Associations of "Prose" (30 Words)

| anthology | A published collection of poems or other pieces of writing. <i>An anthology of European poetry.</i> |
| antiphon | A musical setting of an antiphon. |
| assonant | Having the same sound (especially the same vowel sound) occurring in successive stressed syllables. <i>Note the assonant words and syllables in tilting at windmills.</i> |
| broadcast | Broadcast over the airwaves as in radio or television. <i>The Queen s annual Christmas TV broadcast.</i> |
| clipping | The act of clipping or snipping. <i>He searched through piles of letters and clippings.</i> |
| couplet | Two items of the same kind. |
| cutting | The act of cutting something into parts. <i>Take cuttings of Christmas cactus and pot them on.</i> |
| disperse | Denoting a phase dispersed in another phase as in a colloid. <i>The crowds dispersed.</i> |
| doggerel | Comic verse composed in irregular rhythm. <i>He had heard some silly doggerel that kept running through his mind.</i> |
| epigram | A short poem, especially a satirical one, with a witty or ingenious ending. <i>A Wildean epigram.</i> |
| fiction | Literature in the form of prose that describes imaginary events and people. <i>The notion of the country being a democracy is a polite fiction.</i> |
| intersperse | Diversify (a thing or things) with other things at intervals. <i>Deep pools interspersed by shallow shingle banks.</i> |
| literature | The humanistic study of a body of literature. <i>A great work of literature.</i> |
| missive | A written message addressed to a person or organization. <i>Yet another missive from the Foreign Office.</i> |

| ode | A classical poem of a kind originally meant to be sung. |
| poem | A composition written in metrical feet forming rhythmical lines. <i>The sun is an important symbol in this poem.</i> |
| poesy | Literature in metrical form. <i>The genius of poesy.</i> |
| poetry | Something regarded as comparable to poetry in its beauty. <i>Poetry and fire are nicely balanced in the music.</i> |
| quatrain | A stanza of four lines, especially one having alternate rhymes. |
| read | Habitually read a particular newspaper or periodical. <i>The thermometer read 0 C.</i> |
| rhyme | Of a poem or song be composed in rhyme. <i>Poetic features such as rhythm rhyme and alliteration.</i> |
| scattered | (of electromagnetic radiation or particles) deflected or diffused. <i>Scattered villages.</i> |
| sentence | Pronounce a sentence on somebody in a court of law. <i>Ten army officers were sentenced to life imprisonment.</i> |
| snippet | A small piece or brief extract. <i>Snippets of information about the war.</i> |
| sonnet | Celebrate in a sonnet. <i>He sonneted his hostess now.</i> |
| stanza | A fixed number of lines of verse forming a unit of a poem. |
| syllable | A character or characters representing a syllable. <i>The word pocket has two syllables.</i> |
| verse | Speak in or compose verse versify. <i>Verse drama.</i> |
| writer | A scribe. <i>The writer of the letter.</i> |
| writing | The activity or skill of writing. <i>The writings of Gertrude Stein.</i> |
