credible Capable of persuading people that something will happen or be successful.

definite Known for certain.

No **definite** proof has emerged.

Consistent in performance or behavior.

dependable

A dependable supply of cold beer.

documented Furnished with or supported by documents.

The first **documented** case of shark attack in those waters.

empirical Derived from experiment and observation rather than theory.

An **empirical** basis for an ethical theory.

encyclopedia

A book or set of books giving information on many subjects or on many

aspects of one subject and typically arranged alphabetically.

Brought about or set up or accepted especially long established.

established Thick **established** plants can be pruned by cutting out about one third of

all stems.
