### Definitions of "Proportional" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “proportional” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Corresponding in size or amount to something else.*
- *Having a constant ratio.*
- *(of a variable quantity) having a constant ratio to another quantity.*
- *Properly related in size or degree or other measurable characteristics; usually followed by `to.*



## Synonyms of "Proportional" as an adjective (13 Words)

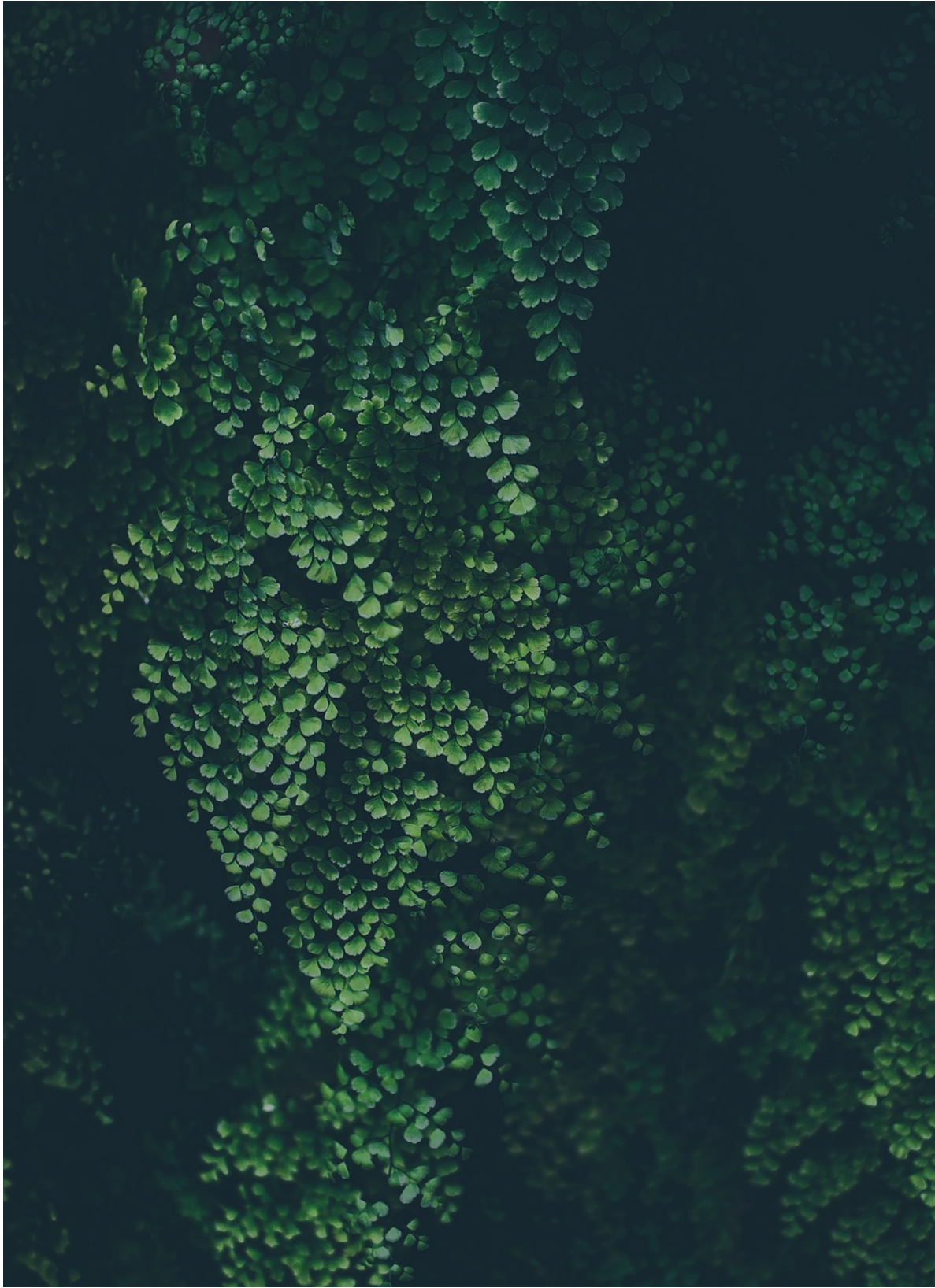
<b>analogical</b>	Expressing, composed of, or based on an analogy. <i>The <b>analogical</b> use of a metaphor.</i>
<b><u>analogous</u></b>	Comparable in certain respects, typically in a way which makes clearer the nature of the things compared. <i>Brains and computers are often considered <b>analogous</b>.</i>
<b><u>commensurate</u></b>	Corresponding in size or degree or extent. <i>Salary will be <b>commensurate</b> with age and experience.</i>
<b><u>comparable</u></b>	Of equivalent quality; worthy of comparison. <i>Nobody is <b>comparable</b> with this athlete.</i>
<b><u>consistent</u></b>	Marked by an orderly logical and aesthetically consistent relation of parts. <i>The parents are being <b>consistent</b> and firm in their reactions.</i>
<b><u>correlated</u></b>	Mutually related.
<b>correlative</b>	Mutually related. <i>Rights whether moral or legal can involve <b>correlative</b> duties.</i>

<b>corresponding</b>	Conforming in every respect. <i>All rights carry with them <b>corresponding</b> responsibilities.</i>
<b>equivalent</b>	Being essentially equal to something. <i>Some regulations are <b>equivalent</b> to censorship.</i>
<b>in proportion</b>	Currently fashionable.
<b>pro rata</b>	In favor of (an action or proposal etc.)
<b>proportionate</b>	Being in due proportion. <i><b>Proportionate</b> representation of a minority group.</i>
<b><u>relative</u></b>	Of a clause attached to an antecedent by a relative word. <i>Earnings <b>relative</b> to production.</i>

- *The punishment should be proportional to the crime.*
- *The punishment ought to be proportional to the crime.*

<b>always</b>	At any time or in any event. <i>Isabel had <b>always</b> been in rude health.</i>
<b><u>amplitude</u></b>	The angle between the real axis of an Argand diagram and a vector representing a complex number. <i>The detection of signals only a few microvolts in <b>amplitude</b>.</i>
<b>calculator</b>	Something used for making mathematical calculations, in particular a small electronic device with a keyboard and a visual display. <i>A pocket <b>calculator</b>.</i>
<b>chance</b>	Be the case by chance. <i>We ran into each other by pure <b>chance</b>.</i>
<b><u>extent</u></b>	The area covered by something. <i>The <b>extent</b> of the damage.</i>
<b><u>frequency</u></b>	The fact or state of being frequent or happening often. <i>The <b>frequency</b> of his seizures increased as he grew older.</i>
<b><u>frequently</u></b>	Many times at short intervals. <i>They go abroad <b>frequently</b>.</i>
<b><u>incidence</u></b>	The way in which the burden of a tax falls upon the population. <i>The point of <b>incidence</b> of the beam.</i>
<b>modulated</b>	Changed or adjusted in pitch, tone, or volume.
<b>occasional</b>	Occurring from time to time. <i>An <b>occasional</b> table.</i>
<b><u>occasionally</u></b>	Now and then or here and there. <i>Open areas are only <b>occasionally</b> interrupted by clumps of trees.</i>
<b>odds</b>	The balance of advantage; superiority in strength, power, or resources. <i>The <b>odds</b> were overwhelmingly in favour of the banks rather than the customer.</i>
<b>oft</b>	Many times at short intervals. <i>We <b>often</b> met over a cup of coffee.</i>
<b>often</b>	Frequently; many times. <i>Vocabulary <b>often</b> reflects social standing.</i>
<b>oftentimes</b>	Frequently; many times. <i>I would <b>oftentimes</b> go there.</i>
<b>part</b>	Come apart. <i>Glue the two <b>parts</b> together.</i>

<b>periodically</b>	In a sporadic manner. <i>The students received help from a friend only <b>periodically</b>.</i>
<b>proportion</b>	Give pleasant proportions to. <i>A life after death in which happiness can be <b>proportioned</b> to virtue.</i>
<b>punctuality</b>	The quality or habit of adhering to an appointed time. <i>Improvements in the <b>punctuality</b> of trains.</i>
<b>quota</b>	(in the Anglican Church) the proportion of the funds of a parish contributed to the finances of the diocese. <i>The county is falling short of its <b>quota</b> of blood donations.</i>
<b>ratio</b>	The quantitative relation between two amounts showing the number of times one value contains or is contained within the other. <i>The <b>ratio</b> of average prices to average salaries is at its lowest number for years.</i>
<b>regular</b>	A regular customer member of a team etc. <i><b>Regular</b> bus departures.</i>
<b>regularity</b>	The quality of being characterized by a fixed principle or rate. <i>He was famous for the <b>regularity</b> of his habits.</i>
<b>relative</b>	A relative pronoun determiner or adverb. <i>She went down the steps into the <b>relative</b> darkness of the dining room.</i>
<b>repeated</b>	Recurring again and again. <i>There were <b>repeated</b> attempts to negotiate.</i>
<b>sometimes</b>	On certain occasions or in certain cases but not always. <i><b>Sometimes</b> I want to do things on my own.</i>
<b>sporadically</b>	Occasionally or at irregular intervals. <i>He only works <b>sporadically</b>.</i>
<b>successively</b>	Immediately one after another. <i>Three letters of <b>successively</b> decreasing length.</i>
<b>time</b>	Time or an amount of time as reckoned by a conventional standard. <i>We were <b>timed</b> and given certificates according to our speed.</i>
<b>tremendous</b>	Extreme in degree or extent or amount or impact. <i>A <b>tremendous</b> fact in human experience that a whole civilization should be dependent on technology.</i>
