<b>adeptness</b>	The quality of being sufficient for the end in view. <i>His quick <b>adeptness</b> was a product of good design.</i>
<b>adroitness</b>	Cleverness or skill. <i>He lacks political <b>adroitness</b>.</i>
<b><a href="#">aptitude</a></b>	A natural tendency. <i>Children with an <b>aptitude</b> for painting and drawing.</i>
<b>art</b>	The products of human creativity works of art collectively. <i><b>Art</b> does not need to be innovative to be good.</i>

<b>artistry</b>	A superior skill that you can learn by study and practice and observation. <i>The <b>artistry</b> of the pianist.</i>
<b>audacity</b>	Fearless daring. <i>He whistled at the sheer <b>audacity</b> of the plan.</i>
<b>boldness</b>	Confidence to an impudent or presumptuous degree. <i>They had the <b>boldness</b> to mock a man who had served his country.</i>
<b>braveness</b>	People who are brave.
<b>bravery</b>	A quality of spirit that enables you to face danger or pain without showing fear. <i>Perhaps I ll get a medal for <b>bravery</b>.</i>
<b>capability</b>	The extent of someone's or something's ability. <i>The company s <b>capability</b> to increase productivity.</i>
<b>capacity</b>	The total cylinder volume that is swept by the pistons in an internal combustion engine. <i>A great <b>capacity</b> for growth.</i>
<b>competence</b>	The ability to do something successfully or efficiently. <i>The court s <b>competence</b> has been accepted to cover these matters.</i>
<b>competency</b>	The quality of being adequately or well qualified physically and intellectually.
<b>courage</b>	The ability to do something that frightens one; bravery. <i>She called on all her <b>courage</b> to face the ordeal.</i>
<b>courageousness</b>	A quality of spirit that enables you to face danger or pain without showing fear.
<b>daring</b>	The trait of being willing to undertake things that involve risk or danger. <i>The <b>daring</b> of the players brings fortune or ruin.</i>
<b>dauntlessness</b>	Resolute courageousness.
<b>deftness</b>	Skillful performance or ability without difficulty.
<b><u>dexterity</u></b>	Adroitness in using the hands. <i>His record testifies to a certain <b>dexterity</b> in politics.</i>
<b>effectiveness</b>	The degree to which something is successful in producing a desired result; success. <i>The <b>effectiveness</b> of the treatment.</i>
<b>excellence</b>	The quality of excelling; possessing good qualities in high degree. <i>A centre of academic <b>excellence</b>.</i>

<b>experience</b>	The knowledge or skill acquired by a period of practical experience of something especially that gained in a particular profession. <i>He had a religious <b>experience</b>.</i>
<b>expertise</b>	Expert skill or knowledge in a particular field. <i>Technical <b>expertise</b>.</i>
<b>expertness</b>	Skillfulness by virtue of possessing special knowledge.
<b>facility</b>	A place, amenity, or piece of equipment provided for a particular purpose. <i>He had a <b>facility</b> for languages.</i>
<b>fearlessness</b>	The trait of feeling no fear. <i>She quickly earned a reputation for <b>fearlessness</b>.</i>
<b>finesse</b>	(in bridge and whist) an attempt to win a trick with a card that is not a certain winner, typically by playing it as the third card in a trick in the hope that any card that could beat it is in the hand of the opponent who has already played. <i>Clients want advice and action that calls for considerable <b>finesse</b>.</i>
<b>gallantry</b>	Courtesy towards women. <i>A medal awarded for outstanding <b>gallantry</b> during the raid.</i>
<b>gameness</b>	Disability of walking due to crippling of the legs or feet.
<b>genius</b>	Exceptional intellectual or creative power or other natural ability. <i>A mathematical <b>genius</b>.</i>
<b>hardihood</b>	Boldness; daring.
<b>heroism</b>	The qualities of a hero or heroine; exceptional or heroic courage when facing danger (especially in battle). <i>They fought with exemplary <b>heroism</b>.</i>
<b>intrepidity</b>	Resolute courageousness.
<b>know-how</b>	The (technical) knowledge and skill required to do something.
<b>manfulness</b>	The trait of being manly; having the characteristics of an adult male.
<b>mastery</b>	Comprehensive knowledge or skill in a particular subject or activity. <i>Man s <b>mastery</b> over nature.</i>
<b>nerve</b>	Any bundle of nerve fibers running to various organs and tissues of the body. <i>You ve got a <b>nerve</b> coming here.</i>
<b>pluck</b>	The heart, liver, and lungs of an animal as food. <i>It must have taken a lot of <b>pluck</b> to walk along a path marked Danger.</i>
<b>pluckiness</b>	The trait of showing courage and determination in spite of possible loss or injury.

<b>professionalism</b>	The competence or skill expected of a professional. <i>The trend towards <b>professionalism</b>.</i>
<b>proficiency</b>	Skillfulness in the command of fundamentals deriving from practice and familiarity. <i>Practice greatly improves <b>proficiency</b>.</i>
<b>skill</b>	Ability to produce solutions in some problem domain. <i>Difficult work taking great <b>skill</b>.</i>
<b>spirit</b>	A person's mood. <i>A priest performed a rite of exorcism and the wandering <b>spirit</b> was ousted.</i>
<b>talent</b>	A former weight and unit of currency, used especially by the ancient Romans and Greeks. <i>I signed all the <b>talent</b> in Rome.</i>
<b>valour</b>	Great courage in the face of danger, especially in battle. <i>The medals are awarded for acts of <b>valour</b>.</i>

<b>coolness</b>	The quality of lacking friendliness or enthusiasm. <i>His greatest strength is his <b>coolness</b> under pressure.</i>
<b>courage</b>	Strength in the face of pain or grief. <i>He fought his illness with great <b>courage</b>.</i>
<b>daring</b>	Adventurous courage. <i>The most <b>daring</b> of contemporary fiction writers.</i>
<b>encouraged</b>	Inspired with confidence.
<b>fore</b>	Situated or placed in front. <i>The captain went <b>fore</b> or forward to check the instruments.</i>
<b>fortitude</b>	Strength of mind that enables one to endure adversity with courage. <i>She endured her illness with great <b>fortitude</b>.</i>
<b>gall</b>	A digestive juice secreted by the liver and stored in the gallbladder aids in the digestion of fats. <i>Accept life s <b>gall</b> without blaming somebody else.</i>
<b>gallantry</b>	Courtesy towards women. <i>What men call <b>gallantry</b> and the gods adultery.</i>
<b>hero</b>	The principal character in a play or movie or novel or poem. <i>Jumpsuits are hands down our hottest <b>hero</b> piece right now.</i>
<b>impudence</b>	The trait of being rude and impertinent; inclined to take liberties. <i>His arrogance and <b>impudence</b> had offended many.</i>
<b>indomitable</b>	Impossible to subdue. <i>A woman of <b>indomitable</b> spirit.</i>
<b>manliness</b>	The traditional male quality of being brave and strong. <i>The author s alleged lack of <b>manliness</b>.</i>
<b>mettle</b>	A person's ability to cope well with difficulties; spirit and resilience. <i>The team showed their true <b>mettle</b> in the second half.</i>
<b>resourcefulness</b>	The ability to deal resourcefully with unusual problems. <i>A man of great <b>resourcefulness</b>.</i>
<b>robust</b>	(of wine or food) strong and rich in flavour or smell. <i>A <b>robust</b> body.</i>
<b>temerity</b>	Fearless daring. <i>No one had the <b>temerity</b> to question his conclusions.</i>
<b>unflinching</b>	Not showing fear or hesitation in the face of danger or difficulty. <i>He has shown <b>unflinching</b> determination throughout the campaign.</i>

- valiant** Possessing or showing courage or determination.  
*A **valiant** attempt to prevent the hijack.*
- valor** The qualities of a hero or heroine; exceptional or heroic courage when facing danger (especially in battle).  
*He received a medal for **valor**.*
- valorous** Showing great courage in the face of danger, especially in battle.  
***Valorous** deeds on the field of honour.*
- venturous** Disposed to venture or take risks.  
*A **venturous** spirit.*
- virility** (in a man) the quality of having strength, energy, and a strong sex drive; manliness.  
*Great importance is placed on a man's **virility**.*
