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## Associations of "Prose" (30 Words)

<b><a href="#">anthology</a></b>	A published collection of poems or other pieces of writing. <i>An <b>anthology</b> of European poetry.</i>
<b>antiphon</b>	A musical setting of an antiphon.
<b>assonant</b>	Having the same sound (especially the same vowel sound) occurring in successive stressed syllables. <i>Note the <b>assonant</b> words and syllables in tilting at windmills.</i>
<b>broadcast</b>	Broadcast over the airwaves as in radio or television. <i>The Queen s annual Christmas TV <b>broadcast</b>.</i>
<b>clipping</b>	The act of clipping or snipping. <i>He searched through piles of letters and <b>clippings</b>.</i>
<b>couplet</b>	Two items of the same kind.
<b>cutting</b>	The act of cutting something into parts. <i>Take <b>cuttings</b> of Christmas cactus and pot them on.</i>
<b>disperse</b>	Denoting a phase dispersed in another phase as in a colloid. <i>The crowds <b>dispersed</b>.</i>
<b>doggerel</b>	Comic verse composed in irregular rhythm. <i>He had heard some silly <b>doggerel</b> that kept running through his mind.</i>
<b>epigram</b>	A short poem, especially a satirical one, with a witty or ingenious ending. <i>A Wildean <b>epigram</b>.</i>
<b>fiction</b>	Literature in the form of prose that describes imaginary events and people. <i>The notion of the country being a democracy is a polite <b>fiction</b>.</i>
<b>intersperse</b>	Diversify (a thing or things) with other things at intervals. <i>Deep pools <b>interspersed</b> by shallow shingle banks.</i>
<b>literature</b>	The humanistic study of a body of literature. <i>A great work of <b>literature</b>.</i>
<b>missive</b>	A written message addressed to a person or organization. <i>Yet another <b>missive</b> from the Foreign Office.</i>

<b>ode</b>	A classical poem of a kind originally meant to be sung.
<b>poem</b>	A composition written in metrical feet forming rhythmical lines. <i>The sun is an important symbol in this <b>poem</b>.</i>
<b>poesy</b>	Literature in metrical form. <i>The genius of <b>poesy</b>.</i>
<b>poetry</b>	Something regarded as comparable to poetry in its beauty. <i><b>Poetry</b> and fire are nicely balanced in the music.</i>
<b>quatrain</b>	A stanza of four lines, especially one having alternate rhymes.
<b>read</b>	Habitually read a particular newspaper or periodical. <i>The thermometer <b>read</b> 0 C.</i>
<b>rhyme</b>	Of a poem or song be composed in rhyme. <i>Poetic features such as rhythm <b>rhyme</b> and alliteration.</i>
<b>scattered</b>	(of electromagnetic radiation or particles) deflected or diffused. <i><b>Scattered</b> villages.</i>
<b>sentence</b>	Pronounce a sentence on somebody in a court of law. <i>Ten army officers were <b>sentenced</b> to life imprisonment.</i>
<b>snippet</b>	A small piece or brief extract. <i><b>Snippets</b> of information about the war.</i>
<b>sonnet</b>	Celebrate in a sonnet. <i>He <b>sonneted</b> his hostess now.</i>
<b>stanza</b>	A fixed number of lines of verse forming a unit of a poem.
<b>syllable</b>	A character or characters representing a syllable. <i>The word pocket has two <b>syllables</b>.</i>
<b>verse</b>	Speak in or compose verse versify. <i><b>Verse</b> drama.</i>
<b>writer</b>	A scribe. <i>The <b>writer</b> of the letter.</i>
<b>writing</b>	The activity or skill of writing. <i>The <b>writings</b> of Gertrude Stein.</i>
