<b><u>persona</u></b>	Jungian psychology a personal facade that one presents to the world. <i>Chris adds that his media <b>persona</b> does not match reality.</i>
<b>personality</b>	A person of considerable prominence. <i>She is a Hollywood <b>personality</b>.</i>
<b><u>self</u></b>	Used ironically to refer to oneself or someone else. <i>To love in an unpossessive way implies the total surrender of <b>self</b>.</i>
<b>soul</b>	The human embodiment of something. <i>In the depths of her <b>soul</b> she knew he would betray her.</i>
<b>spirit</b>	A solution of volatile components extracted from something, typically by distillation or by solution in alcohol. <i>He confessed in a <b>spirit</b> of self respect.</i>
<b><u>subconscious</u></b>	The subconscious part of the mind not in technical use in psychoanalysis where unconscious is preferred. <i>Uncertainties were lurking around the edge of her <b>subconscious</b>.</i>

<b>imbecility</b>	A stupid mistake.
<b>memoir</b>	The proceedings of a learned society. <i>In 1924 she published a short <b>memoir</b> of her husband.</i>
<b>memory</b>	An electronic memory device. <i>Search as he would the <b>memory</b> was lost.</i>
<b><u>mindful</u></b>	Inclined or willing to do something. <i>I arrived home for the summer ever <b>mindful</b> of my obligations to my parents.</i>
<b>mnemonic</b>	Of or relating to or involved the practice of aiding the memory. <i><b>Mnemonic</b> device.</i>
<b>mnemonics</b>	A method or system for improving the memory.
<b><u>nostalgic</u></b>	A nostalgic person. <i>A <b>nostalgic</b> account of an idyllic childhood.</i>
<b>parapsychology</b>	Phenomena that appear to contradict physical laws and suggest the possibility of causation by mental processes.
<b>recall</b>	Recall knowledge from memory have a recollection. <i>People s understanding and subsequent <b>recall</b> of stories or events.</i>
<b>recollect</b>	Recall knowledge from memory have a recollection. <i>Can you <b>recollect</b> how he reacted.</i>
<b><u>recollection</u></b>	A thing recollected; a memory. <i>To the best of my <b>recollection</b> no one ever had a bad word to say about him.</i>
<b>remember</b>	Show appreciation to. <i>I <b>remember</b> the screech of the horn as the car came towards me.</i>
<b>remembrance</b>	A recognition of meritorious service. <i>I went through the papers and <b>remembrances</b> in his drawers.</i>

<b>retention</b>	Failure to eliminate a substance from the body. <i>The soil s <b>retention</b> of moisture.</i>
<b>retentive</b>	Having the capacity to retain something. <i>He had a highly <b>retentive</b> memory and was an accomplished speaker.</i>
<b>rote</b>	Mechanical or habitual repetition of something to be learned. <i>A poem learnt by <b>rote</b> in childhood.</i>
<b>soul</b>	The human embodiment of something. <i>She s a nice old <b>soul</b>.</i>
<b>spiritual</b>	Lacking material body or form or substance. <i><b>Spiritual</b> beings.</i>
