assurance	A binding commitment to do or give or refrain from something. <i>He gave an assurance that work would begin on Monday.</i>



<u>authentic</u>	Made or done in the traditional or original way, or in a way that faithfully resembles an original. An authentic signature.
authenticated	Established as genuine.
authorized	Sanctioned by established authority. <i>Authorized</i> access to the computer.
<u>certain</u>	Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured. Was sure or certain she had seen it.
certified	Fit to be certified as insane and treated accordingly. A certified accountant.
certitude	Total certainty or greater certainty than circumstances warrant. The collapse of the old political certitude s in eastern Europe.
clinically	In a clinical manner. He has been diagnosed as clinically depressed.
convinced	Having a strong belief or conviction. I am convinced the war will be over in a matter of months.
<u>credible</u>	Capable of persuading people that something will happen or be successful. <i>She was not the credible fool he expected.</i>
<u>definite</u>	Known for certain. No definite proof has emerged.
dependable	Consistent in performance or behavior. A dependable supply of cold beer.
<u>documented</u>	Furnished with or supported by documents. The first documented case of shark attack in those waters.
<u>empirical</u>	Derived from experiment and observation rather than theory. An empirical basis for an ethical theory.
encyclopedia	A book or set of books giving information on many subjects or on many aspects of one subject and typically arranged alphabetically.
established	Brought about or set up or accepted especially long established. Thick established plants can be pruned by cutting out about one third of all stems.
<u>faithful</u>	Those who are faithful to a particular religion or political party. <i>Years of faithful service</i> .
foolproof	Not liable to failure. A foolproof identification system.
medically	In a way that relates to the science or practice of medicine. <i>Medically</i> trained staff.



observable	Capable of being seen or noticed. <i>Observable</i> differences.
plausible	Given to or characterized by presenting specious arguments. <i>A plausible liar.</i>
registered	Of a letter or parcel sent by registered post. A registered Percheron.
reliable	A reliable person or thing. A reliable source of information.
scientifically	In a systematic or methodical manner. Everything is planned out scientifically .
<u>specimen</u>	Used to refer humorously to a person or animal. They collected a urine specimen for urinalysis.
tested	Tested and proved useful or correct. A tested method.
trustworthy	Able to be relied on as honest or truthful. A trustworthy report.
<u>verifiable</u>	Capable of being verified. A verifiable account of the incident.
verified	Proved to be true. A verified claim.
