Proximity as a Noun

Definitions of "Proximity" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “proximity” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Nearness in space, time, or relationship.*
- *The property of being close together.*
- *A Gestalt principle of organization holding that (other things being equal) objects or events that are near to one another (in space or time) are perceived as belonging together as a unit.*
- *The region close around a person or thing.*



Synonyms of "Proximity" as a noun (7 Words)

- adjacency** The attribute of being so near as to be touching.
- closeness** Close or warm friendship.
*The scoreline did not reflect the **closeness** of the contest.*
- juxtaposition** The fact of two things being seen or placed close together with contrasting effect.
*It is the result of the **juxtaposition** of contrasting colors.*
- law of proximity** The force of policemen and officers.
- nearness** The condition of being near; proximity.
*The town's **nearness** to London.*
- presence** A group of people, especially soldiers or police, stationed in a particular place.
*The **presence** of chlorine in the atmosphere.*

propinquity

The state of being close to someone or something; proximity.
*He kept his distance as though afraid **propinquity** might lead him into temptation.*



Usage Examples of "Proximity" as a noun

- *Do not operate microphones in close proximity to television sets.*

| <u>ambient</u> | Relating to ambient music. <i>The ambient temperature.</i> |
| <u>approximate</u> | Close to the actual, but not completely accurate or exact. <i>Approximate leaves grow together but are not united.</i> |
| approximately | Used to show that something is almost, but not completely, accurate or exact; roughly. <i>Lasted approximately an hour.</i> |
| approximation | The quality of coming near to identity (especially close in quantity). <i>The band smashed up their equipment in an approximation of rock star behaviour.</i> |
| around | All around or on all sides. <i>There was no one around.</i> |
| <u>broadly</u> | Widely and openly. <i>The climate is broadly similar in the two regions.</i> |
| close | Fitting closely but comfortably. <i>Cloth with a close weave.</i> |
| <u>closely</u> | Very affectionately or intimately. <i>Both children are clearly very closely attached to their parents.</i> |
| <u>closeness</u> | Close or warm friendship. <i>The closeness with which he watched current events.</i> |
| <u>distance</u> | Beat a horse by a distance. <i>Watching them from a distance.</i> |
| environ | Surround; enclose. <i>The stone circle was enviored by an expanse of peat soil.</i> |
| equidistant | At equal distances. <i>The line joins together all points which are equidistant from the two axes.</i> |
| <u>familiar</u> | A close friend or associate. <i>Ensure that you are familiar with the heating controls.</i> |

| friend | Add someone to a list of friends or contacts on a social networking website. <i>I am friended by 29 people who I have not friended back.</i> |
| gauge | Measure the dimensions of an object with a gauge. <i>Gauge bricks.</i> |
| generally | In most cases; usually. <i>The best scheme is generally reckoned to be the Canadian one.</i> |
| intimacy | A feeling of being intimate and belonging together. <i>The intimacy between a husband and wife.</i> |
| involvement | A sense of concern with and curiosity about someone or something. <i>She knew that involvement with Adam would only complicate her life.</i> |
| near | Nearly. <i>His nearest approach to success.</i> |
| nearby | Close at hand. <i>Concentrated his study on the nearby planet Venus.</i> |
| nearly | (of actions or states) slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but. <i>In the absence of anyone more nearly related I was designated next of kin.</i> |
| nearness | The spatial property resulting from a relatively small distance. <i>The town's nearness to London.</i> |
| pivotal | Being of crucial importance- Henry Kissinger. <i>A sliding or pivotal motion.</i> |
| proximate | Nearly accurate approximate. <i>Interest in proximate rather than ultimate goals.</i> |
| roughly | With roughness or violence rough is an informal variant for roughly. <i>This is a walk of roughly 13 miles.</i> |
| round | Give a round shape to. <i>I did a newspaper round.</i> |
| thereabout | Near that time or date. <i>Come at noon or thereabouts.</i> |
