Synonyms of "Pseudonym" as a noun (10 Words)

alias	An alternative name or label that refers to a file, command, address, or other item, and can be used to locate or access it. <i>A spy operating under the alias Barsad.</i>
anonym	An anonymous person or publication.
false name	A language unit by which a person or thing is known.
incognito	An assumed or false identity. <i>She is locked in her incognito.</i>
nickname	A familiar name for a person (often a shortened version of a person’s given name). <i>Mallender’s fair complexion gave rise to his nickname Ghost.</i>

nom de guerre	A fictitious name used when the person performs a particular social role.
pen name	A correctional institution for those convicted of major crimes.
professional name	An authority qualified to teach apprentices.
sobriquet	A familiar name for a person (often a shortened version of a person's given name). <i>She was a vast and haughty person who answered to the sobriquet Duchesse.</i>
stage name	A large coach-and-four formerly used to carry passengers and mail on regular routes between towns.

Associations of "Pseudonym" (30 Words)

<u>alias</u>	Misidentify (a signal frequency), introducing distortion or error. <i>A spy operating under the alias Barsad.</i>
anagram	A word, phrase, or name formed by rearranging the letters of another, such as spar, formed from rasp.
anonymity	Lack of outstanding, individual, or unusual features; impersonality. <i>The anonymity of big city life definitely has its advantages.</i>
anonymous	Not known or lacking marked individuality. <i>His impeccable slightly anonymous Chelsea flat.</i>
anonymously	Without giving a name. <i>The anonymously furnished parlour.</i>
author	Be the author of a book or piece of writing. <i>She has authored several articles on wildlife.</i>
ballot	Vote by ballot. <i>He won 54 per cent of the ballot.</i>
<u>blind</u>	Make blind by putting the eyes out. <i>He was going into the interview blind.</i>
election	The predestination of some individuals as objects of divine mercy (especially as conceived by Calvinists). <i>They celebrated his election.</i>

elector	In the US a member of the electoral college. <i>Close to 60 per cent of the 60 000 registered electors voted.</i>
fabricate	Invent (something) in order to deceive. <i>The company fabricates plastic chairs.</i>
fabrication	A deliberately false or improbable account. <i>The assembly and fabrication of electronic products.</i>
figment	A thing that someone believes to be real but that exists only in their imagination. <i>A figment of the imagination.</i>
incognito	With your identity concealed. <i>She is locked in her incognito.</i>
inglorious	Deserving or bringing disgrace or shame- Rachel Carson. <i>Inglorious though the peasants may have been this is not synonymous with mute.</i>
<u>involuntary</u>	Done against someone's will; compulsory. <i>Involuntary muscles.</i>
make	Compel or make somebody or something to act in a certain way. <i>Four and four make eight.</i>
<u>name</u>	Of a person or product having a well known name. <i>He wanted to protect his good name.</i>
nameless	Being or having an unknown or unnamed source. <i>The myths talk about nameless horrors infesting our universe.</i>
reproducible	Capable of being reproduced. <i>Astonishingly reproducible results can be obtained.</i>
<u>scribe</u>	French playwright (1791-1861). <i>Mark the position of the lock body on the door edge then scribe a centre mark.</i>
secret	Given in confidence or in secret. <i>The combination to the safe was a secret.</i>
sobriquet	A person's nickname. <i>She was a vast and haughty person who answered to the sobriquet Duchesse.</i>
<u>unappreciated</u>	Not fully understood, recognized, or valued. <i>She had been brought up in a family where she felt unappreciated and undervalued.</i>
undiagnosed	Not diagnosed or having been subject to diagnosis. <i>Undiagnosed disease.</i>

<u>unfamiliar</u>	Not having knowledge or experience of. <i>He seems unfamiliar with recent research on this topic.</i>
unidentified	Not yet identified. <i>A picture of an unidentified motorcyclist.</i>
unknown	That which is unknown. <i>Exploration into unknown territory.</i>
<u>unnamed</u>	Being or having an unknown or unnamed source. <i>The unnamed man was found unconscious.</i>
<u>vote</u>	Cause someone to gain or lose a particular post or honour by means of a vote. <i>They put the question to a vote.</i>
