Definitions of "Propaganda" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "propaganda" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- Information, especially of a biased or misleading nature, used to promote a political cause or point of view.
- Information that is spread for the purpose of promoting some cause.
- A committee of cardinals of the Roman Catholic Church responsible for foreign missions, founded in 1622 by Pope Gregory XV.
- The dissemination of propaganda as a political strategy.

information that of alternative sequences.



publicityNotice or attention given to someone or something by the media.


We distributed **publicity** from a stall in the marketplace.
