Definitions of "Proportional" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “proportional” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Corresponding in size or amount to something else.*
- *Having a constant ratio.*
- *(of a variable quantity) having a constant ratio to another quantity.*
- *Properly related in size or degree or other measurable characteristics; usually followed by `to.*



Synonyms of "Proportional" as an adjective (13 Words)

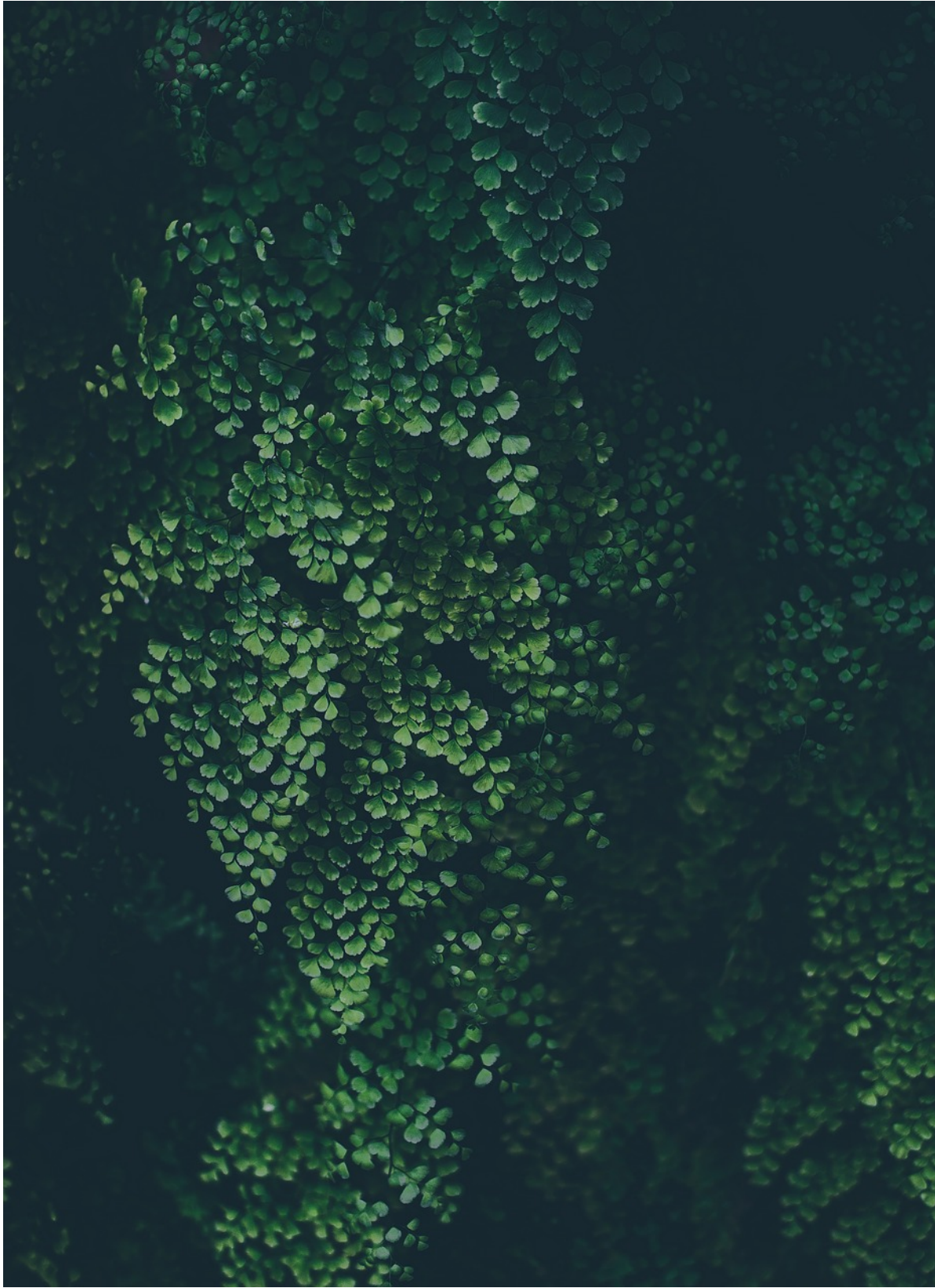
analogical	Expressing, composed of, or based on an analogy. <i>The analogical use of a metaphor.</i>
<u>analogous</u>	Comparable in certain respects, typically in a way which makes clearer the nature of the things compared. <i>Brains and computers are often considered analogous.</i>
<u>commensurate</u>	Corresponding in size or degree or extent. <i>Salary will be commensurate with age and experience.</i>
<u>comparable</u>	Of equivalent quality; worthy of comparison. <i>Nobody is comparable with this athlete.</i>
<u>consistent</u>	Marked by an orderly logical and aesthetically consistent relation of parts. <i>The parents are being consistent and firm in their reactions.</i>
<u>correlated</u>	Mutually related.
correlative	Mutually related. <i>Rights whether moral or legal can involve correlative duties.</i>

corresponding	Conforming in every respect. <i>All rights carry with them corresponding responsibilities.</i>
equivalent	Being essentially equal to something. <i>Some regulations are equivalent to censorship.</i>
in proportion	Currently fashionable.
pro rata	In favor of (an action or proposal etc.)
proportionate	Being in due proportion. <i>Proportionate representation of a minority group.</i>
<u>relative</u>	Of a clause attached to an antecedent by a relative word. <i>Earnings relative to production.</i>



Usage Examples of "Proportional" as an adjective

- *The punishment should be proportional to the crime.*
- *The punishment ought to be proportional to the crime.*



Associations of "Proportional" (30 Words)

always	At any time or in any event. <i>Isabel had always been in rude health.</i>
<u>amplitude</u>	The angle between the real axis of an Argand diagram and a vector representing a complex number. <i>The detection of signals only a few microvolts in amplitude.</i>
calculator	Something used for making mathematical calculations, in particular a small electronic device with a keyboard and a visual display. <i>A pocket calculator.</i>
chance	Be the case by chance. <i>We ran into each other by pure chance.</i>
<u>extent</u>	The area covered by something. <i>The extent of the damage.</i>
<u>frequency</u>	The fact or state of being frequent or happening often. <i>The frequency of his seizures increased as he grew older.</i>
<u>frequently</u>	Many times at short intervals. <i>They go abroad frequently.</i>
<u>incidence</u>	The way in which the burden of a tax falls upon the population. <i>The point of incidence of the beam.</i>
modulated	Changed or adjusted in pitch, tone, or volume.
occasional	Occurring from time to time. <i>An occasional table.</i>
<u>occasionally</u>	Now and then or here and there. <i>Open areas are only occasionally interrupted by clumps of trees.</i>
odds	The balance of advantage; superiority in strength, power, or resources. <i>The odds were overwhelmingly in favour of the banks rather than the customer.</i>
oft	Many times at short intervals. <i>We often met over a cup of coffee.</i>
often	Frequently; many times. <i>Vocabulary often reflects social standing.</i>
oftentimes	Frequently; many times. <i>I would oftentimes go there.</i>
part	Come apart. <i>Glue the two parts together.</i>

periodically	In a sporadic manner. <i>The students received help from a friend only periodically.</i>
proportion	Give pleasant proportions to. <i>A life after death in which happiness can be proportioned to virtue.</i>
punctuality	The quality or habit of adhering to an appointed time. <i>Improvements in the punctuality of trains.</i>
quota	(in the Anglican Church) the proportion of the funds of a parish contributed to the finances of the diocese. <i>The county is falling short of its quota of blood donations.</i>
ratio	The quantitative relation between two amounts showing the number of times one value contains or is contained within the other. <i>The ratio of average prices to average salaries is at its lowest number for years.</i>
regular	A regular customer member of a team etc. <i>Regular bus departures.</i>
regularity	The quality of being characterized by a fixed principle or rate. <i>He was famous for the regularity of his habits.</i>
relative	A relative pronoun determiner or adverb. <i>She went down the steps into the relative darkness of the dining room.</i>
repeated	Recurring again and again. <i>There were repeated attempts to negotiate.</i>
sometimes	On certain occasions or in certain cases but not always. <i>Sometimes I want to do things on my own.</i>
sporadically	Occasionally or at irregular intervals. <i>He only works sporadically.</i>
successively	Immediately one after another. <i>Three letters of successively decreasing length.</i>
time	Time or an amount of time as reckoned by a conventional standard. <i>We were timed and given certificates according to our speed.</i>
tremendous	Extreme in degree or extent or amount or impact. <i>A tremendous fact in human experience that a whole civilization should be dependent on technology.</i>
