- *Bring a criminal action against (in a trial).*
- *Institute or conduct legal proceedings against (a person or organization).*
- *Carry on (a trade or pursuit).*
- *Continue with (a course of action) with a view to its completion.*
- *Conduct a prosecution in a court of law.*

<b>carry out</b>	Have on the surface or on the skin.
<b>carry through</b>	Continue or extend.
<b><u>charge</u></b>	File a formal charge against. <b>Charge</b> the wagon with hay.
<b><u>cite</u></b>	Commend. <i>He does not <b>cite</b> any source for this assertion.</i>
<b>complete</b>	Complete or carry out. <i>A child would <b>complete</b> the family.</i>
<b>conduct</b>	Transmit a form of energy such as heat or electricity by conduction. <b>Conduct</b> an orchestra Barenboim <b>conducted</b> the Chicago symphony for years.
<b>continue</b>	Continue in a place position or situation. <b>Continue</b> the family tradition.
<b>continue with</b>	Exist over a prolonged period of time.
<b>direct</b>	Plan and direct a complex undertaking. <i>Can you <b>direct</b> me to the railway station please.</i>
<b>discharge</b>	Go off or discharge. <i>First time bankrupts are <b>discharged</b> automatically after three years.</i>
<b>do</b>	Get something done. <i>I was speeding <b>doing</b> seventy five.</i>
<b>effect</b>	Act so as to bring into existence. <b>Effect</b> a change.
<b>enact</b>	Act out (a role or play) on stage. <i>She <b>reenacted</b> what had happened earlier that day.</i>
<b>enforce</b>	Press home (a demand or argument). <i>There is no outside agency to <b>enforce</b> cooperation between the players.</i>

<b><u>engage</u></b>	Engage for service under a term of contract. <i>She had offered to <b>engage</b> a room in the house of the woman.</i>
<b>engage in</b>	Carry on (wars, battles, or campaigns).
<b><u>engineer</u></b>	Design as an engineer. <i>She <b>engineered</b> another meeting with him.</i>
<b><u>fulfil</u></b>	Achieve or realize (something desired, promised, or predicted). <i>Arts grants go to young people who say they wish to <b>fulfil</b> themselves.</i>
<b>go ahead with</b>	Move away from a place into another direction.
<b>implement</b>	Put (a decision, plan, agreement, etc.) into effect. <i>He <b>implemented</b> a new economic plan.</i>
<b><u>indict</u></b>	Accuse formally of a crime. <i>His former manager was <b>indicted</b> for fraud.</i>
<b>institute legal proceedings against</b>	Advance or set forth in court.
<b>keep on with</b>	Supply with room and board.
<b>perform</b>	Carry out or perform an action. <i>When I go to bed with any other woman I am quite unable to <b>perform</b>.</i>
<b>prefer charges against</b>	Promote over another.
<b>proceed with</b>	Follow a certain course.
<b><u>pursue</u></b>	Carry further or advance. <i>We shall not <b>pursue</b> the matter any further.</i>
<b>put in the dock</b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location.
<b>put into effect</b>	Adapt.
<b>put into practice</b>	Make an investment.
<b>put on trial</b>	Adapt.
<b>realize</b>	Make (a profit) from a transaction. <i>His worst fears have been <b>realized</b>.</i>
<b>sue</b>	Institute legal proceedings against; file a suit against. <i>The rebels were forced to <b>sue</b> for peace.</i>
<b>summons</b>	Serve someone with a summons. <i>He has been <b>summonsed</b> to appear in court next month.</i>
<b>take legal action against</b>	Be capable of holding or containing.
<b>take to court</b>	Take into one's possession.

Prepare for crops.

<b>enforcement</b>	The act of enforcing; ensuring observance of or obedience to. <i>The strict <b>enforcement</b> of environmental regulations.</i>
<b>ethology</b>	The branch of zoology that studies the behavior of animals in their natural habitats.
<b>feasibly</b>	In a way that possible or practical to do or achieve. <i>We take customer feedback very seriously and strive to make additional improvements that can be met <b>feasibly</b>.</i>
<b>fulfil</b>	Fill or meet a want or need. <i>He wouldn't be able to <b>fulfil</b> his ambition to visit Naples.</i>
<b>fulfill</b>	Put in effect.
<b>fulfillment</b>	The act of consummating something (a desire or promise etc).
<b>instigator</b>	A person who brings about or initiates something. <i>She was the <b>instigator</b> of their quarrel.</i>
