advantage	Give an advantage to. <i>This system advantages the rich.</i>
backwards	Towards or into a worse state. <i>Penny glanced backwards.</i>
behalf	For someone's benefit usually expressed as in behalf rather than on behalf and usually with a possessive. <i>In your behalf.</i>
benefit	Derive a benefit from. <i>A benefit gig.</i>
best	The supreme effort one can make. <i>The best time for planting.</i>
better	Get better. <i>His ideas for bettering the lot of the millhands.</i>
boon	A favour or request. <i>A spanking breeze is a boon to sailors.</i>
downside	The negative aspect of something otherwise regarded as good or desirable. <i>He says being a rock star is a fun line of work when you're young but admits fame can have its downsides.</i>
excellent	Very good; of the highest quality. <i>Made an excellent speech.</i>
favorite	A special loved one. <i>A favorite tourist attraction.</i>
good	In a good or proper or satisfactory manner or to a high standard good is a nonstandard dialectal variant for well. <i>This stump will make a good picnic table.</i>
indulging	The act of indulging or gratifying a desire.

like	(of a portrait or other image) having a faithful resemblance to the original. <i>A dreamlike quality.</i>
moll	A gangster's female companion. <i>I'd rush the money over to his moll.</i>
perquisite	A right reserved exclusively by a particular person or group (especially a hereditary or official right). <i>The perquisites of celebrity are intoxicating.</i>
plus	(after a grade) rather better than. <i>A grade of C plus.</i>
positive	A positive photographic image especially one printed from a negative. <i>A player had tested positive for cocaine use.</i>
predilection	A predisposition in favor of something. <i>A predilection for expensive cars.</i>
preeminence	High status importance owing to marked superiority.
prefer	Give preference to one creditor over another. <i>Some people prefer camping to staying in hotels.</i>
prerogative	Arising from the prerogative of the Crown usually delegated to the government or the judiciary and based in common law rather than statutory law. <i>Suffrage was the prerogative of white adult males.</i>
privilege	Grant a privilege or privileges to. <i>I had the privilege of giving the Sir George Brown memorial lecture.</i>
profiteer	A person who profiteers. <i>A war profiteer.</i>
sideways	At an angle. <i>The lorry slid sideways across the road.</i>
superb	Used in names of birds with attractive or colourful plumage e.g superb lyrebird. <i>A superb actor.</i>
tout	Offer racing tips for a share of any resulting winnings. <i>He made his fortune touting tickets.</i>
unmatched	Eminent beyond or above comparison. <i>Infamy unmatched in the Western world.</i>
upside	The more positive aspect of a situation. <i>Being self employed has its upside.</i>
value	Fix or determine the value of assign a value to. <i>She had come to value her privacy.</i>
