## Synonyms of "Psychological" as an adjective (18 Words)

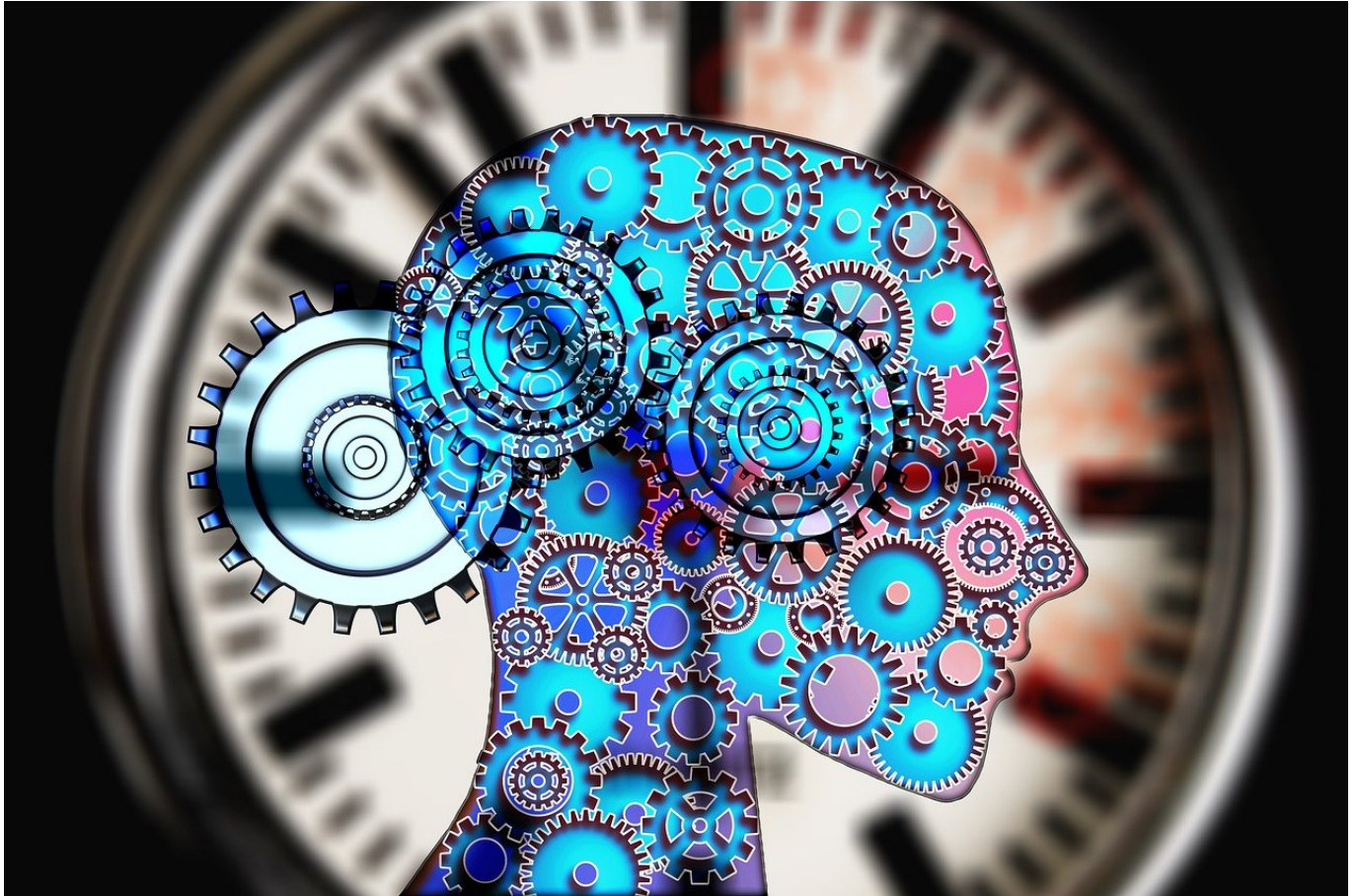
<b><u>abstract</u></b>	Dealing with a subject in the abstract without practical purpose or intention. <i>The novel was too <b>abstract</b> and esoteric to sustain much attention.</i>
<b>all in the mind</b>	Quantifier; used with either mass or count nouns to indicate the whole number or amount of or every one of a class.
<b><u>cerebral</u></b>	Of or relating to the cerebrum or brain. <i>A <b>cerebral</b> haemorrhage.</i>
<b>cognitive</b>	Relating to cognition. <i>The <b>cognitive</b> processes involved in reading.</i>
<b><u>conceptual</u></b>	Relating to or based on mental concepts. <i>The schizophrenic loses ability to abstract or do <b>conceptual</b> thinking.</i>
<b>emotional</b>	Of or pertaining to emotion. <i>An <b>emotional</b> speech.</i>
<b>in the mind</b>	Currently fashionable.
<b>inner</b>	Innermost or essential. <i><b>Inner</b> feelings.</i>

<b><u>intellectual</u></b>	Appealing to or using the intellect. <b><i>Intellectual</i></b> problems.
<b><u>irrational</u></b>	Of a number quantity or expression not expressible as a ratio of two integers and having an infinite and non recurring expansion when expressed as a decimal Examples of irrational numbers are the number and the square root of 2. <b><i>Irrational</i></b> numbers.
<b><u>mental</u></b>	Relating to the mind. <i>I think he was a little worried that I might be <b>mental</b>.</i>
<b><u>psychosomatic</u></b>	(of a physical illness or other condition) caused or aggravated by a mental factor such as internal conflict or stress. <i>Hypnosis involves powerful but little understood <b>psychosomatic</b> interactions.</i>
<b><u>rational</u></b>	Able to think sensibly or logically. <i>The triumph of the <b>rational</b> over the animal side of man.</i>
<b><u>subconscious</u></b>	Of or concerning the part of the mind of which one is not fully aware but which influences one's actions and feelings. <i>My <b>subconscious</b> fear.</i>
<b><u>subjective</u></b>	Of a mental act performed entirely within the mind. <i>A <b>subjective</b> judgment.</i>
<b><u>subliminal</u></b>	Below the threshold of conscious perception.
<b><u>theoretical</u></b>	Concerned primarily with theories or hypotheses rather than practical considerations. <b><i>Theoretical</i></b> science.
<b><u>unconscious</u></b>	(followed by `of') not knowing or perceiving. <i>Happily <b>unconscious</b> of the new calamity at home.</i>

## Associations of "Psychological" (30 Words)

<b>affective</b>	Denoting or relating to mental disorders in which disturbance of mood is the primary symptom. <i><b>Affective</b> disorders.</i>
<b>alertness</b>	The process of paying close and continuous attention. <i>A lack of mental <b>alertness</b>.</i>
<b>amok</b>	In a murderous frenzy.
<b>cathartic</b>	Providing psychological relief through the open expression of strong emotions; causing catharsis. <i>Crying is a <b>cathartic</b> release.</i>
<b>distortion</b>	A shape resulting from distortion. <i>Heavy metal guitar players use vacuum tube amplifiers to produce extreme <b>distortion</b>.</i>

<b>doubt</b>	Consider unlikely or have doubts about. <i>Some <b>doubt</b> has been cast upon the authenticity of this account.</i>
<b>genre</b>	A style or category of art, music, or literature. <i>The science fiction <b>genre</b>.</i>
<b>indecision</b>	Doubt concerning two or more possible alternatives or courses of action. <i>Government <b>indecision</b> over the future of local taxation.</i>
<b>maladjustment</b>	Faulty adjustment, especially regarding finances. <i>Basic <b>maladjustments</b> in the cost structure.</i>
<b>mental</b>	Of or relating to the mind. <i><b>Mental</b> illness.</i>
<b>mentally</b>	In a manner relating to the mind. <i>Soldiers become physically and <b>mentally</b> exhausted.</i>
<b>mood</b>	The atmosphere or pervading tone of something. <i><b>Mood</b> music.</i>
<b>parapsychology</b>	Phenomena that appear to contradict physical laws and suggest the possibility of causation by mental processes.
<b>pathos</b>	A style that has the power to evoke feelings. <i>The actor injects his customary humour and <b>pathos</b> into the role.</i>
<b>psychic</b>	The study of psychic phenomena. <i>Pier end palmists and fake <b>psychics</b>.</i>
<b>psychologist</b>	A scientist trained in psychology. <i>A leading child <b>psychologist</b>.</i>
<b>psychology</b>	The mental characteristics or attitude of a person or group. <i>The <b>psychology</b> of child killers.</i>
<b>puzzling</b>	Not clear to the understanding. <i>A <b>puzzling</b> statement.</i>
<b>sensibility</b>	Mental responsiveness and awareness. <i>Cruelty offended his <b>sensibility</b>.</i>
<b>sentiment</b>	The expression of a view or desire especially as formulated for a toast. <i>Many of the appeals rely on treacly <b>sentiment</b>.</i>
<b>sentimental</b>	Given to or marked by sentiment or sentimentality. <i>She felt a <b>sentimental</b> attachment to the place creep over her.</i>
<b>suspense</b>	A state or feeling of excited or anxious uncertainty about what may happen. <i>A tale of mystery and <b>suspense</b>.</i>
<b>taut</b>	(especially of muscles or nerves) tense; not relaxed. <i>The fabric stays <b>taut</b> without adhesive.</i>

<b>telepathy</b>	The supposed communication of thoughts or ideas by means other than the known senses.
<b>thrill</b>	Cause to be thrilled by some perceptual input. <i>A <b>thrill</b> of excitement ran through her.</i>
<b>thriller</b>	A novel, play, or film with an exciting plot, typically involving crime or espionage. <i>A tense <b>thriller</b> about a diamond heist that goes badly wrong.</i>
<b>touched</b>	Having come into contact. <i>The star said he was very <b>touched</b> to receive his medal.</i>
<b><u>trauma</u></b>	Any physical damage to the body caused by violence or accident or fracture etc. <i>A personal <b>trauma</b> like the death of a child.</i>
<b><u>traumatic</u></b>	Deeply disturbing or distressing. <i>She is remembering some deeply <b>traumatic</b> incident in her past.</i>
<b><u>uncertainty</u></b>	The state of being uncertain. <i>Times of <b>uncertainty</b> and danger.</i>
