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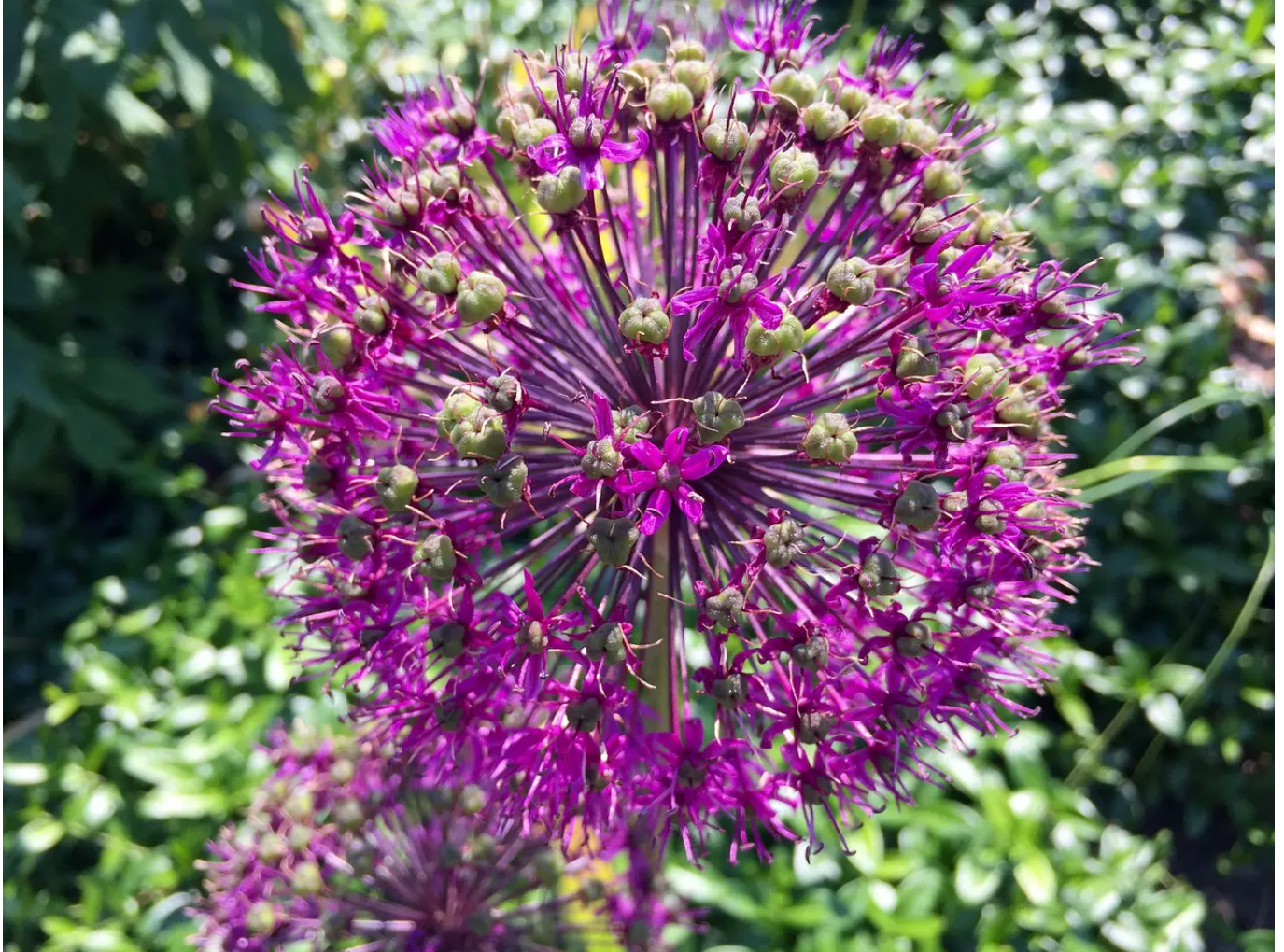

Definitions of "Protrude" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “protrude” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Bulge outward.*
- *Extend beyond or above a surface.*
- *(of an animal) cause (a body part) to protrude.*
- *Extend out or project in space.*
- *Swell or protrude outwards.*



Synonyms of "Protrude" as a verb (26 Words)

bug out	Tap a telephone or telegraph wire to get information.
bulge	Cause to bulge or swell outwards. <i>His stomach bulged after the huge meal.</i>
bulge out	Bulge outward.
come out	Extend or reach.
come through	Come to pass; arrive, as in due course.
extend	Thrust or extend out. <i>The King extended his rule to the Eastern part of the continent.</i>
hang out	Be placed in position as by a hinge.

jut	Extend out, over, or beyond the main body or line of something. <i>A rock jutted out from the side of the bank.</i>
jut out	Extend out or project in space.
jutting	Extend out or project in space.
jutting out	Extend out or project in space.
loom	Weave on a loom. <i>Another air plane loomed into the sky.</i>
loom out	Come into view indistinctly, often threateningly.
obtrude	Thrust oneself in as if by force. <i>A sound from the reception hall obtruded into his thoughts.</i>
peek	Throw a glance at; take a brief look at. <i>I only peeked I didn't see anything interesting.</i>
poke	Prod and stir a fire with a poker to make it burn more fiercely. <i>Don't forget to poke holes in the dough to allow steam to escape.</i>
poke out	Hit hard with the hand, fist, or some heavy instrument.
pop	Hit a pop fly. <i>He popped the petit four into his mouth.</i>
pop out	Take drugs, especially orally.
pouch	Put into a pouch. <i>Hick pouched his fourth catch with ease.</i>
project	Draw a projection of. <i>Spending was projected at 72 900 million.</i>
stand out	Occupy a place or location, also metaphorically.
start	Play in the starting lineup. <i>Below Roaring Springs the real desert starts.</i>
stick out	Pierce with a thrust using a pointed instrument.
stick up	Saddle with something disagreeable or disadvantageous.
sticking out	Fasten with or as with pins or nails.



Usage Examples of "Protrude" as a verb

- *When attacking, it protrudes its long snout.*

extend	Extend or stretch out to a greater or the full length. <i>Extend the casserole with a little rice.</i>
fill	The action of filling something especially of shading in a region of a computer graphics display. <i>A fill of tobacco.</i>
forward	Moving forward. <i>Forward my mail.</i>
fruition	Something that is made real or concrete. <i>The apples in the orchards gave a suggestion of sour fruition.</i>
hammer	Strike or knock at or on something violently with one s hand or with a hammer or other object. <i>Willis was hammered in the recession.</i>
impale	Display (a coat of arms) side by side with another on the same shield, separated by a vertical line. <i>His head was impaled on a pike and exhibited for all to see.</i>
jut	Extend out or project in space. <i>His sharp nose jutted out.</i>
lace	Of a garment or shoe be fastened by means of laces. <i>Rosina laced her up tight to show off her neat waist.</i>
machination	A plot or scheme.
mount	A mounting consisting of a piece of metal as in a ring or other jewelry that holds a gem in place. <i>Mount a theater production.</i>
overhang	A quantity of securities or commodities large enough to make prices fall if offered for sale. <i>He crouched beneath an overhang of bushes.</i>
pinch	Make ridges into by pinching together. <i>Mrs Grandison s pointed Italian style shoes were already beginning to pinch her feet.</i>
porcupine	A large rodent with defensive spines or quills on the body and tail.
proffer	An offer or proposal. <i>She proffered a glass of wine.</i>
project	Extend out or project in space. <i>He strives to project an image of youth.</i>
projection	The projection of an image from a film onto a screen. <i>Quality illustrations for overhead projection.</i>

proposal	The act of making a proposal. <i>They listened to her proposal.</i>
protrusion	The act of projecting out from something. <i>A protrusion of rock jutted from the mountainside.</i>
protuberance	The condition of being protuberant; the condition of bulging out. <i>The large size and protuberance of the incisors.</i>
<u>spike</u>	Bring forth a spike or spikes. <i>The punch is spiked.</i>
spindle	A Eurasian shrub or small tree with slender toothed leaves and pink capsules containing bright orange seeds Its hard timber was formerly used for making spindles. <i>Chromosomes are distributed by spindles in mitosis and meiosis.</i>
<u>stake</u>	Support a plant with a stake or stakes. <i>Stake your goat.</i>
start	Give a signal to competitors to start in a race. <i>Prices for these homes start at 250 000.</i>
transfix	To render motionless, as with a fixed stare or by arousing terror or awe. <i>She stared at him transfixed.</i>
undertaking	The action of undertaking to do something. <i>The knowing undertaking of an obligation.</i>
