### **Definitions of "Proven" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “proven” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Demonstrated by evidence or argument to be true or existing.*
- *(of a new method, system, or treatment) tried and tested.*
- *Established beyond doubt.*

<b>accuracy</b>	The quality of being near to the true value. <i>The <b>accuracy</b> of radiocarbon dating.</i>
<b>assurance</b>	A binding commitment to do or give or refrain from something. <i>He gave an <b>assurance</b> that work would begin on Monday.</i>

<b><u>authentic</u></b>	Made or done in the traditional or original way, or in a way that faithfully resembles an original. <i>An <b>authentic</b> signature.</i>
<b>authenticated</b>	Established as genuine.
<b>authorized</b>	Sanctioned by established authority. <i><b>Authorized</b> access to the computer.</i>
<b><u>certain</u></b>	Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured. <i>Was sure or <b>certain</b> she had seen it.</i>
<b>certified</b>	Fit to be certified as insane and treated accordingly. <i>A <b>certified</b> accountant.</i>
<b>certitude</b>	Total certainty or greater certainty than circumstances warrant. <i>The collapse of the old political <b>certitudes</b> in eastern Europe.</i>
<b>clinically</b>	In a clinical manner. <i>He has been diagnosed as <b>clinically</b> depressed.</i>
<b>convinced</b>	Having a strong belief or conviction. <i>I am <b>convinced</b> the war will be over in a matter of months.</i>
<b><u>credible</u></b>	Capable of persuading people that something will happen or be successful. <i>She was not the <b>credible</b> fool he expected.</i>
<b><u>definite</u></b>	Known for certain. <i>No <b>definite</b> proof has emerged.</i>
<b>dependable</b>	Consistent in performance or behavior. <i>A <b>dependable</b> supply of cold beer.</i>
<b><u>documented</u></b>	Furnished with or supported by documents. <i>The first <b>documented</b> case of shark attack in those waters.</i>
<b><u>empirical</u></b>	Derived from experiment and observation rather than theory. <i>An <b>empirical</b> basis for an ethical theory.</i>
<b>encyclopedia</b>	A book or set of books giving information on many subjects or on many aspects of one subject and typically arranged alphabetically.
<b>established</b>	Brought about or set up or accepted especially long established. <i>Thick <b>established</b> plants can be pruned by cutting out about one third of all stems.</i>
<b><u>faithful</u></b>	Those who are faithful to a particular religion or political party. <i>Years of <b>faithful</b> service.</i>
<b>foolproof</b>	Not liable to failure. <i>A <b>foolproof</b> identification system.</i>
<b>medically</b>	In a way that relates to the science or practice of medicine. <i><b>Medically</b> trained staff.</i>

<b>observable</b>	Capable of being seen or noticed. <i><b>Observable</b> differences.</i>
<b>plausible</b>	Given to or characterized by presenting specious arguments. <i>A <b>plausible</b> liar.</i>
<b>registered</b>	Of a letter or parcel sent by registered post. <i>A <b>registered</b> Percheron.</i>
<b>reliable</b>	A reliable person or thing. <i>A <b>reliable</b> source of information.</i>
<b>scientifically</b>	In a systematic or methodical manner. <i>Everything is planned out <b>scientifically</b>.</i>
<u><b>specimen</b></u>	Used to refer humorously to a person or animal. <i>They collected a urine <b>specimen</b> for urinalysis.</i>
<u><b>tested</b></u>	Tested and proved useful or correct. <i>A <b>tested</b> method.</i>
<u><b>trustworthy</b></u>	Able to be relied on as honest or truthful. <i>A <b>trustworthy</b> report.</i>
<u><b>verifiable</b></u>	Capable of being verified. <i>A <b>verifiable</b> account of the incident.</i>
<b>verified</b>	Proved to be true. <i>A <b>verified</b> claim.</i>
