- Swell or protrude outwards.






Synonyms of "Protrude" as a verb (26 Words)

| hang out | Be placed in position as by a hinge. |



| jut | Extend out, over, or beyond the main body or line of something. A rock jut ted out from the side of the bank. |

| <u>loom</u> | Weave on a loom. Another air plane loom ed into the sky. |

| obtrude | Thrust oneself in as if by force. A sound from the reception hall obtrude d into his thoughts. |
| <u>peek</u> | Throw a glance at; take a brief look at. I only peek ed I didn t see anything interesting. |
| <u>poke</u> | Prod and stir a fire with a poker to make it burn more fiercely. Don t forget to poke holes in the dough to allow steam to escape. |
| poke out | Hit hard with the hand, fist, or some heavy instrument. |
| pop | Hit a pop fly. <i>He popped the petit four into his mouth.</i> |
| pop out | Take drugs, especially orally. |
| pouch | Put into a pouch. Hick pouch ed his fourth catch with ease. |
| project | Draw a projection of. Spending was project ed at 72 900 million. |
| stand out | Occupy a place or location, also metaphorically. |
| start | Play in the starting lineup. Below Roaring Springs the real desert start s. |
| stick out | Pierce with a thrust using a pointed instrument. |
| stick up | Saddle with something disagreeable or disadvantageous. |
| sticking out | Fasten with or as with pins or nails. |






Usage Examples of "Protrude" as a verb

| lace | Of a garment or shoe be fastened by means of laces. Rosina lace d her up tight to show off her neat waist. |
| machination | A plot or scheme. |
| mount | A mounting consisting of a piece of metal as in a ring or other jewelry that holds a gem in place. Mount a theater production. |
| overhang | A quantity of securities or commodities large enough to make prices fall if offered for sale. <i>He crouched beneath an overhang of bushes.</i> |
| pinch | Make ridges into by pinching together. Mrs Grandison s pointed Italian style shoes were already beginning to pinch her feet. |
| porcupine | A large rodent with defensive spines or quills on the body and tail. |
| proffer | An offer or proposal. She proffer ed a glass of wine. |
| project | Extend out or project in space. <i>He strives to project an image of youth.</i> |
| projection | The projection of an image from a film onto a screen. <i>Quality illustrations for overhead projection.</i> |
