| auspicious | Conducive to success; favourable. <i>It was not the most auspicious moment to hold an election.</i> |
| beneficial | Resulting in good; favourable or advantageous. <i>The process was beneficial to both supplier and customer.</i> |
| bright | Not made dim or less bright. <i>The bright pageantry of court.</i> |

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| favourable | (of winds or weather) tending to promote or facilitate. A favourable prognosis. |
| fortunate | Supremely favored. A federal programme aimed at helping less fortunate families. |
| full of promise | Having ample fabric. |
| happy | Eagerly disposed to act or to be of service. We will be happy to advise you. |
| heaven-sent | Peculiarly fortunate or appropriate; as if by divine intervention. |
| hopeful | Feeling or inspiring optimism about a future event. Found a hopeful way of attacking the problem. |
| lucky | Occurring by chance. You had a very lucky escape. |
| optimistic | Hopeful and confident about the future. Took an optimistic view. |
| promising | Likely to turn out well in the future. A promising start to the season. |
| providential | Involving divine foresight or providence. His appearance had seemed more than just providential . |
| rosy | Promising or suggesting good fortune or happiness; hopeful. A rosy cheeked schoolgirl. |

| <u>genial</u> | Diffusing warmth and friendliness. <i>The genial sunshine.</i> |
| helpful | Providing assistance or serving a useful function. <i>Pages of helpful information.</i> |
| hopefully | In a hopeful manner. <i>He rode on hopefully.</i> |
| <u>kindly</u> | Pleasant and agreeable. <i>Never mind she said kindly.</i> |
| lucky | Having or bringing good fortune. <i>A lucky man.</i> |
| <u>lucrative</u> | Producing a sizeable profit. <i>A lucrative career as a stand up comedian.</i> |

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| nice | Pleasant or pleasing or agreeable in nature or appearance- George Meredith. <i>He s a nicer man than Mark.</i> |
| optimism | Hopefulness and confidence about the future or the success of something. <i>The talks had been amicable and there were grounds for optimism.</i> |
| optimistic | Hopeful and confident about the future. <i>The optimistic mood of the Sixties.</i> |
| philanthropic | Generous in assistance to the poor. <i>Philanthropic contributions.</i> |
| plus | A mathematical operation of addition. <i>Plus 60 degrees centigrade.</i> |
| positive | A positive photographic image especially one printed from a negative. <i>Protons are positive.</i> |
| profitable | Beneficial; useful. <i>A professionally run and profitable company.</i> |
| rosy | Presaging good fortune. <i>The strategy has produced results beyond the most rosy forecasts.</i> |
| unencumbered | Free of debt or other financial liability. <i>Inherited an unencumbered estate.</i> |
| useful | Having a useful function. <i>Aspirins are useful for headaches.</i> |
