<u>persona</u>	Jungian psychology a personal facade that one presents to the world. <i>Chris adds that his media <b>persona</b> does not match reality.</i>
personality	A person of considerable prominence. She is a Hollywood <b>personality</b> .
<u>self</u>	Used ironically to refer to oneself or someone else. To love in an unpossessive way implies the total surrender of <b>self</b> .
soul	The human embodiment of something. In the depths of her <b>soul</b> she knew he would betray her.
spirit	A solution of volatile components extracted from something, typically by distillation or by solution in alcohol. <i>He confessed in a <b>spirit</b> of self respect.</i>
<u>subconscious</u>	The subconscious part of the mind not in technical use in psychoanalysis where unconscious is preferred. Uncertainties were lurking around the edge of her <b>subconscious</b> .

<u>mindful</u>	Inclined or willing to do something. <i>I arrived home for the summer ever</i> <b>mindful</b> of my obligations to my parents.
mnemonic	Of or relating to or involved the practice of aiding the memory. <i>Mnemonic device.</i>
mnemonics	A method or system for improving the memory.
<u>nostalgic</u>	A nostalgic person. A <b>nostalgic</b> account of an idyllic childhood.
parapsychology	Phenomena that appear to contradict physical laws and suggest the possibility of causation by mental processes.
recall	Recall knowledge from memory have a recollection. People s understanding and subsequent <b>recall</b> of stories or events.
recollect	Recall knowledge from memory have a recollection. Can you <b>recollect</b> how he reacted.
recollection	A thing recollected; a memory. To the best of my <b>recollection</b> no one ever had a bad word to say about him.
remember	Show appreciation to. I <b>remember</b> the screech of the horn as the car came towards me.
remembrance	A recognition of meritorious service. I went through the papers and <b>remembrance</b> s in his drawers.
reminder	An experience that causes you to remember something. <i>He ignored his wife s <b>reminder</b>s.</i>
<u>reminisce</u>	Recall the past. They <b>reminisce</b> d about their summers abroad.
reminiscence	A story told about a past event remembered by the narrator. His first works are too full of <b>reminiscence</b> s of earlier poetry.
