bravery	A quality of spirit that enables you to face danger or pain without showing fear. <i>Perhaps I ll get a medal for bravery.</i>
capability	The extent of someone's or something's ability. <i>The company s capability to increase productivity.</i>
capacity	The total cylinder volume that is swept by the pistons in an internal combustion engine. <i>A great capacity for growth.</i>
competence	The ability to do something successfully or efficiently. <i>The court s competence has been accepted to cover these matters.</i>
competency	The quality of being adequately or well qualified physically and intellectually.
courage	The ability to do something that frightens one; bravery. <i>She called on all her courage to face the ordeal.</i>
courageousness	A quality of spirit that enables you to face danger or pain without showing fear.
daring	The trait of being willing to undertake things that involve risk or danger. <i>The daring of the players brings fortune or ruin.</i>
dauntlessness	Resolute courageousness.
deftness	Skillful performance or ability without difficulty.
<u>dexterity</u>	Adroitness in using the hands. <i>His record testifies to a certain dexterity in politics.</i>
effectiveness	The degree to which something is successful in producing a desired result; success. <i>The effectiveness of the treatment.</i>
excellence	The quality of excelling; possessing good qualities in high degree. <i>A centre of academic excellence.</i>

experience	The knowledge or skill acquired by a period of practical experience of something especially that gained in a particular profession. <i>He had a religious experience.</i>
expertise	Expert skill or knowledge in a particular field. <i>Technical expertise.</i>
expertness	Skillfulness by virtue of possessing special knowledge.
facility	A place, amenity, or piece of equipment provided for a particular purpose. <i>He had a facility for languages.</i>
fearlessness	The trait of feeling no fear. <i>She quickly earned a reputation for fearlessness.</i>
finesse	(in bridge and whist) an attempt to win a trick with a card that is not a certain winner, typically by playing it as the third card in a trick in the hope that any card that could beat it is in the hand of the opponent who has already played. <i>Clients want advice and action that calls for considerable finesse.</i>
gallantry	Courtesy towards women. <i>A medal awarded for outstanding gallantry during the raid.</i>
gameness	Disability of walking due to crippling of the legs or feet.
genius	Exceptional intellectual or creative power or other natural ability. <i>A mathematical genius.</i>
hardihood	Boldness; daring.
heroism	The qualities of a hero or heroine; exceptional or heroic courage when facing danger (especially in battle). <i>They fought with exemplary heroism.</i>
intrepidity	Resolute courageousness.
know-how	The (technical) knowledge and skill required to do something.
manfulness	The trait of being manly; having the characteristics of an adult male.
mastery	Comprehensive knowledge or skill in a particular subject or activity. <i>Man s mastery over nature.</i>
nerve	Any bundle of nerve fibers running to various organs and tissues of the body. <i>You ve got a nerve coming here.</i>
pluck	The heart, liver, and lungs of an animal as food. <i>It must have taken a lot of pluck to walk along a path marked Danger.</i>
pluckiness	The trait of showing courage and determination in spite of possible loss or injury.

professionalism	The competence or skill expected of a professional. <i>The trend towards professionalism.</i>
proficiency	Skillfulness in the command of fundamentals deriving from practice and familiarity. <i>Practice greatly improves proficiency.</i>
skill	Ability to produce solutions in some problem domain. <i>Difficult work taking great skill.</i>
spirit	A person's mood. <i>A priest performed a rite of exorcism and the wandering spirit was ousted.</i>
<u>talent</u>	A former weight and unit of currency, used especially by the ancient Romans and Greeks. <i>I signed all the talent in Rome.</i>
valour	Great courage in the face of danger, especially in battle. <i>The medals are awarded for acts of valour.</i>

gall	A digestive juice secreted by the liver and stored in the gallbladder aids in the digestion of fats. <i>Accept life's gall without blaming somebody else.</i>
gallantry	Courtesy towards women. <i>What men call gallantry and the gods adultery.</i>
hero	The principal character in a play or movie or novel or poem. <i>Jumpsuits are hands down our hottest hero piece right now.</i>
impudence	The trait of being rude and impertinent; inclined to take liberties. <i>His arrogance and impudence had offended many.</i>
indomitable	Impossible to subdue. <i>A woman of indomitable spirit.</i>
manliness	The traditional male quality of being brave and strong. <i>The author's alleged lack of manliness.</i>
mettle	A person's ability to cope well with difficulties; spirit and resilience. <i>The team showed their true mettle in the second half.</i>
resourcefulness	The ability to deal resourcefully with unusual problems. <i>A man of great resourcefulness.</i>
robust	(of wine or food) strong and rich in flavour or smell. <i>A robust body.</i>
temerity	Fearless daring. <i>No one had the temerity to question his conclusions.</i>
unflinching	Not showing fear or hesitation in the face of danger or difficulty. <i>He has shown unflinching determination throughout the campaign.</i>

A **valiant** attempt to prevent the hijack.

valor

The qualities of a hero or heroine; exceptional or heroic courage when facing danger (especially in battle.

He received a medal for **valor**.

valorous

Showing great courage in the face of danger, especially in battle.

Valorous deeds on the field of honour.

venturous

Disposed to venture or take risks.

A **venturous** spirit.

virility

(in a man) the quality of having strength, energy, and a strong sex drive; manliness.

Great importance is placed on a man's **virility**.
