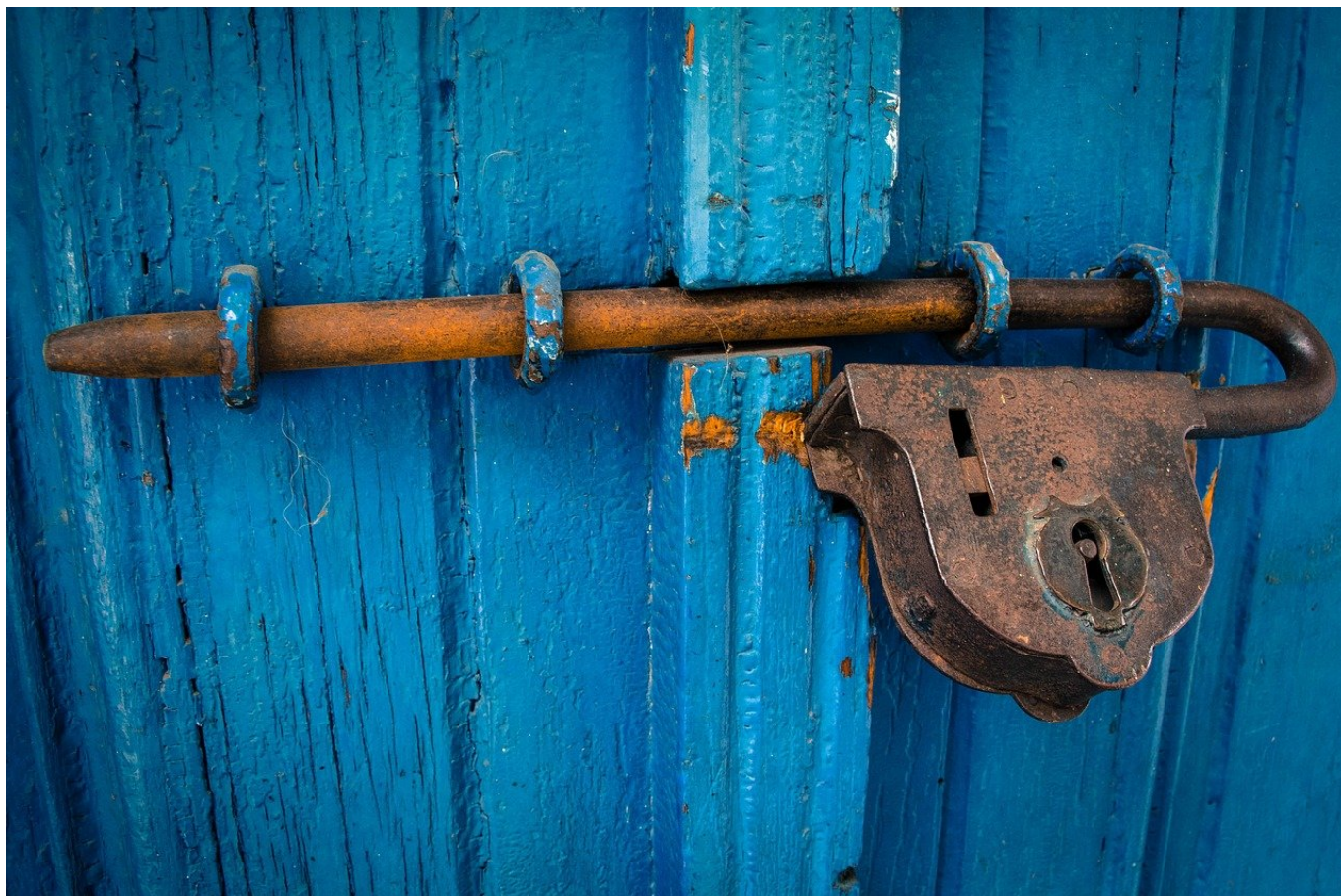
<u>careful</u>	Full of cares or anxiety-Luke 10.41. <i>Careful about one's behavior.</i>
caring	Feeling and exhibiting concern and empathy for others. <i>A caring and invaluable friend.</i>
<u>chivalrous</u>	Courteous and gallant, especially towards women (typically used of a man or his behaviour). <i>The concept of chivalrous combat.</i>
covering	(of shooting) carried out to protect an exposed person from an enemy. <i>We retreated behind spurts of covering fire.</i>
<u>defensive</u>	Used or intended to defend or protect. <i>A poor defensive record.</i>
fatherly	Like or befitting a father or fatherhood; kind and protective. <i>He gave me such a kind and fatherly look.</i>

<u>gallant</u>	Lively and spirited. <i>Put up a gallant resistance to the attackers.</i>
maternal	Related through the mother's side of the family. Maternal care.
<u>mindful</u>	Focusing one's awareness on the present moment, especially as part of a therapeutic or meditative technique. <i>The judge said that he was not mindful to postpone the eviction again.</i>
<u>motherly</u>	Of, resembling, or characteristic of a mother, especially in being caring, protective, and kind. <i>She held both her arms wide in a gesture of motherly love.</i>
paternal	Characteristic of a father. <i>His father and paternal grandfather were porcelain painters.</i>
precautionary	Carried out as a precaution; preventive. <i>I would take precautionary steps to keep him away.</i>
preservative	Tending or having the power to preserve. <i>The preservative effects of freezing.</i>
preventative	Tending to prevent or hinder. Preventative medicine.
preventive	Preventing or contributing to the prevention of disease. Preventive medicine.
protecting	Shielding (or designed to shield) against harm or discomfort. <i>The protecting blanket of snow.</i>
solicitous	Characterized by or showing interest or concern. <i>A solicitous enquiry.</i>
vigilant	Keeping careful watch for possible danger or difficulties. <i>The burglar was spotted by vigilant neighbours.</i>
warm	Having or displaying warmth or affection. <i>A warm winter coat.</i>
wary	Feeling or showing caution about possible dangers or problems. <i>Dogs which have been mistreated often remain very wary of strangers.</i>
watchful	Watching someone or something closely; alert and vigilant. <i>Twenty watchful weary tedious nights.</i>

angel	A former English coin minted between the reigns of Edward IV and Charles I and bearing the figure of the archangel Michael killing a dragon. <i>I miss you too angel.</i>
aseptic	Free of or using methods to keep free of pathological microorganisms. <i>Aseptic surgical techniques.</i>
contraceptive	(of a method or device) serving to prevent pregnancy. <i>The contraceptive pill.</i>
defence	The action of defending from or resisting attack. <i>He spoke in defence of a disciplined approach.</i>
<u>defensive</u>	An attitude of defensiveness especially in the phrase on the defensive. <i>Defensive weapons.</i>
disinfectant	A chemical liquid that destroys bacteria. <i>A cat won't use its litter box if it's cleaned with smelly disinfectants.</i>

enclosure	An area that is surrounded by a barrier. <i>One of the chief effects of enclosure was to increase the number of landless workers.</i>
fortification	Defensive structure consisting of walls or mounds built around a stronghold to strengthen it. <i>The building and maintenance of fortifications.</i>
fungicide	A chemical that destroys fungus. <i>Cut away any rotten parts before dusting with fungicide.</i>
guard	The person who plays the position of guard on a basketball team. <i>An insurance policy is a good safeguard.</i>
<u>guardian</u>	A person who is legally responsible for the care of someone who is unable to manage their own affairs, especially a child whose parents have died. <i>Self appointed guardians of public morality.</i>
helmet	A hard or padded protective hat, various types of which are worn by soldiers, police officers, motorcyclists, sports players, and others.
herbicide	A chemical agent that destroys plants or inhibits their growth. <i>Farmers sprayed a protected wildflower meadow with herbicide.</i>
hinderance	The act of hindering or obstructing or impeding.
insecticide	A chemical used to kill insects. <i>The timber can be treated with insecticide.</i>
munition	Military weapons ammunition equipment and stores. <i>It never had the defence industry necessary to equip or munition its forces.</i>
pesticide	A substance used for destroying insects or other organisms harmful to cultivated plants or to animals.
preclusive	Preventing something from happening; restrictive. <i>No preclusive action was taken.</i>
<u>preemptive</u>	Designed or having the power to deter or prevent an anticipated situation or occurrence. <i>A preemptive business offer.</i>
preservative	Acting to preserve something. <i>Timbers should be treated with a preservative substance.</i>
prevent	Stop (someone) from doing something. <i>We must prevent the cancer from spreading.</i>
preventive	Remedy that prevents or slows the course of an illness or disease. <i>Preventive medicine.</i>
prohibitory	Tending to discourage (especially of prices).

prophylactic	A medicine or course of action used to prevent disease. <i>I took malaria prophylactics.</i>
<u>protector</u>	The title of the head of state in England during the later period of the Commonwealth between 1653 and 1659, first Oliver Cromwell (1653–8), then his son Richard (1658–9). <i>A man who became her protector adviser and friend.</i>
safe	Strongbox where valuables can be safely kept. <i>Eggs remain in the damp sand safe from marine predators.</i>
sweetener	A substance used to sweeten food or drink, especially one other than sugar. <i>A sweetener may persuade them to sell.</i>
tutelar	Providing protective supervision; watching over or safeguarding. <i>Tutelary gods.</i>
tutelary	Serving as a protector, guardian, or patron. <i>Tutelary gods.</i>
