. <i>Fortunately the other lens is unbroken.</i>
<u>unceasing</u>	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>Man s unceasing warfare with drought and isolation.</i>
<u>unending</u>	Having or seeming to have no end. <i>The unending bliss of heaven.</i>
<u>unfaltering</u>	Marked by firm determination or resolution; not shakable. <i>Her unfaltering energy and determination.</i>
<u>unrelenting</u>	Not to be placated or appeased or moved by entreaty. <i>The heat was unrelenting.</i>
<u>unrelieved</u>	Lacking variation or change; monotonous. <i>Flowing gowns of unrelieved black.</i>
<u>unremitting</u>	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>Unremitting demands of hunger.</i>

elongate	Long in relation to width elongated. <i>The old man s gaunt and elongated frame.</i>
elongated	Having notably more length than width; being long and slender. <i>The old man s gaunt and elongated frame.</i>
extended	Fully extended or stretched forth. <i>The extended airport runways can accommodate larger planes.</i>
famine	A shortage. <i>The cotton famine of the 1860s.</i>
indefinitely	To an unlimited or unspecified degree or extent. <i>Talks cannot go on indefinitely.</i>
lack	The state of being without or not having enough of something. <i>The case was dismissed for lack of evidence.</i>
leg	A part of a garment covering a leg or part of a leg. <i>A little boy was lying on his back legging the boat along.</i>
lengthy	(especially in reference to time) of considerable or unusual length, especially so as to be tedious. <i>Lengthy delays.</i>
ligament	A short band of tough, flexible fibrous connective tissue which connects two bones or cartilages or holds together a joint.
long	Of a vowel categorized as long with regard to quality and length e g in standard British English the vowel u in food is long as distinct from the short vowel in good. <i>A long and distinguished career.</i>
missive	A document in the form of a letter exchanged by the parties to a contract. <i>Yet another missive from the Foreign Office.</i>
outspread	Fully extended or expanded. <i>Outspread wings.</i>
outstretched	Fully extended especially in length. <i>A kitten with one paw outstretched.</i>

overexposure	Excessive exposure, especially to something harmful. <i>At certain times a celebrity may suffer from overexposure.</i>
period	A set of elements occupying a horizontal row in the periodic table. <i>The ale will be available for a limited period.</i>
postpone	Cause or arrange for (something) to take place at a time later than that first scheduled. <i>He postponed implementing the scheme until industry and business were consulted.</i>
protracted	Relatively long in duration tediously protracted. <i>A protracted and bitter dispute.</i>
shortage	An acute insufficiency. <i>A shortage of hard cash.</i>
starve	Be freezing cold. <i>The political prisoners starved to death.</i>
stretched	Extended or spread over a wide area or distance. <i>Well stretched muscles are less susceptible to injury.</i>
verbose	Using or containing too many words. <i>Much academic language is obscure and verbose.</i>
