advertising	A public promotion of some product or service. <i>An advertising agency.</i>
almanac	A handbook, typically published annually, containing information of general interest or on a sport or pastime.
announcement	The action of making an announcement. <i>An announcement is appearing in the Morning Post tomorrow.</i>
appearance	An act of performing or participating in a public event. <i>She read it with every appearance of interest.</i>
book	A bookmaker's record of bets accepted and money paid out. <i>He bought a book of stamps.</i>
broadcasting	Taking part in a radio or tv program. <i>The state monopoly on broadcasting.</i>
communication	A letter or message containing information or news. <i>Television is an effective means of communication.</i>

dissemination	The opening of a subject to widespread discussion and debate. <i>The dissemination of public information.</i>
distribution	The action of sharing something out among a number of recipients. <i>Unequal distributions of income and wealth.</i>
<u>emergence</u>	The process of coming into existence or prominence. <i>Not a day's difference between the emergence of the andrenas and the opening of the willow catkins.</i>
hardback	A book bound in stiff covers.
issuance	The action of formally making something known. <i>Issuance of a public notice.</i>
issue	Supplies as food or clothing or ammunition issued by the government. <i>The issue of racism.</i>
issuing	The act of issuing printed materials.
<u>manual</u>	A vehicle with manual transmission. <i>A computer manual.</i>
notification	An accusation of crime made by a grand jury on its own initiative. <i>The notification stated the grace period and the penalties for defaulting.</i>
opus	A separate composition or set of compositions. <i>He was writing an opus on Mexico.</i>
paperback	A book bound in stiff paper or flexible card. <i>The shelves were stacked with well thumbed paperbacks.</i>
printing	The business of producing printed material for sale or distribution. <i>This squiggly squarish printing was the only way he could write.</i>
<u>proclamation</u>	The formal act of proclaiming; giving public notice. <i>The issuing by the monarch of a proclamation dissolving Parliament.</i>
promulgation	The official announcement of a new law or ordinance whereby the law or ordinance is put into effect. <i>The promulgation was written in English.</i>
publicizing	The business of drawing public attention to goods and services.
publishing	The occupation or activity of preparing and issuing books, journals, and other material for sale. <i>She worked in publishing.</i>

<u>register</u>	A cashbox with an adding machine to register transactions used in shops to add up the bill. <i>The system requires teachers to take the register at each lesson.</i>
reporting	The news as presented by reporters for newspapers or radio or television.
spreading	The opening of a subject to widespread discussion and debate.
<u>title</u>	The position of being the champion of a major sports competition. <i>The novel had chapter titles.</i>
<u>tome</u>	A book, especially a large, heavy, scholarly one. <i>A weighty tome.</i>
<u>treatise</u>	A written work dealing formally and systematically with a subject. <i>His treatise on Scottish political theory.</i>
<u>volume</u>	A book forming part of a work or series. <i>He asked for the 1989 volume of the Annual Review.</i>
work	A place where work is done. <i>The heavens put on a show sheet lightning hailstones the works.</i>
yearbook	A reference book that is published regularly once every year. <i>The Rugby Union Yearbook.</i>

The top antiques fairs are the Milan and Florence **biennials**.

bimonthly

Done, produced, or occurring twice a month or every two months.

The magazine appears **bimonthly**.

biweekly	A periodical that appears every two weeks or twice a week. <i>An English language biweekly.</i>
coauthor	A writer who collaborates with others in writing something.
columnist	A journalist contributing regularly to a newspaper or magazine.
daily	The first prints from cinematographic takes; the rushes. <i>A daily paper.</i>
day-to-day	United States writer best known for his autobiographical works (1874-1935).
diurnal	Daily; of each day. <i>Diurnal animals are active during the day.</i>
editor	Computer science a program designed to perform such editorial functions as rearrangement or modification or deletion of data. <i>A sports editor.</i>
journal	Write in a journal or diary. <i>While abroad he had kept a journal.</i>
journalism	The product of the activity of journalism. <i>Pop journalism.</i>
magazine	A business firm that publishes magazines. <i>He took the machine gun and a spare magazine.</i>
monthly	Done, produced, or occurring once a month. <i>Most of us get paid monthly.</i>
newspaper	A business firm that publishes newspapers. <i>They used bales of newspaper every day.</i>
newsprint	Cheap, low-quality absorbent printing paper made from coarse wood pulp and used chiefly for newspapers.
periodic	Relating to the periodic table of the elements. <i>The periodic appearance of the seventeen year locust.</i>
periodical	A publication that appears at fixed intervals. <i>Britain s best periodical art magazine.</i>
publisher	A firm in the publishing business. <i>A commercial music publisher.</i>
quarterly	In diagonally opposed quarters of an escutcheon. <i>A quarterly newsletter is distributed to members.</i>
reader	A proofreader. <i>A meter reader.</i>
readership	The audience reached by written communications (books or magazines or newspapers etc). <i>The magazine has a readership of just 65 000.</i>
