<u>intellect</u>	Knowledge and intellectual ability. <i>Sapping our country of some of its brightest intellects.</i>
life force	The period during which something is functional (as between birth and death).
make-up	The way in which someone or something is composed.
mind	An important intellectual. <i>His mind wandered.</i>
nous	Common sense; practical intelligence. <i>She has great social nous.</i>
<u>persona</u>	Jungian psychology a personal facade that one presents to the world. <i>Chris adds that his media persona does not match reality.</i>
personality	A person of considerable prominence. <i>She is a Hollywood personality.</i>
<u>self</u>	Used ironically to refer to oneself or someone else. <i>To love in an unpossessive way implies the total surrender of self.</i>
soul	The human embodiment of something. <i>In the depths of her soul she knew he would betray her.</i>
spirit	A solution of volatile components extracted from something, typically by distillation or by solution in alcohol. <i>He confessed in a spirit of self respect.</i>
<u>subconscious</u>	The subconscious part of the mind not in technical use in psychoanalysis where unconscious is preferred. <i>Uncertainties were lurking around the edge of her subconscious.</i>

<u>haunting</u>	The action of haunting a place. <i>From two handsome and talented young men to two haunting horrors of disintegration.</i>
hypnosis	A state that resembles sleep but that is induced by suggestion. <i>I was regressed under hypnosis.</i>
imbecility	A stupid mistake.
memoir	The proceedings of a learned society. <i>In 1924 she published a short memoir of her husband.</i>
memory	An electronic memory device. <i>Search as he would the memory was lost.</i>
<u>mindful</u>	Inclined or willing to do something. <i>I arrived home for the summer ever mindful of my obligations to my parents.</i>
mnemonic	Of or relating to or involved the practice of aiding the memory. <i>Mnemonic device.</i>
mnemonics	A method or system for improving the memory.
<u>nostalgic</u>	A nostalgic person. <i>A nostalgic account of an idyllic childhood.</i>
parapsychology	Phenomena that appear to contradict physical laws and suggest the possibility of causation by mental processes.
recall	Recall knowledge from memory have a recollection. <i>People s understanding and subsequent recall of stories or events.</i>
recollect	Recall knowledge from memory have a recollection. <i>Can you recollect how he reacted.</i>
<u>recollection</u>	A thing recollected; a memory. <i>To the best of my recollection no one ever had a bad word to say about him.</i>
remember	Show appreciation to. <i>I remember the screech of the horn as the car came towards me.</i>
remembrance	A recognition of meritorious service. <i>I went through the papers and remembrances in his drawers.</i>
reminder	An experience that causes you to remember something. <i>He ignored his wife s reminders.</i>
<u>reminisce</u>	Recall the past. <i>They reminisced about their summers abroad.</i>
reminiscence	A story told about a past event remembered by the narrator. <i>His first works are too full of reminiscences of earlier poetry.</i>

reminiscent	Absorbed in or suggesting absorption in memories. <i>The sights were reminiscent of my childhood.</i>
retention	Failure to eliminate a substance from the body. <i>The soil s retention of moisture.</i>
retentive	Having the capacity to retain something. <i>He had a highly retentive memory and was an accomplished speaker.</i>
rote	Mechanical or habitual repetition of something to be learned. <i>A poem learnt by rote in childhood.</i>
soul	The human embodiment of something. <i>She s a nice old soul.</i>
spiritual	Lacking material body or form or substance. <i>Spiritual beings.</i>
vividly	In a vivid manner. <i>Vividly coloured paintings.</i>
